VIKINGS VS. BRONCOS

AUG. 14, 2021 U.S. BANK STADIUM


Today's exhibition contest is the opener for the Vikings and Broncos. It also marks the second time in four seasons that Minnesota and Denver have met to open a preseason. The Vikings took the previous contest, 42-28, in a game that was notable because it was the first in-game action for Kirk Cousins with Minnesota and Case Keenum with Denver.

Now, another former Vikings QB, Teddy Bridgewater, is expected to make his Broncos debut. He's not the only player who previously suited up in Purple that will now take the field from the visitor's locker room. Mike Boone, Brett Jones and Shamar Stephen have also made their way to the Rocky Mountains after playing for Minnesota last season.

2ND-QUARTER DOWNTURNS

After mostly holding their own in first quarters last season with a combined score of 93-74, the Vikings were outscored 137-82 in second quarters. The Broncos fared even worse by a count of 151-75 in second quarters. Denver's foes also scored more in opening stanzas (74-54).


According to Next Gen Stats, the Broncos used 11 personnel (one running back, one tight end and three receivers) on 685 of their 1,029 offensive snaps in 2020. That grouping was also the one most used by the Vikings, but Minnesota's rate was 27.4 percent (280 of 1,023 plays). The Vikings used 21 personnel (running back, fullback and tight end) on 267 plays and a 12 grouping (one running back, two tight ends) on 224 plays.








DANIELLE HUNTER

Hunter's workload in this one might be minimal, but the Vikings are excited to welcome him back after a neck injury forced him to miss all of 2020.

Keep an eye on the way Hunter comes off the line of scrimmage with lightning quickness, as well as whether he uses a speed rush or flexes his power while pressuring passers. Hunter always has committed to Minnesota's approach to stopping the run, so be sure to notice that unheralded element of his game.

Hunter became the youngest player in NFL history to officially record 50 career sacks, doing so at the age of 25 years, 40 days on Dec. 8, 2019.



VIKINGS GENERAL MANAGER RICK SPIELMAN KNEW IT WAS ONLY A MATTER OF TIME.

For the past several years, he had looked on as Vice President of Player Personnel/ Assistant General Manager George Paton participated in job interviews for general manager positions in the NFL.

Each time, Paton (show above) had returned to the Vikings franchise for which he put forth tremendous work ethic and delivered results since arriving in Minnesota in 2007.

The opportunity that Paton received from the Denver Broncos, however, was one that he could not pass up for himself and his family. The Broncos announced Paton as their GM in January, which Spielman described soon after as "very emotional."

The relationship between Spielman and Paton runs deep. Spielman brought Paton to Minnesota in 2007, the first year in which Spielman led the Vikings drafts. The duo also previously worked together in Chicago and Miami.

"We started our career back when I was the co-director in Chicago and he came in as an intern, I believe, in 1997-1998," Spielman said. "When I left Chicago and went to Miami, it took me a year, but I knew that was the number one person I wanted to bring with me down to Miami. And then when I came here to Minnesota, it took me a year, but I was not going to give up until I was able to get George Paton up here with me.

"I've been in this business, I think, going on

my 31st year, and I don't believe I would be in the position I'm in without having George Paton by my side through everything that we've been through," Spielman continued. "He's been my sounding board, my closest friend and truly like a brother to me."

Spielman, who is the godfather of Paton's son Beau, said he believes Paton has landed with a "great organization" and is going to a place with an "opportunity to have a lot of success."

"While it is difficult to leave the Vikings, the relationships I enjoyed in Minnesota are for life," Paton said in January. "I am truly grateful for the Wilf family, Rick Spielman, Rob Brzezinski, Mike Zimmer and the entire Vikings organization. Thank you for treating us like family."

- Broncos QB Teddy Bridgewater (2014-17), RB Mike Boone (2018-20), C Brett Jones (2018-20) and DT Shamar Stephen (2014-17; 2019-20) all previously played for the Vikings.
- Minnesota Assistant Head Coach/Co-Defensive Coordinator Andre Patterson (2005-06), Offensive Coordinator Klint Kubiak (2016-18), Senior Offensive Advisor Rick Dennison (1995-2009 and 2015-16), tight ends coach Brian Pariani (1995-2004; 2015-
- 16) and offensive line coach Phil Rauscher (2015-17) all previously coached in Denver. Dennison played linebacker for the Broncos from 1982-90.
- Denver Offensive Coordinator Pat Shurmur held the same role for Minnesota in 2017. He began 2016 as the Vikings tight ends coach and was promoted to interim offensive coordinator nine games into that season.



TEDDY BRIDGEWATER

A first-round pick by the Vikings in the 2014 NFL Draft, Bridgewater helped open U.S. Bank Stadium with an impressive performance in a preseason contest against the Chargers two days before suffering a knee injury that sent him on a long rehab process and impacted multiple franchises. Bridgewater's relentlessness was rewarded in

2017 when he took the field for nine snaps in a 34-7 win by Minnesota that clinched the NFC North. He played sparingly for New Orleans here in 2018. Last season as Carolina's starter, he made his first start in a regular-season game at U.S. Bank Stadium, but the venue was empty.



Christian Elliss is one of 12 children, but the way he sees it is he has "11 best friends" ranging from age 26 to 10.

The 22-year-old is the third-oldest who has been raised by former Lions and Broncos defensive lineman Luther Elliss, a first-round pick by Detroit in 1995 who later worked in Denver as chaplain for the team.

Christian has been a high school star in two states (Utah and Colorado) and an all-conference player in a third (Idaho). The two-time All-Big Sky First-Team selection with the Vandals participated in spring football games after Idaho postponed its 2020 fall season, turned around quickly to turn in an impressive pro day and was this year's "Prospect X" in Sports Illustrated's pre-draft mystery miniseries.

Although Christian went undrafted two years after his brother, Kaden, was a seventh-round selection of the Saints, one of a dozen siblings is trying to become one of 53 on Minnesota's season-opening roster.

Trying to land with the Vikings is an audible for the rookie who grew up as a Lions fan.

"I had to shed that one quickly," Christian said. "I'm always going to be appreciative of

that organization and what they did for my family, but other than that, that's as far as it goes."

We caught up with Christian recently for a Water Break, presented by Crown Royal.

Q: Despite your family's long experience with the NFL, has there been anything you've encountered that you didn't expect?

"The accountability they hold you to as a rookie. I was always taught, not from my dad, but in high school and college, that you give the younger guys a little bit of time. We got a little bit of that in rookie minicamp, but right after that, you're held accountable.

"That's the point. This is a job. It's a game, it's fun, but it's also work, so I had to figure out that balance because I was taking it more, 'It's fun. It's OK if I don't spend as much time on film and don't go as hard all the time because I'm a rookie.'

"One, that's a poor attitude. Two, that will get you fired, and three, I want to be the best I can be, so having that attitude is not going to

allow me to do that. Coach Adam Zimmer really drilled that into me. This is all fun and games, but it's also work. You have to do your job, study to know your plays so that when you're out there you're not a deer caught in the headlights, which I was like. It was a great learning curve, so I'm excited for the rest of camp."

Q: You have the opportunity to learn from Anthony Barr and Eric Kendricks. What have they shared about the lessons they learned a few years back?

"They've always been great linebackers, and it was comforting for them to be like, 'Dude, when I was a rookie, those first few practices, you mess up a lot.'

"Luckily they're so knowledgeable in the entirety of the defense from the safeties to the defensive line, so being able to work with them has been amazing, a gift from God, really, to be able to watch them and see them play. It really showed there's some guys that stand out there like Anthony and Eric who really have the athletic ability and the smarts. Something they

showed me, really, is the most important part is your brain, how you think on the field, the quicker you can react, because everybody pretty much has the same athleticism. Some are a little above, some are a little below, but it's all about your mental [game]."

Q: How wild was your pre-draft process with Idaho moving football to the spring and you having an improvised pro day?

"[My pro day] was a day-and-a-half after a game. I got through my pro day, and luckily God allowed me to perform. I was a little sore, but it worked out. It was a little hectic, and I don't know if I ever want to do that again."

Q: When your dad was in his pre-draft process, he had been advised to not do some workouts and later regretted the decision. Did that experience help push you through your workout?

"Yes. Something my dad always taught me that he learned at that stage is do whatever the coaches ask of you, because they're your employer, so whatever they ask, I'll do it. If they ask you to 'Carry this weight,' you say, 'How far?' "

Q: Based on Sports Illustrated's Prospect X reports, the third day of the draft sounded like it was pure chaos. Take us through what it was like.

"You never want to be that guy who falls through, but I ended up being that guy. Fell through and had like 14 teams calling me. I have one phone, so teams were like, 'I couldn't get ahold of you. I'm texting.'

"I ended up having to use my dad's and brother's phones, three phones going at once, and got down to four teams. [Vikings General Manager] Rick [Spielman] just really set it over for me. He knows my dad, and my dad knows him from the Lions days. Everything I've heard about Rick, he's an amazing guy. I wanted to be able to work with him."

Q: Do you get any swag, like a jersey, for your participation?

"It didn't really come with much. It was just a blessing to be recognized. I'm not a big social media guy."

Q: Was it tough to keep the fact you were Prospect X a secret?

"No, because at the time of the draft, I deleted all social media from my phone. I actually just redownloaded Instagram the other day just to start getting back into it."

Q: How important is your faith to you?

"It's huge. It's everything. Football is going to come and go. Money is going to come and go. If I'm smart, it doesn't matter when I die. I can't take anything with me. The only thing I can take is my heart and soul, so my faith is everything. God comes first, before relationships, before football."

Q: How long was your dad a chaplain with the Broncos?

"He did that for two years and then came out to Idaho. Now he's a chaplain out there. It's been awesome to see God's work out there, changing the culture of Idaho, because when I got there, it was not very good, but luckily everybody has had a change of hearts. Everybody is enjoying themselves now. A lot of people are going to Christ, so I'm loving it. I'm so proud of my dad and my family and the Vandals."


Q: Not many people know about Moscow, Idaho. What's the vibe out there?

"It's a small town. Everybody is friendly. Everybody is kind. There's some good underground eating spots, and then there's a lot of outdoor activities, so it's my kind of town."

Q: Given your ties to the Broncos, how special is it to have the joint practices and open the preseason against Denver? Did you go to many of their practices?

"I watched a few of theirs, and it was back when Peyton Manning was still playing, so it was awesome to be able to go there and watch him."

SUMMER SCHOOL WITH TIGHT END IRV SMITH, JR.

IRV SMITH, JR., WENT BACK TO SCHOOL THIS SUMMER. NO, SMITH WASN'T ON CAMPUS AT THE UNIVERSITY OF ALABAMA. INSTEAD, THE VIKINGS TIGHT END WAS A PUPIL AT TIGHT END UNIVERSITY.

The two-day session took place in Nashville, Tennessee, in late June. The meetup was spearheaded by two of the league's top tight ends: Kansas City's Travis Kelce and San Francisco's George Kittle.

Smith said an invite to TE U from Kittle popped up in his Instagram messages a few weeks before, and he was more than happy to accept.

"I heard they were doing something, and me and Kittle have a pretty cool relationship," Smith said. "He kind of let me know before, and he said they couldn't wait to have me there to be part of something special."

More than 40 NFL tight ends converged on the summit that honed in on route-running technique, classroom work and on-field demonstrations.

Kelce, perhaps the league's best receiving tight end, could be seen on social media showing the attendees how to firmly plant a foot in the ground and explode out of a route.

"He's definitely animated, a lot of energy," Smith said of Kelce, who has compiled five straight 1,000-yard seasons. "It was great vibes out there. Everybody was really selfless and just wanted to have fun."

Smith also took plenty away from Kittle, who has become a force through the air and as a blocker in San Francisco's offense over the past four seasons.

Kittle, of course, operates in Kyle
Shanahan's offensive scheme that has some similarities to what Smith

and the Vikings run in Minnesota.

"We pick each other's brains, for sure. He's had a lot of success in this league in similar offenses," Smith said of Kittle. "Just going back and forth, our favorite plays and our favorite routes and what we like to run. 'How do you get open on this play, against a certain defense when they show this look? How do you go about it?'

"Just cool little things like that because at Tight End U, it was all tight ends. We do a lot of the same things," Smith added. "It's not like it's a whole bunch of receivers and linemen and things like that. It's our position. It was super cool having everybody there and learning from each other."

Smith said he relished the generosity of the other players he spent time with.

"It was really cool just being around a group of guys that all play the same position but are all selfless players," Smith said. "Talking about the importance of the position, different offensive guys do different things ... some guys are more blockers and some guys are more receivers. Just getting a true sense of the success other guys have had, plus the success that I've had, and kind of talk about that and build on that so we all be the best versions of ourselves."

But make no mistake about it, Smith wasn't there just to learn. He had plenty of tips and tricks to pass along, too.

"Being with a group of guys like that, at the end of the day we're all competitors, so we wanted to show our own abilities and what we can do out there," Smith said. "It was just cool watching some of the best at the position. But for myself, I feel like I have the ability and a chance to also be counted up with those guys."

As Smith enters Year 3 in Purple, many expect him to have a breakout season in 2021.

He will certainly have the opportunity to do so now that he is firmly entrenched as the Vikings No. 1 tight end. (Veteran Kyle Rudolph, who spent 10 years with the Vikings, is now with the Giants).

And Smith's first chance to show the league who he is comes in the Vikings preseason opener against the Broncos, a team that will always provide a special memory for the tight end.

Back in the 2019 season, Smith and his teammates stunningly trailed 20-0 at halftime of their Week 11 game against Denver at U.S. Bank Stadium.

It was Smith, then only a rookie, who provided a jolt of energy with a 10-yard touchdown catch from Kirk Cousins early in the third quarter to finally get the Vikings on the board.

His first career score prompted a small celebration and ignited a thrilling comeback.

"We were down by three scores ... Kirk delivered the ball and I ran a post route, caught it in the back of the end zone," Smith said. "It kind of brought us back and brought a big spark to the whole stadium and the whole energy of the team.

"It was awesome with my first touchdown being such a key play to getting us a victory," Smith added. "And it really helped in leading us to the playoffs."

Smith recently reflected on how far he has grown from that moment 21 months ago to where he is now.

"I just try to take one day at a time. Each day and each practice, that's a new day," Smith explained. "That's the beauty of [training] camp. Let's say you had a great practice today, you can't come back the next day and practice terrible.

"You have to be where your feet are but also have fun," Smith added. "Football is a child's game and is something that we love to do."

Perhaps no player on the Vikings roster has stacked more strong days of camp together than Smith, who has stood out nearly every day with his ability to stretch the field, move the chains or find the end zone.

Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer has noticed, whether that's Smith hauling in a one-handed score near the goal line or scooting down the field for a big chunk of yards to move the chains on third-and-long.

"He looks a little bit quicker and faster to me – running routes a little bit faster, setting guys up a little bit better, as well," Zimmer said. "He's very confident; he's catching the ball really well."

Other Vikings players and coaches have been impressed, too. That includes Vikings linebacker

Anthony Barr, who shook his head a bit when asked about the difficulties of trying to keep up with Smith all over the field.

"It's tough, man. He's a great player. He's grown a lot from last year and the year before that," Barr said. "I think he's going to have a huge role this year. Just really excited to watch him.

"It makes us better as defenders trying to cover him," Barr added. "He can do so many different things and line up in so many different areas. He's a really good guy and a really good player."

Smith will be counted on to lead his position group in his third NFL season. He'll do so with a strong mentality of what it takes – Smith's father, Irv, was the 20th overall pick of the 1993 NFL Draft by New Orleans and played seven seasons in the league.

But he'll also be viewed as an integral part of the offense at the age of 23. The youngest player taken in the first two rounds of his draft class, Smith just celebrated his 23rd birthday on Aug. 9.

"We ask the guys to lead with production. That's how you're going to be a leader on the team," Vikings Offensive Coordinator Klint Kubiak said of the team's approach. "We don't care what you say. We care about how you act and what you do on the field. Irv has produced since he's been here."

Fellow tight end Tyler Conklin has seen Smith grow on and off the field in recent seasons. Conklin noted that Smith has never been as positioned for a potentially big season as he is now.

"I think the big thing for just the tight end position in general – and I think Irv would probably agree with this – is we just do so much on the field, whether it's the run game or the pass game or pass protection," Conklin said. "Just becoming more comfortable with the playbook and learning how the game is played and learning all these different pieces. I think that's how he's probably grown the most.

"I think that allows you to be more sure of yourself, which allows you to play at full speed. He's definitely grown tremendously, and he's a heck of a tight end. The big thing for Irv is he leads by example," Conklin added. "He practices his butt off, he works his butt off, and he leads by doing things the right way and practicing and competing as hard as he does. I think that just rubs off on other people around him and our room specifically."

Through two seasons, Smith has compiled 66 catches for 676 yards

and seven scores in 29 games.

And as the regular season looms, few would be surprised if Smith's production as a receiving target takes a big leap.

Now viewed as the prototype NFL tight end with a blend of size (he is 6-foot-2 and 240 pounds), athleticism and strength as a blocker, many expect Smith to become a household name in the coming months.

Not that the easygoing and affable Smith has his sights set on a bevy of personal accolades.

Even with his role about to take off, Smith will keep his lessons from summer school close.

"My dream season? Win the Super Bowl. That's the main goal," Smith said. "If we do that, my personal goals will take care of themselves.

"I want to show that tight ends are some of the most athletic players on the field. I feel like we are weapons out there," Smith added. "We're not just receivers and we're not just blockers ... we're out there and they put us all over the field — out wide, in the slot, in the backfield, with our hand in the dirt. That's something that no other position does, so I feel like it's special and something we take a lot of pride in."

The custom T-shirts said "STRAIGHT BASS HOMIE," offering a spinner on one of the most famous lines ever uttered by Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss.

People who know Moss from near and far have probably seen the "Straight cash, Homie," clip, and they likely know his passion for fishing.

There's a good chance, particularly in Minnesota, that they also know about the receiver's deep relationship with intrepid reporter Sid Hartman, whose final column with the *Star Tribune* appeared on Oct. 18, 2020. Hartman passed away later that day at age 100 but not before leaving a lasting legacy with "close, personal friends."

The value that Moss and Hartman each placed on loyalty made the connection stronger.

"It goes a long way. ... When you look at Sid and his history and how long he was a journalist, what else does he need to do to make a name [for himself]? The only thing he had to do was just continue to keep it real with the players, and I think that's what he was able to do," Moss told Vikings.com.

"Where I come from, we call it 'keeping it real.' In common terms, you call it loyalty. He was a loyal man.

"Just hearing Chad [Hartman] talk about how loyal his father was and what we as athletes in the state of Minnesota, not just football players, everybody, meant to him meant a lot to hear because I gave him utmost respect, no matter what it was," Moss added.

Moss aligned fishing and fellowship with former Vikings teammates and Twin Cities athletes in tribute to Hartman on July 28.

He rounded up Vikings Legends Daunte Culpepper, Jake Reed, Robert Smith, Scott Studwell, Pete Bercich and Todd Bouman, as well as former Twins Joe Mauer and Al Newman, Minnesota Wild defenseman Matt Dumba and former Gophers and Timberwolves big man John Thomas to partner with guides.

A heavy rainstorm hit as boats were scheduled to depart Lord Fletcher's to scour Lake Minnetonka for bass, but the tournament was able to proceed. Uncommon to most fishing tournaments, each contestant was given a Mystery Tackle Box from the subscription service and challenged with using something inside the kit to lure fish.

Bouman had a successful day teaming with Studwell and winning first place with a total haul of 14 pounds, 8 ounces to narrowly edge the team that featured Dumba (14 pounds, 6 ounces). Reed's team totaled 13 pounds, 14 ounces for third place, and Thomas reeled in the biggest single bass (4 pounds, 2 ounces) of the day.

A luncheon, during which players shared their favorite memories of Hartman, followed.



The Straight Bass Classic will be accompanied by an upcoming online auction to raise funds for the DYRK1A Syndrome International Association. Hartman's 20-year-old grandson, Quintin, has faced numerous health problems caused by the extremely rare condition brought by a change in the DYRK1A gene.

After hearing stories from the Vikings Legends about what Sid Hartman meant to them, Chad Hartman shared the courage Quintin has shown his entire life.

"Quintin had some health challenges right from the start. We couldn't quite figure out what was going on, and we were surrounded by great doctors and great help," Chad Hartman said. "His heart stopped at one point, and he couldn't feed. He had awful reflux and was in and out of the hospital over and over again, and we just couldn't figure out what was going on.

"We have so many categories to place individuals in due to health issues. Quintin

was unknown, in this different category, and it was an incredible challenge, but it was also the most amazing fortune I've lived," Chad Hartman continued. "There are people in this room who are heroes to so many people. I have one hero in my life, and that's [Quintin]. The pain he has had to deal with, the surgeries he's had to deal with. He's on the autism spectrum, but every single day is happy and kind. He suffers seizures and had leg surgery four years ago and couldn't walk for six months."

Quintin was able to say "thank you" on behalf of himself and others with DYRK1A Syndrome. His tone was quiet, but the gratitude filled the banquet room.

"At the end of the day, when you come together for a great cause like this and just hear the stories, you feel the emotions in the room," Moss said. "I think it's great to be a part of something like this and to be able to raise money for the DYRK1A foundation. It's always

great to be part of a great cause, and to come up here and honor Sid Hartman, that's what I like."

Moss reminisced about creating Randy's Purple Pioneers as a rookie with guidance from former Head Coach Dennis Green, the Vikings Ring of Honor inductee who initiated the Vikings Community Tuesday program that has influenced other NFL teams.

And he was happy to have help from other Vikings Legends who didn't blink when asked to participate.

"You've got guys like Culpepper, who didn't hesitate. Robert Smith didn't hesitate. Stud' didn't hesitate. Stud' played way before us, and for him to come back and be part of the executive office and still be a part of it, once you're in the helmets and pads, it's a brotherhood for life," Moss added. "I hope this isn't a one-time thing and that we can continue to do something like this."

HONORING

KOREY STRINGER'S

LEGACY

Cris Carter still remembers the final conversation he ever had with his friend Korey Stringer.

Carter in No. 80 and Stringer in No. 77 crossed the pavement together – like every day of training camp – to the practice field on July 31, 2001.

"We talked about the kind of shape that he was in and about how he was really looking forward to the season," Carter recalled.

The Vikings offensive line had been shaken up during free agency, and Stringer anticipated an additional leadership responsibility a year after Randall McDaniel signed with Tampa Bay.

"It was time for him to be even more of a vocal leader. Because he didn't have to do that before," Carter told Vikings.com. "But hearing him verbalizing that - and we really had a lot of great leaders, like Randall, that he was following in the footsteps of. So that was going to be an adjustment."

Carter can still picture the field's layout. The way he and the other receivers snagged balls zipped through the JUGS machine not far from where Stringer worked on his footwork and hand placement.

"We were both just getting some extra work in for practice. Just like people had taught us, and just like you were supposed to do," the Hall of Famer said. "Never in my wildest imagination did I think that would be my last conversation, or did I think catching balls on that JUGS machine and him hitting the bag would be the last time I would see him alive.



"Those will be my lasting conversations and lasting memory of 'Big K,' " Carter added, heaviness evident in his voice.

Fellow Hall of Fame receiver Randy Moss holds a similar moment close to his heart.

"The memory that stands out is seeing him, before we went to practice, he had his arms [outstretched] over the big, long bleacher," Moss told Vikings.com, extending his own arms to full wingspan. "I said, 'You ready big fella?' 'Yeah, I'm ready.' We're going out there, and that's the last time I was seeing him or speaking to him."

A BELOVED TEAMMATE WITH A GRAVITATIONAL PULL

August 1 marked the 20th anniversary of Stringer's tragic death less than 24 hours after collapsing at Vikings Training Camp in Mankato.

Former teammates deeply miss their friend. They have preserved fond memories.

Bubbly. Smiling. Gentle giant. Made everybody laugh. Silly.

You'd be hard-pressed to find anyone who disliked the fun-loving, joke-cracking Stringer who grew up in Warren, Ohio, and shined for the Buckeyes before Minnesota drafted him 24th overall in 1995.

Randall McDaniel took Stringer out to lunch shortly after the draft, and it became clear from the get-go that Stringer was a "great man" beyond his football skills.

"His personality – it just shined through. Always laughing, always smiling, always could make you feel better," McDaniel said.

Longtime Vikings equipment manager Dennis Ryan reminisced about Stringer's knack for impersonations – specifically Fat Albert – and other entertainment he provided, creating a gravitational pull in the locker room.

Moss also expanded Stringer's plethora of

"He could sing," Moss said. "He knew music, loved music and could rap a little bit, so I just enjoyed the time we spent. The times that can't be replaced.

"We have a lot of [game-day] memories, me jumping up in his arms and things like that, but those will last a lifetime," Moss added. "The ones you will never get back are when you spend the time away from work, away from the game, and get to know each other. And that's what me and 'Big K' were able to do."

Former Vikings running back Robert Smith played with Stringer at Ohio State before reuniting with him in that locker room prior to Stringer's rookie campaign.

"Big K" was just plain fun to be around, Smith explained.

"Always that way. Just such a genuinely good and fun person," Smith said. "We'd always come in and we'd talk about 'South Park.' I remember the movie 'Half Baked' was part of the line of jokes we'd use so many times."

And to Smith's recollection, Stringer never actually uttered the running back's first name.

"I don't know that Korey ever called me Robert," Smith laughed. "My nickname at Ohio State was 'Juice,' and then that name carried over to the pros, as well; a lot of nicknames do that. And then the other one was just a silly name – he'd call me Rupert, on purpose. It was never Robert; it was either Juice or Rupert."

Late last month, Jake Reed's eyes glistened as he stood just feet from Stringer's "Frozen in Time" ice column exhibit at the Minnesota Vikings Museum.

He tries not to think about it, he says. Twenty years later, the memory of losing his friend to heat stroke complications at the age of 27 remains raw and painful.

"It was one of the worst days in football in my life. I hate thinking about it. When I saw his picture over there, I said a little prayer," Reed said. "Because Korey was an unbelievable guy. Because when you see a player like that – Korey was big, strong, healthy, in-shape. That can't happen. If that happened to him, it can happen to anyone. It was so mind-blowing.

"Every time you hit that practice field, you thought about Korey. Every time you had a hot practice, you thought about him," Reed added, his voice trailing off.

A GENEROUS LIFTER OF SPIRITS

Stringer's football prowess spoke for itself.

Despite being the youngest of the group, he immediately fit in with an offensive line that featured (from left to right) Todd Steussie,

McDaniel, Jeff Christy, David Dixon and Stringer.

He was part of the historic 15-1 1998 Vikings squad and helped Smith notch four consecutive seasons with 1,000-plus rushing yards.

generosity and heart much bigger than his jersey size.

Stringer cared for and respected everyone, whether that person was a fellow first-round pick or an unknown name signed as an undrafted rookie. He looked out for every one of his teammates, whether he'd known them 10 years or 10 minutes.

When Culpepper was drafted 11th overall by Minnesota in 1999, Stringer was one of the first who made an impression on him.

"Me coming in as a rookie, he kind of put his arm around me and said, 'Hey man, if you have a tough day, don't worry about it.' He was one of those guys that motivated from a gentle angle," Culpepper said. "He was kind of like a gentle giant. That's what I would call him."

Amidst the fame and fortune that comes with being a first-round pick in the NFL, Stringer never lost sight of what truly mattered. He regularly participated in Community Tuesdays, investing in the young people and families around him, and he gave generously.

Following his Pro Bowl appearance in 2000, Stringer didn't hesitate to sign the \$15,000 check over to a youth football program in his hometown.

"He was a great man and a great football player – and that combination is [often] taken for granted," Carter said.

LEGACY OF HELPING OTHERS

Just before the July 31 Night Practice at TCO Stadium, fans turned attention to a videoboard tribute recognizing the 20-year anniversary of Stringer's passing. A moment of silence followed, and eyes cast on a pair of No. 77s painted on the field at the 25-yard lines. Another No. 77 was added to the grass berm that rises above the Vikings practice fields.

Perhaps the greatest way in which Stringer's memory lives on is through Kelci Stringer, who worked to develop an exertional heat stroke prevention institute to honor her husband's legacy. Kelci teamed up with exertional heat stroke expert Douglas Casa, Ph. D, ATC at the University of Connecticut, and the Korey Stringer Institute became a reality in 2010.

The Vikings and the NFL Foundation teamed up with the Korey Stringer Institute to create the Korey and Kelci Stringer Athletic Training Scholarship with an initial \$50,000 endowment. The scholarship will be awarded annually to benefit athletic training students in partnership with the National Athletic Training Association (NATA) Research and Education Foundation.

And while Stringer's life can never be replaced, his teammates realize that even after his passing, he's managed to do what he always did best: help others.

"[Korey's death has] completely changed the way that people look at heat-stroke deaths and the way that people talk about hydration," Smith said. "Something that 20, 25 years ago was used as punishment, even, at practice – withholding water – is something that's changed to, 'It's important for you to stay hydrated for your health,' and it's actually become something that people focus on for improvement of performance. It's a pretty dramatic change."

Family members, teammates from multiple levels of football, and connections from all three of his NFL cities were able to get the band back together.

A rock concert-themed party planned by Hutchinson's wife, Landyn, and hosted by the couple at Royal Docks Brewhouse + Cannery with assists from the Seahawks and Vikings brought the fire so great that Guy Fieri was happy to support his friend.

Royal Docks customized cans of IPA and Lager with an intimidating picture of Hutchinson and lighter-hearted quotes before transforming into Club Seventy Six.

Martin's Bar-B-Que Joint made the trek from Nashville, Tennessee, to serve meat from a whole hog, and Skyline Chili served up some dogs. Tacos from one food truck delivered, and another served ice cream sandwiches that used thin layers of cookie dough.

Members of the Wolverines 1997 National Champions team reunited, and 2021 Hall of Fame enshrinees Peyton Manning, John Lynch and Charles Woodson were among the NFLers who came to show their support.

As one T-shirt available at the complimentary, show-style merch stand proclaimed, it was "All for the Hall" – and for Hutch.

Hutchinson received his Gold Jacket earlier that night. His enshrinement, when his bronze bust was unveiled, followed on Saturday. He is scheduled to receive his Hall of Fame Ring of Excellence this fall.

Stewards understand significant events that preceded them. More importantly, they preserve and try to improve conditions for those who follow. Since becoming the owners of the Vikings in 2005, brothers Zygi and Mark Wilf and their cousin, Lenny, have earnestly spoken about their stewardship approach and made financial and other commitments to support their caretaking efforts.

That has continued with a \$1 million donation to the Pro Football Hall of Fame to fund the new "NFL Owners: The Founders and Stewards of America's Game" exhibit.

Zygi Wilf traveled to Canton, Ohio, last week to celebrate the enshrinement of former Vikings guard Steve Hutchinson as a member of the 2020 class and the grand opening of the exhibit.

"Since our family became the stewards of the Minnesota Vikings in 2005, we have been honored to support the Pro Football Hall of Fame," Wilf said. "The work of The Hall is critical to pay tribute to the heroes of pro football and to preserve the game's rich history. Honoring and supporting our Legends and those who have come before us is extremely important for my family and all of us in the NFL.

"The story of football, however, can't be told without recognizing the individuals who laid the foundation of the National Football League and those who carry it forward today," Wilf continued. "Our family is humbled to be part of that. We are proud to join all of you to officially unveil the Pro Football Hall of Fame 'Founders' exhibit."

He joined Pro Football Hall of Fame President and CEO David Baker for a tour through the space that has transformed the original portal to the Pro Football Hall of Fame into an homage to the sport's past, a link to the NFL's present and a gateway to its future.

The space is located at the former front doors to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, which opened in 1963 in Canton, Ohio, more than four decades after the meeting that immediately established the American Professional Football Association on Sept. 17, 1920. The upstart league was renamed the NFL in 1922 and is now preparing for its 102nd season.

Just beyond two sets of double doors is where enshrinees – the likes of Fran Tarkenton, Alan Page and Bud Grant – formally delivered acceptance speeches. On hot enshrinement days, distinguished guests would pass through those portals to cool, stepping over the original logo for the Pro Football Hall of Fame that was inlaid in the floor and remains exposed.

"It's very appropriate to be here and be at the former entrance where they held the ceremonies right outside these doors and to have the original welcome plaque," Wilf said. "To see all of the faces of the former teams' owners brings back a nostalgia that I always carry with me as part of my passion for the game."

The recognition of Hutchinson and the Centennial Class, as well as the ribbon-cutting, were delayed a year by the COVID-19 pandemic. The eventual occurrence of those events is a reminder of perseverance that helped the NFL grow and gain traction as America's most-watched professional sports league.

"This is a good day. You can see we have a lot of people coming back to the Pro Football Hall of Fame," Baker said in a soothing tone that offsets his towering frame. "Thanks to the generosity of Zygi, Lenny, Mark and the Wilf family who have such great respect for the history of the league, we have the 'Founders' exhibit, which is all about the owners and what they did."


Nods to the past include photos of some of the earliest owners and transformative leaders. A space lists the 14 original teams from 1920, which included the Chicago Cardinals franchise that is now in Arizona and the Decatur Staleys led by founder, coach and player George Halas. That squad changed its name to the Chicago Staleys a year later and adopted the Bears nickname in 1922.

An interactive display screen covers each team's history of ownership.

The "Foolish Club" which founded the rival American Football League to begin play in 1960 and challenge the NFL is also recognized. The AFL invited a Minnesota franchise, but organizers withdrew after Halas helped convince the NFL to place an expansion franchise before the 1961 season.

The service and sacrifice of more than 1,200 who delayed, interrupted or canceled their NFL careers to serve in the military during World War II is also noted.

Born in 1950 in Germany to Holocaust survivors, Wilf immigrated to the United States. His family first settled in Birmingham, Alabama, before relocating to



the New York/New Jersey metropolitan area.

Wilf explained during the tour that his father's business partner introduced Joseph Wilf to American football and that the construction company, Garden Homes, built houses for some of the New York Giants players. Joseph Wilf envisioned an opportunity for his family to better adapt to Americanization through football when the Giants played at Yankee Stadium.

"He made us very passionate about the game and the sport and about our teams," Wilf said. "We carry that over as an important factor of being an owner, to have the passion, and he certainly gave it to us by introducing us to this great game."

Wilf also explained that his father had an opportunity in 1961 to buy the New York Titans, a Foolish Club franchise that soon became the Jets, but said, "What do I know about the football business?"

In celebration of the NFL's 100th season, the Pro Football Hall of Fame shipped a 1920 Hupmobile, which is usually displayed in Canton in honor of the automobile showroom in which league founders met, to 2019 Annual League Meeting for a photo with an ownership representative from each team.

The photo, executed despite logistical challenges, is used as a wall graphic for part of the exhibit to recognize the current stewards who helped the NFL navigate the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 without missing a single game.

"We are deeply grateful to the Wilf family, not only for the quality organization that they run with the Minnesota Vikings but also for the values that they espouse in their company, in their philanthropy, in everything they do," Baker said, before adding:

"These are the kind of people who should be owners in the [NFL], and we need more like them, along with the other owners we have."

WHY DID YOU DECIDE TO PURSUE A CAREER IN NURSING?

I've known I wanted a career in the medical field for as long as I can remember. For a while, I thought I would be a doctor. However, I took a class called Orientation to Healthcare Careers my junior year of high school, and I loved the direct patient-care aspect and the many different roles that come with nursing. The shorter length of school helped a little, too (laughs).

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART ABOUT THE WORK YOU DO?

So far, it's doing the little things for my patients. A typical patient expects the basic cares from his or her nurse, but I always try to go a little above and beyond - whether it's simply taking extra time in a patient's room to ask them about their family, helping them groom their hair or assisting in other self-care measures. ... 




