MIKE ZIMMER

HEAD COACH

Mike Zimmer has recorded 66 wins, including a pair of victories in playoff games, in his first seven seasons with Minnesota. The win total ranks third in franchise history behind Bud Grant and Dennis Green and has helped the Vikings secure two NFC North titles during his tenure that began on Jan. 15, 2014. The Vikings have benefited from Zimmer's

defensive prowess that was developed as a defensive coordinator with Dallas (2000-06), Atlanta (2007) and Cincinnati (2018-13). Minnesota has ranked in the top five in points against in four of Zimmer's seven seasons, including 2017 when the Vikings led the league in the category (15.8 points per game).

VIKINGS EXPERIENCE 10TH SEASON Patterson is in his eighth consecutive season with the Vikings and was promoted to the assistant head coach position this offseason. He will continue to hold co-defensive coordinator responsibilities that were added in 2020. Patterson has worked with the defensive line since rejoining the Vikings in 2014 and also did so from 1998-99. He has coached at the high school (five seasons), collegiate (16 seasons) and NFL levels. Patterson also worked with Mike Zimmer at Weber State in 1988 and with the Dallas Cowboys from 2000-02.

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR NFL EXPERIENCE 8TH SEASON

Kubiak spent the 2016-18 seasons as an offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach for the Denver Broncos. He coached receivers at Kansas in 2015 after two seasons with the Vikings as a quality control/assistant wide receivers coach. Kubiak began his coaching career at Texas A&M in 2010.

EVERYONE GOT THE MESSAGE.

Last season's results from bizarre and often fan-less venues aren't to become the norm.

Nor will they if Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer, a replenished defense, threatening offense and remade special teams units have anything to say about it.

"I feel like we've added a lot of good players," Zimmer said during the Vikings offseason program. "You know, offensively was more with the draft and then on defense and special teams was more on free agency. But our guys in the front office have done an outstanding job. It's probably going to look completely different on the defensive side of the ball than it did last year with the guys coming back and the additions that we made. I am excited about that."

Minnesota is envisioning better health for a defense that missed a combined 35 possible games from Pro Bowlers Danielle Hunter (16), Anthony Barr (14) and Eric Kendricks (five). Barr, the first player the Vikings drafted after Zimmer's hire, said the head coach who became a grandpa to twins this summer still has his fire.

"He's always been the kind of coach that has a chip on his shoulder, that goes about things in just a very hard-working type of fashion. I don't think that's any different," Barr said. "He comes to work every day, fired up, ready to get better. He just lays out the expectations and explained last year was not good enough and not only disappointing but frustrating.

"Any time we've had a bad season, we've bounced back and been pretty successful the next year, so I'm looking forward to this year," Barr added.

The Vikings defense intends to bank on adding burliness up front (with defensive tackles Michael Pierce, Dalvin Tomlinson and Sheldon Richardson) and a bulk of experience on the back end of the defense, highlighted by the signing of eight-time Pro Bowler Patrick Peterson and other veteran cornerbacks.

Although Kirk Cousins will have his fourth different offensive coordinator in as many seasons with Minnesota, there is a general continuity for the quarterback. Klint Kubiak's promotion to the role after two seasons as Minnesota's quarterbacks coach will help, and so will the return of Dalvin Cook after one of the best seasons by a Vikings running back in team history.

Once-unheralded Adam Thielen and 2020 first-round pick Justin Jefferson comprise one of the best receiver duos in the NFL, and

Minnesota is excited about the potential for emerging players like tight end Irv Smith, Jr.

That's not to say everything is figured out. Minnesota has questions to answer on its offensive line and multiple jobs up for grabs on special teams, but the Vikings will solve those problems together and welcome fans back to games.

"I don't want to say it wasn't as fun, but there's so much more happiness and excitement this year," right tackle Brian O'Neill said. "We know we're going to have fans; we know football season is going to be as normal as it can be."

DUARTERBACKS

And while he is the unquestioned starter, there is plenty of intrigue behind him with the trio of Jake Browning, Nate Stanley and Kellen Mond

Browning, a 2019 undrafted free agent, and Stanley, a 2020 seventh-round pick, showed signs of improvement during

offseason practices, but strong play in the preseason will be key in evaluations.

The same can be said of Mond, a rookie who was a third-round pick in the 2021 NFL Draft. A four-year starter at Texas A&M, Mond earned praise for his football IQ and the mental aspect of his game

But like all rookies, he'll certainly face a learning curve as he adjusts to the speed and challenges of the NFL.

"Really competitive group ... [Browning, Stanley and Mond] have really competed hard against each other," said Vikings Offensive Coordinator Klint Kubiak. "It's a very intelligent room, so it's a very competitive room physically. But those guys compete mentally ... Who can have the quickest answer? Who knows the answer the fastest? Who can think of the worst thing that can happen on this play and how we're going to fix it before it ever starts? I love that room."

RUNNING BACKS

The Vikings boast of one of the league's top running back duos in Dalvin Cook and Alexander Mattison, and the former can certainly state his case as the best back in the league.

Minnesota will lean on the ground game again, as the Vikings are running a similar scheme to a season ago when they ranked fifth overall with 142.7 rushing yards per game.

Cook was phenomenal in 2020, setting a careerhigh with 1,557 rushing yards and 16 scores as he earned a second straight Pro Bowl honor.

Cook said he has little interest in personal goals in 2021, even as he enters the first season of a multi-year contract he signed in September.

"I want to make the playoffs. That's my goal. I've never really set a goal ever since I got to Minnesota," Cook said. "My main goal was just go out there and be Dalvin Cook, and I think everything will take care of itself. I never really set a goal for X number of yards and, 'This is what I want.' I always say work hard, and when the season comes around, [I'II] just be who I am and let it go. That's what I do."

Mattison chipped in with 434 yards and a pair of scores in 13 games. He closed his second pro season by rushing for 95 yards and catching three passes for 50 yards, including a 28-yard touchdown in Week 17.

There are also a handful of intriguing names at running back behind those two.

Ameer Abdullah is a veteran who plays key roles on special teams. Kene Nwangwu, a 2021 fourth-round pick, could also excel on special teams as a rookie, as he was a dynamic kick returner at lowa State. Rookie undrafted free agent A.J. Rose, is also on the roster.

The Vikings will also rely on Pro Bowl fullback C.J. Ham to once again clear the way up front, as the Minnesota native is one of the game's best at his position. Jake Bargas is also back after spending nearly all of the 2020 season on the practice squad.



WIDE RECEIVERS

Much like running back, the Vikings appear loaded at the top of this position group with Adam Thielen and Justin Jefferson.

Thielen was a touchdown machine in 2020, hauling in a career-high 14, a total that is the fifth-most in a single season in team history. He also added 925 yards in 15 games, narrowly missing out on the third 1.000-yard season of his career.

Jefferson took the league by storm as a rookie in 2020. He set a Super Bowl-era rookie record with a whopping 1,400 receiving yards and added seven touchdowns for good measure. He also caught 88 passes, a total that broke the team's single-season rookie record set in 1998 by Hall of Famer Randy Moss.

Many will be watching to see how Jefferson fares in his second season, as he is sure to draw lots of attention, but the fun-loving wide receiver looked even faster and more confident this spring.

"Now it's my second year, and I just feel so comfortable with these guys," Jefferson said. "They're very easy to talk to, very easy to be around, so now I feel just way more comfortable with this team and just trying to take on that role to be a leader."

As usual, there are a number of players battling for the third spot behind Thielen and lefferson.

Chad Beebe had a solid 2020 season with 20 catches for 201 yards and two scores. He saw first-team reps this spring and could solidify that spot again with a strong summer showing. Bisi Johnson is entering his third season and knows the Vikings offense well.

But they'll be pushed by a handful of youngsters him, including rookie Ihmir Smith-Marsette from Iowa. He could initially make an impact on special teams but also has potential to help out the offense down the road.

K.J. Osborn and Dan Chisena exclusively played special teams as rookies in 2020. But Osborn showed flashes on offense this spring and could carve out a role for himself with even more improvement.

Myron Mitchell, Whop Philyor and Blake Proehl are undrafted free agents who will look to impress coaches in training camp and the preseason.

While they could fight their way onto the 53-man roster by the time the season starts, perhaps they end up on the practice squad in their respective rookie seasons.

TIGHT ENDS

This position group was the talk of the town this offseason, as many are excited about the potential production that Irv Smith, Jr., and Tyler Conkin could bring to the field in 2021.

Those two are looked at as the leaders of the group after veteran Kyle Rudolph was released due to salary cap restraints this offseason. Smith and Conklin certainly looked the part this spring, as both routinely shined in all aspects of practices.

Smith had 365 yards and five scores in 2020, with many expecting him to top those numbers in his third pro season. Conklin, meanwhile, flashed down the stretch with 15 catches for 168 yards and a touchdown in Minnesota's final four games of the 2020 season.

"I feel like the tight end, you want to be able to move and not only be a threat in the pass game, but in the run game as well [as a blocker]," Smith said. "I feel like me and Conk' are one of the best [duos] at doing that. With that being said, I'm very excited about me and him playing together and having this opportunity."

The battle for the spot behind Smith and Conklin should be a good one. And it's for a key role in the Vikings offense, given how often the team uses multiple tight end sets.

Brandon Dillon has fared well over the past two training camps and could be in line for a larger role in his third professional season.

Zach Davidson has an interesting backstory. The 2021 fifth-round pick played at Central Missouri (Division II) and excelled at both punter and tight end before getting drafted. He may need some time to develop but certainly offers intrigue.

Another Division II player in the room is Shane Zylstra, who is transitioning to the position after a stellar college career as a receiver at Minnesota State, Mankato. Zylstra is the school's all-time leader in career receptions (227), receiving yards (4,297) and touchdown catches (54).





OFFENSIVE LINE

This position group is always in the spotlight, but no team has devoted as much draft capital to the offensive line than the Vikings in recent years.

Over the past four drafts, Minnesota has taken five offensive linemen on Day 1 or Day 2, the most among NFL teams in that span.

The Vikings are now led up front by Brian O'Neill, a 2018 second-rounder who has developed into one of the game's better right tackles.

"You might have a few more pointers for the young guys," O'Neill said of his role after the departure of Riley Reiff. "But at the end of the day, it's all about trying to progress myself and have the best season I possibly can and try to help lead this group the best way I can."

Garrett Bradbury will be back at center as the 2019 first-round pick enters his third season. He has progressed in each of his first two seasons but could be in line for a bigger jump in Year 3.

Ezra Cleveland is now at left guard after he started nine games at right guard as a rookie in 2020. A former second-rounder, Cleveland said he bulked up a bit this offseason to get prepared for the grind of being an interior offensive lineman.

Veterans Rashod Hill (left tackle) and Dakota Dozier (right guard) spent offseason practices with the first-team offense. And both would provide a veteran presence if asked to start this season.


But the Vikings also spent two draft picks on offensive linemen in the 2021 NFL Draft, including the No. 23 selection on left tackle Christian Darrisaw.


The former Virginia Tech standout offers size (6-foot-5 and 323 pounds) and athleticism, and he is viewed as Minnesota's left tackle of the future.

Former Ohio State right guard Wyatt Davis, a two-time All-American, could also vie for a starting spot as a rookie. He is listed at 6-4 and 326 pounds, and he brings needed size up front.

There is solid depth behind that group, including fourth-year veteran Mason Cole, whom the Vikings traded for this spring. He had 32 career starts at center and guard with Arizona over the past three seasons.

Others such as Olisaemeka Udoh, Dru Samia, Blake Brandel and Kyle Hinton are younger linemen who could provide depth this season.





SAFETIES

Harrison Smith equaled his career best with five interceptions in 2020. He is entering his 10th season with 28 career picks.

Veteran free agent Xavier Woods, who played the past four seasons with Dallas, is expected to join Smith and fill the vacancy created by the departure of Anthony Harris.

"He's a really smart guy, so that makes it — I don't want to say easier — but it can make things smoother when you've got two guys back there that can stay ahead of plays and you've got guys outside that are easy to communicate with," Smith said. "It just kind of lets that whole presnap operation run a little smoother."

Josh Metellus is back for his second season, and Myles Dorn, who missed all of 2020 with an injury, wants to make his mark. Fourth-round pick Camryn Bynum is transitioning from playing cornerback at Cal to safety, and Luther Kirk is aiming to build on his experience with Minnesota's practice squad last season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Britton Colquitt is back to punt for his third season in Minnesota and 12th in the NFL. In addition to punting, Colquitt has solidified the holder spot since signing in 2019.

He'll be the pivot as battles at long snapper (between veteran Andrew DePaola and undrafted rookie Turner Bernard) and kicker (between veteran Greg Joseph and rookie Riley Patterson) unfold.

Longtime assistant Ryan Ficken has been promoted to special teams coordinator.

He described the approach to evaluating competitions.

"You want to make it as fair as possible so they're getting the same reps, because each day's different," Ficken said. "We have windy days on certain days and not on others, so you want to keep it as fair as possible, but at the end of the day it all works out. ... Competition's a beautiful thing, and we've just got to make sure we're working to get better each day."

CORNERBACKS

The Vikings injected multiple doses of experience at cornerback this offseason after generally rolling with rookies Cam Dantzler and Jeff Gladney in 2020.

Patrick Peterson leads a group of veteran arrivals that also includes Bashaud Breeland, Parry Nickerson and Tye Smith, and Mackensie Alexander has returned to the team that drafted him in 2016 after spending 2020 with Cincinnati.

"They're not going through it for the first time like we did a year ago," Co-Defensive Coordinator Andre Patterson said of the veteran corners. "But I think the other thing that's very important is you have a lot of competition, OK? And competition makes everyone better. Competition makes everybody compete and makes everybody strive to improve because they're all fighting for a job, and to me, what we have going on right now in the secondary and what we have going on right now in the defensive line, is great competition."

Harrison Hand turned in a strong showing this offseason in preparation for his second pro season, and Kris Boyd is entering his third with Minnesota. Dylan Maybin and Amari Henderson are also vying for spots.

LINEBACKERS

One could almost see "WELP," in air bubbles above the Vikings sideline each time an injury struck the Vikings linebackers in 2020.

Anthony Barr, a four-time Pro Bowler, was one of the biggest losses — and quickest, less than six full quarters into the campaign.

"Obviously having Anthony back is huge for us," Vikings Co-Defensive Coordinator Adam Zimmer said. "There's so many things he does for us that go unnoticed by maybe the common fan. He's our signal-caller and makes all the checks for us. And he's extremely smart. ... I think he's going to have a great year. He's moving around great, has gotten stronger, and we've got some different looks for him that can enhance the way we use him."

Eric Kendricks was helping the group mitigate losses by turning in arguably his finest season

when he suffered an injury in a practice that cost him the final five games of his sixth pro season.

"Unfortunately, I felt like I was having one of the best seasons of my career, and I wanted to help my team win games," Kendricks said. "Being on the sideline was disappointing, but we've been rehabbing, been recovering and feeling good, so I'm looking forward to this upcoming season."

Troy Dye, Ryan Connelly and Blake Lynch are back after suiting up for Minnesota in 2020, and so is Cameron Smith, who underwent surgery to repair a congenital heart defect last summer. Minnesota brought in veteran Nick Vigil and drafted Chazz Surratt in the third round this spring. Tuf Borland and Christian Elliss were added as undrafted free agents.



DEFENSIVE TACKLES

The 2020 plan was to fill the mammoth void previously occupied by Linval Joseph with Michael Pierce, who understandably opted out last season because of COVID-19 concerns. Pierce at long last made his way to Minnesota and is expected to partner with 2021 signee Dalvin Tomlinson.

"They've done a nice job. They're pro's pros," Vikings Assistant Head Coach and Co-Defensive Coordinator Andre Patterson said. "They work hard, they've got very good football I.Q., they're both big and strong. I think the one thing that's been surprising is how sudden and how quick their feet are for big men."

Their unique nimbleness is definitely something to keep an eye on during training camp practices, and so is the quickness of Sheldon Richardson, who played for the Vikings in 2018 before inking a big deal with the Browns. Richardson returned to Minnesota in June after two seasons with Cleveland. The Vikings might try to maximize his impact in pass-rush packages.

Armon Watts is entering his third season, and James Lynch is back for his second campaign. Minnesota drafted Jaylen Twyman in the sixth round and added undrafted free agents Zeandae Johnson and Jordon Scott.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

Danielle Hunter's sixth pro season ended without a sack or even a snap in full pads. The NFL's youngest player to record 50 career sacks suffered a neck injury during a camp practice that required surgery.

The absence of a player who had posted 14.5 sacks in 2018 and 2019 was glaring. Minnesota finished with a paltry 23 sacks last season and struggled to make opposing quarterbacks uncomfortable.

"I just want to be out there and help my teammates; knowing I wasn't able to help them and just seeing what happened on the field, it got to me," Hunter said after returning to Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center in June for a mandatory minicamp. "I'm just happy I'm able to come back and help the team out, whatever they need me to do."

Hunter did not practice in those sessions, and it's likely the Vikings will slowly accelerate things for the muscle-car enthusiast.

Minnesota brought back Stephen Weatherly after he played 2020 for Carolina and is looking to build on a solid rookie season by D.J. Wonnum. Jalyn Holmes, Hercules Mata'afa and Jordan Brailford are back in the fold, and Kenny Willekes is eager for his first NFL action after missing all of last season with a camp injury. The Vikings also drafted Patrick Jones II in the third round and Janarius Robinson in the fourth.



Thirty-three for 33.

Entering his fifth NFL campaign, Vikings running back Dalvin Cook has 33 rushing touchdowns in regular-season games to his name – and to match his jersey number.

Cook is a student of the game and no stranger to film study; but the goal is usually to better prepare for an opponent. Vikings.com, however, got Cook to run it back and self-critique all 33 scores.

Cook reminisced, reflected, and he laughed ... a lot.

1 1 YD VS. TB 09.24.17

"Look at me. Look at me. Hold up. First of all, this is my first touchdown of my career. And I wasn't supposed to be doing this – diving over the pile. KP (running backs coach Kennedy Polamalu) had told me, 'Don't do it.' And I dove over the pile, and I thought I lost the ball. You can see me indecisive on the ground right here. I don't know if I scored or not. I'm nervous – just look. I'm nervous. I don't know.

"I'm like, 'This is my first touchdown. I can't ...' Look at me. 'Did I score?' Touchdown. Touchdown."

"Case [Keenum] motioned me in – this is the one where I jumped in the end zone. I remember this game. I got hurt. This is the game I tore my ACL. Time to jump! This is when we were cooking early, right there.

"That little celebration right there? ... 'Get the pot ready; stir us up.' Let's go! I like that one. "

13 YDS VS. MIA | 12.16.18

"Playing the Dolphins always meant something to me. My home team – it always meant something to me. These touchdowns. ... My brother and my mom were at this game. It was just one of those moments. My mom has only been to a few games because my brother plays [college football], so it was fun."

"It was my first touchdown back from my ACL. ... [And it] was probably the most meaningful one."

"Oh yeah. This is the one where Irv [Smith, Jr.] walked me in the end zone. Irv said, 'Follow me. Follow me. Follow me. Follow me. Irv is my private escort right here. ... When blocking means a lot to a tight end, that's how you know you've got a good one."

"Sometimes when I break long runs and there's a safety – I don't know if people ever do this – I look the safety right in the eyes. And if his eyes are a little bit bigger than mine, he's in trouble. Or you get some guys who are just back there flat-footed and just looking at you. I got him, too, because I'm gonna run past him. It just depends. Before, three years ago, I probably would have gone up on the safety and just tried to give him a move. Now, it's just like, 'If he catches me, he catches me.' The odds of him doing it are slim. I'm just gonna try to run past him."

"This is one of those plays ... we'd been calling all year. 'Toss Dalvin to the right, toss Dalvin to the left. Let him get to the edge. Let him make a play.' "We needed this one. We couldn't go out of there with a shutout. This was just one of those touchdowns where it's like, 'End of the game, we need it. We can't leave here without it.' Chicago was playing some good defense that game."

(Laughs) "Look at Conk' (Tyler Conklin) – Conk's like, 'I don't know how to dance.' "

"This is one of those games we needed to run the football. Just had to get going early in this one, and we definitely did that."

23 7 YDS AT HOU 10.04.20

"It was hard to defend this play. That was a good play."

24 8 YDS AT SEA 10.11.20

"Ahh, man. Scoring in Seattle is always fun. Always. Because of him - 54 (Wagner). He's the smartest man on the field. " 25 21 YDS AT GB 11.01.20

"There I go! Look, let me pause this. I've always wanted to do this (the Lambeau Leap), my whole life. Once I realized that I was coming to Minnesota after being drafted, I started digging deep into the history of rivalries. ... Oh, man. The Lambeau Leap – this was all I needed, right here. ROCKIE ROUNDUE

THE VIKINGS ADDED TO EVERY OFFENSIVE POSITION GROUP AND ADDRESSED ALL THREE LEVELS OF THEIR DEFENSE BY SELECTING 11 PLAYERS IN THE 2021 NFL DRAFT.

It marked the fourth time in five years in which Minnesota has selected 11 or more players in a draft. The Vikings reached double digits despite not having a second-round selection in part because General Manager Rick Spielman was able to trade down from 14 to 23 on opening night, collect a pair of third-round picks from the Jets and land tackle Christian Darrisaw out of Virginia Tech.

Spielman said the Vikings were thrilled that Darrisaw was still on

the board at No. 23 because the team had considered taking him with the 14th pick. The Vikings then tried to move back up to make sure they secured the tackle.

It turned out that Minnesota didn't have to make another move, and the picks acquired from the Jets were used to select quarterback Kellen Mond and guard Wyatt Davis.

"When we got into the third round, we just kind of followed our board, picked the best available players," Spielman said. "We had a lot of activity of teams trying to trade up into our slots but felt ... if we did trade out and tried to accumulate more picks for Saturday, that the value wasn't going to be there."

CHRISTIAN DARRISAW, T

1ST ROUND (23RD OVERALL)
HEIGHT: 6-5 | WEIGHT: 323
COLLEGE: VIRGINIA TECH

Virginia Tech was the only FBS school to offer Darrisaw a scholarship out of Riverdale Baptist High School in Maryland, but he entered the starting lineup at left tackle immediately. Darrisaw totaled 35 starts in three seasons, capping his career with selections to the All-ACC First Team and All-America Second Team.



KELLEN MOND, QB

3RD ROUND (66TH OVERALL)
HEIGHT: 6-3 | WEIGHT: 211
COLLEGE: TEXAS A&M

Mond was the No. 1 dual-threat quarterback recruit in the country in 2017 and became a four-year starter at Texas A&M, finishing as the Aggies all-time leader in most career passing categories. He was named MVP of the 2019 Academy Sports + Outdoors Texas Bowl and of the 2021 Reese's Senior Bowl.

CHAZZ SURRATT, LB

3RD ROUND (78TH OVERALL) HEIGHT: 6-2 | WEIGHT: 230 COLLEGE: NORTH CAROLINA

Surratt made seven starts at quarterback for UNC in 2017 but appeared in just one game there in 2018. He pivoted to linebacker in 2019 and was the runner-up for ACC Defensive Player of the Year honors, ranking second in the conference with 115 tackles and leading the Tar Heels with 15 tackles for loss and 6.5 sacks.

WYATT DAVIS, G

3RD ROUND (86TH OVERALL)
HEIGHT: 6-4 | WEIGHT: 326
COLLEGE: OHIO STATE

After garnering Southern California Player of the Year honors from the Los Angeles Times as a tackle at St. John Bosco, Davis transitioned to guard at Ohio State. He became the first Buckeyes guard to win the Big Ten's Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year award and was unanimously selected to the All-America Team in 2020.

PATRICK JONES II, DE

3RD ROUND (90TH OVERALL) HEIGHT: 6-4 | WEIGHT: 262 COLLEGE: PITTSBURGH

Jones redshirted in 2016 after enrolling a semester early and played as a reserve pass rusher from 2017-18. He became a starter in 2019 and led the Panthers with four forced fumbles, which tied for fourth-most in FBS. He garnered First-Team All-ACC honors in 2020, as well as a Second-Team All-America designation.



KENE NWANGWU, RB

4TH ROUND (119TH OVERALL)
HEIGHT: 6-1 | WEIGHT: 213
COLLEGE: IOWA STATE

Nwangwu first made his mark as a kickoff returner for the Cyclones in 2016 when he averaged 26.4 yards per return to rank second in the Big 12 and 15th nationally. After a medical redshirt in 2017, he ranked first (2018), second (2019) and third (2020) in the Big 12 in kickoff return average.

CAMRYN BYNUM, S

4TH ROUND (125TH OVERALL)
HEIGHT: 6-0 | WEIGHT: 200
COLLEGE: CALIFORNIA

A two-time captain, Bynum was the only Bears player to start all 42 games from 2017-20. He made each start at cornerback and led the Bears in passes defensed in each of the past three seasons but has switched to safety for Minnesota. Pac-12 coaches named him Honorable Mention (2018), Second Team (2019) and First Team (2020).

JANARIUS ROBINSON, DE

4TH ROUND (134TH OVERALL)
HEIGHT: 6-5 | WEIGHT: 260
COLLEGE: FLORIDA STATE

After redshirting in 2016 and playing as a reserve in 2017, Robinson thrived with a larger role. He led Florida State with 9.0 tackles for loss in 2019 and added 7.0 more in a shortened 2020. Robinson was named to the All-ACC Academic Team in 2020 and to the ACC Honor Roll in 2018 and 2019.

IHMIR SMITH-MARSETTE, WR

5TH ROUND (157TH OVERALL)
HEIGHT: 6-1 | WEIGHT: 180
COLLEGE: IOWA

Smith-Marsette capped his college career by earning Honorable Mention All-Big Ten honors as a receiver and kick returner. He ended the previous year by garnering Offensive MVP honors in the Holiday Bowl when he scored a rushing, receiving and return touchdown against Southern Cal.

Smith-Marsette's career kickoff return average (28.7 yards) ranks second in Big Ten history.

ZACH >>>> DAVIDSON, TE

STH ROUND (168TH OVERALL)
HEIGHT: 6-7 | WEIGHT: 243
COLLEGE: CENTRAL MISSOURI

Davidson's ability to punt is what landed the Webb City, Missouri, native with the Mules, but he wound up excelling in a rare double-duty role. Davidson garnered First-Team All-America honors from *The Associated Press* in 2019. Central Missouri did not participate in fall 2020 because of COVID-19.



6TH ROUND (199TH OVERALL) HEIGHT: 6-2 | WEIGHT: 293 COLLEGE: PITTSBURGH

Twyman earned *Washington Post* All-Metro honors as a senior at H.D. Woodson High School in Washington, D.C., but he redshirted in 2017. After making just one start in 2018, Twyman burst onto the scene with 10.5 sacks as a sophomore, becoming the first Panthers interior lineman to lead the team in sacks since Aaron Donald.

IT WILL BE OVERDUE, uncommon and A-OK for Steve Hutchinson's name to be called on Aug. 7 when the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Class of 2020 is finally enshrined.

Hutchinson embodied the approach of an offensive lineman, valuing team goals and working hard to dominate while generally avoiding the limelight – and ire of officials – for much of his 12 NFL seasons.

The laurels – seven Pro Bowls and five selections to *The Associated Press*' All-Pro First Team – occurred, and the penalties did not. After joining the Vikings in 2006, the 17th overall pick of the 2001 NFL Draft by Seattle was flagged just eight times (five false starts and three holds) over the course of six seasons.

Hutchinson was not assessed a single penalty in 2006 or 2008 and helped Minnesota rank second in the NFL in rushing yards per game (135.0) and third in rushing touchdowns (102) from 2006-11. He blocked for a 1,000-yard rusher in 11 of his 12 seasons. Hutchinson finished his career in Tennessee (2012) and now works as a consultant for Seattle's personnel department.

The Hall of Fame recently hosted a media session during which Hutchinson explained his thoughts on the guard position. He noted it is often undervalued in draft rooms and is being challenged in new ways when defensive coaching staffs isolate elite pass rushers against a guard.

"It is a position that's hard to watch on TV because it gets lost from the camera angles," Hutchinson said. "Most of the time you're only getting your name called when there's a flag on the field. That won't change, but most offensive linemen don't do it for the glory.

"I think everybody would love to be behind the scenes and stay there and not have to deal with the spotlight," Hutchinson continued, "but it definitely is a position that's crucial, just like any of them, and I think now more so than ever."

According to Hall of Fame records, only a handful of guards made it to football immortality faster than Hutchinson, who was selected in his third year of eligibility after an obligatory five-year waiting period. John Hannah and Gene Upshaw were elected in their first year of eligibility. The same goes for Larry Allen and Bruce Matthews, who spent most of their careers at guard.

Forrest Gregg was a tackle, except in a couple of years when pinches kicked him inside. Jim Parker also made his first marks at tackle. Jonathan Ogden moved to left tackle after his rookie campaign.

On the eve of Super Bowl LIV, Hutchinson and his family were in a hotel room a short trip down the beach from his hometown of Fort Lauderdale, Florida, when Hall of Fame President David Baker knocked on the door at 3:35 p.m. to inform Hutchinson he would be the

335th person enshrined. Hutchinson's daughter snapped a photo to chronicle the moment.

Weeks later, the COVID-19 pandemic shut down much of the sports world, prompting a postponement of the enshrinement ceremony but not the rewarding feeling Hutchinson enjoyed when he received the good news.

"It was kind of a calming, overall satisfactory exhale feeling where I could be like, 'I did it. I can close the book on my professional career and my football life,' " Hutchinson said. "That's what I started out to do. I wanted to be the best, and when you get that knock, it confirms it. It was kind of hard to put into words, but it's definitely a feeling I'll never forget."



Kevin Williams stopped, handed his phone to a Vikings staff member and stood near the Purple People Eaters exhibit, positioning himself between sculptures of Alan Page and Gary Larsen.

"I'VE GOTTA GET A PHOTO WITH THESE GUYS," Williams said from the Minnesota Vikings Museum.

He's a man of few words but ample talent and a humble heart.

A 2003 first-round draft pick by Minnesota, Williams totaled 60 sacks (tied for ninthmost in team history), five interceptions (two returned for touchdowns), eight forced fumbles and 13 fumble recoveries (two returned for touchdowns) over 11 seasons in Purple.

His 685 career tackles are the fifth-most among Minnesota defensive linemen, and his 75.5 tackles for loss rank eighth among all Vikings players, according to team records.

Williams never sought the spotlight, but he's being recognized nonetheless. His museum tour occurred a few hours after receiving the surprise news that he will be inducted into the Vikings Ring of Honor this year.

"It is surreal. ... I didn't play for the accolades or the glory. I just wanted to win and do my job and represent this organization as best as I could," Williams said. "I mean, don't get me wrong. I'm super excited about this honor. It just shows you that you did things the right way and people recognize it, and I appreciate it."

In addition to quickly spotting the Purple People Eaters installment, Williams peered pensively into the glass "Frozen in Time" column dedicated to Jim Marshall's Vikings career and retired 70 jersey.

From Marshall and the other Purple People Eaters to John Randle, Williams has always strived to honor the legacy of the Vikings defensive linemen who went before him.

He recalled being presented with available jersey numbers after being drafted and opting for 93: the number worn by Randle, an undrafted free agent in 1990 who exploded onto the scene for Minnesota and later ended up in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

But for a kid from Arkadelphia, Arkansas, the number didn't immediately stand out as significant to Williams.

"I picked 93 not knowing any of the tradition," Williams said. "And then you get here and find out, 'Oh my goodness, Johnny wore 93.' And I never said it to anybody, but I'm like, 'I can't be a bust here. I have to get out there and get after it and perform.' That kind of battle I fought with myself to be successful, and here we are today."

Williams doesn't get too high or too low – he never has – but he also doesn't take such an honor for granted, and he's thankful for the many people who helped him along the way, including "each and every one" of the 2003 Vikings defensive linemen who shaped his first pro season.

He also developed a special bond with Pat Williams who joined Minnesota in 2005 and formed the other half of the "Williams Wall."

"I always joke and tell him, 'You didn't make the Pro Bowl until you played with me, so you've got to appreciate that.' But he of course is gonna argue that," Williams laughed. "It was a brotherhood. The internal battles that we had with each other about who's going to outplay the other one kind of fueled both of us. And then to add Jared [Allen] to the mix, he just came along and did the same thing. So it was kind of all three of us competing every Sunday."





