

NORTH STAR VS. LONE STAR

SUNDAY, OCT. 31, 2021 | U.S. BANK STADIUM

The stage of NBC's *Sunday Night Football* seems just right for the stars to shine. Representing the North Star State, Minnesota (3-3) will host Dallas (5-1) from the Lone Star State as the teams meet in football's grandest regular-season setting for the second time in three seasons.

The Vikings and Cowboys feature quarterbacks playing at a high level with Kirk Cousins and Dak Prescott, as well as dynamic dual-threat running backs Dalvin Cook and Ezekiel Elliott. The squads also have impressive top receiver tandems formed by an established vet (Adam Thielen for Minnesota and Amari Cooper for Dallas) and second-year pros (Justin Jefferson and CeeDee Lamb) who have built on incredible debut seasons.

It's a cast that would make one think tonight's contest will be a fantasy football free-forall. That is until one considers that Minnesota, particularly at home, and Dallas have been able to make quarterbacks quite uncomfortable.

Don't forget to keep an eye on the goings-on up front from time to time to see how the offensive lines are faring. If the unit and players go unnoticed, it's probably a really good thing, as was the case during the career of Steve Hutchinson, who will be presented his Pro Football Hall of Fame Ring of Excellence during halftime.

opponents to 16.0 points per game and not
allowed more than 17 so far this season.
That's after allowing 31.1 per home game in
2020 without fans in attendance. That will be
challenged tonight by a Cowboys attack that
has averaged 28.0 in three road games so far.

PRODUCTS OF PRESSURE

The Vikings are tied for first in the NFL with 21 sacks, just 2.0 shy of their entire season total for 2020. The Cowboys, however, have only surrendered 9.0 sacks this season, the same as Minnesota.

Dallas has logged 11 sacks (tied for 28th) on the year but has the same number of interceptions, which leads the NFL and is in large part thanks to the seven recorded by Trevon Diggs, the younger brother of former Vikings receiver Stefon Diggs.



MILESTONE MOMENT

Cousins threw his 200th career touchdown against Detroit on Oct. 10, becoming the 47th player in NFL history with that many through the air.

PLAYER HIGHLIGHT

Cousins is preparing to lead the Vikings out of their bye by replicating the play he delivered between Minnesota's 2020 Week 7 bye and this year's. In his past 16 starts, Cousins has completed 402 of 580 passes (69.3 percent) for 4,559 yards with 37 touchdowns against only five interceptions for a passer rating of 110.3.

An interesting Next Gen Stat for Cousins during his hot start to 2021 has been his average time to throw this season, 2.64 seconds, which is tied for the fifth-fastest among 33 qualifying passers.

That's much faster than 2019 (3.01 seconds) and 2020 (2.88).

Tonight's game will be Cousins' 10th start against Dallas and third with Minnesota. Since joining the Vikings, he has completed 45 of 62 passes (72.6 percent) for 534 yards and five touchdowns, good for a passer rating of 125.3 against the Cowboys.

PLAYER HIGHLIGHT

Selected in the fourth round of the 2016 NFL Draft with the 135th overall pick, Prescott became a starter as a rookie. His role has grown from being viewed by some as a game manager to a two-time Pro Bowler and a candidate for Comeback Player of the Year.

Prescott has returned from an injury in Week 5 of 2020 and completed a career-best 73.1 percent of his passes with 16 touchdowns and a passer

rating of 115.0, which ranks fourth in the NFL entering Week 8.

His 39 games with a passer rating of 100-plus in 75 career starts ranks third all-time. Only Aaron Rodgers (43) and Tony Romo (41) had more in that span.

THROWBACK MOMENT THRICE NICE FOR RICE

The Vikings defeated the Cowboys 34-3 in the Divisional Round of the NFC Playoffs on Jan. 17, 2010, thanks to three touchdown catches by Sidney Rice and a strong defensive performance.

Rice caught scoring passes of 47, 16 and 45 yards from Brett Favre, who added

an 11-yard score to Visanthe Shiancoe that became the final touchdown in a playoff game at the Metrodome.

Rice became the fourth of seven total players to catch three touchdowns in an NFL playoff game.

Ray Edwards also recorded a trifecta of his own with 3.0 sacks of Tony Romo to set a Vikings record for a postseason game since 1982. Romo was dropped for losses six times and intercepted by Ben Leber.



Dede Westbook lights up when talking about football. But his enthusiasm for cars just might rival his love for the gridiron.

"It's been around since high school,"
Westbrook said. "I've always loved vehicles.
Old-school cars."

The Vikings wide receiver, who is currently restoring a 1976 Cadillac Sedan deVille, recently took that off-field passion and started his own mobile detailing company. Westbrook's Go Crazy Mobile Detailing business launched Monday in the Oklahoma City metro area.

"Man, I love cars. All types of cars. So, what better thing for me to do – obviously, when I'm done playing ball – than to get out there and wash cars?" Westbrook said. "I love washing my own cars, taking them to the car wash. I spend hours at a time, you know what I mean?

"It's something that I love to do," Westbrook said. "So why not put a name on it and run with it?"

A pair of friends are helping out Westbrook while he goes through his first season in

Minnesota after signing as a free agent at the start of training camp.

But make no mistake about it, the 27year-old will be heavily involved in the Oklahoma-based business when the offseason rolls around.

And Westbrook is bringing a hands-on approach to his new company.

"I want to be different. I want to go out and meet these different people I'm doing business for. Have a chance to get to know me and who I am as a person," Westbrook said. "I don't want them to just sit there and watch me wash their vehicle. I want it to be a family thing, family oriented.

"If you come and do business with us, I want us to get to know each other on a personal basis. It's not just me taking your money," Westbrook added. "This is my job, and I love the game. It's a little kid's game. We all love it and grew up loving it ... but I want people to know that I'm a person you can talk to about anything on the face of the moon. I want to reiterate that whenever I'm out detailing cars."

As for the name of his mobile detailing business? That's a phrase that Westbrook has relied on for a while.

"It's a slogan I've been using since my junior year in college," Westbrook said.
"Whenever I go out on the field, that's one of the mentalities I like to live by as far as going crazy with everything that I do. I just put that in my everyday life.

"I've got a clothing brand that's 'Go Crazy.'
I've got a food truck that's being ran in my
hometown called 'Go Crazy.' Any kind of soul
food you're looking for. And then we have
seafood on Saturdays."

Westbrook hails from Cameron, Texas, which is about 75 miles northeast of Austin and less than 150 south of Dallas. But the former University of Oklahoma standout now resides in the Sooner State, as he bought his "forever home" in Moore, Oklahoma, a few months ago.

If you're ever in the area and need your car detailed, Westbrook is your guy.

We caught up with Dede this week for a Water Break, presented by Crown Royal.

Q: Your Instagram profile includes photos with music superstars Lil Wayne and Drake. Do you know them well?

"Yeah, I'm signed with Young Money, and Wayne is obviously the CEO of everything [with that label and sports agency]. Me and him have a real good relationship. Whenever he's in the area or around town, we meet up and talk business and different things. Drake is an add-on branch of Young Money."

Q: What's the best life advice you've gotten from Wayne?

"Oh man. Pretty much everything outside of

football. Just getting your stuff together outside of football. He wasn't an athlete, so he made a living somewhere else and has different businesses outside of his artistry. He's instilled the same thing in me."

Q: How do the Twin Cities compare to Jacksonville off the field?

"It's a little different. I haven't had the chance to get out much, but I just found out that you guys have a Sonic. I'm a big Cherry Limeade guy. I love Sonic, but it's about 20 minutes away from my house. That's big for me."

Q: You won the 2016 Biletnikoff

Award at Oklahoma as college football's best wide receiver. Where is that trophy?

her house [laughs]. She's got a special spot for it. I tried to sneak it out one night and she caught me on camera. I don't think it's going anywhere."

Q: Finally, with tonight's game on Halloween night ... are you big into celebrating it?

"Man, I don't watch scary movies. I don't do anything Halloween stuff. I'm super scared. If I'm watching Halloween movies, it's got to be at 10 a.m. And if it's at night, I have to sleep with all the doors closed. No, I can't do that."



Head Coach Mike Zimmer? Smart.

General Manager Rick Spielman? "His intelligence."

Well, you get the point. Maybe X – it's pronounced in his name – marks the smarts.

Minnesota signed Woods this offseason to pair him with Smith as it injected multiple veterans into the secondary.

All of the above credited Woods' smarts for his quick start that includes intercepting Kyler Murray

in Week 2 and forcing a key fumble by DJ Moore at Carolina in Week 6.

Asked about the source, Woods explained, "I would say just my study of the game. I study this game so much.

I've watched a lot of film over the course of the years, and repetition and confidence also plays a part and just seeing things over and over again.

"Offenses run the same plays,"
Woods added. "They just run them
different ways and set them up
different ways, so I would say
studying and the repetition."

Originally a sixth-round pick by Dallas in 2017 out of Louisiana Tech, the 26-year-old credited Kris Richard, his Cowboys position

coach from 2018-19, with boosting his ability to "put things together and

really learn what an offense tries to do and how an offense tries to break a defense down or attack a defense or scheme a defense runs."

During free agency, the Vikings combed through all of the Cowboys game film to assess Woods and look past what Spielman described as "a little bit of a down year" in 2020 to project how he'd fit here.

"We saw a lot of the physical traits and characteristics that we look for in that position,"

Spielman said. "He came in here, he's a great communicator on the back end, and he has the athletic skill set, and you see him, especially over the last two weeks, getting more and more comfortable in the defense and making all the calls and the adjustments.

"The chemistry that's created between him and Harrison, between him and the secondary, that continues to evolve, and you're starting to see that as he progresses through the season," Spielman added. "He's played especially well these past two weeks."

Smith said Woods hit the ground running in the film room, easily walking through approaches to potential scenarios.

"He's always really alert with those things. On game day, safeties need to talk to each other quite a bit," Smith said. "He's always yelling to me and seeing if I have anything to say back, things like that. Pre-alerts in the huddle and things we have to remember. He's a very smart guy."

Asked what stands out about Smith, Woods said, "How smart Harry is."

He elaborated that Smith's intelligence borders on clairvoyance or a sixth sense.

"I mean, I see the field and I study it a lot, and I see things how offenses see things, but Harry sees it before it even happens," Woods said. "Harry is just a smart football player, and I've been blessed enough to be in this position to learn from him and see how he works and studies and practices and sees things and to be able to add that to my game."

Adam Zimmer said Smith can ease things for any safety that is paired with him but added, "I prefer it be with somebody like Xavier."

"I think [Smith] had the same relationship with Anthony Harris last year, so I think Harrison will make it work with whoever he's lined up with, but having a guy like Xavier is really valuable for us," he noted.

The synching of the safeties happened almost instantly, back to their first time on the field together in the spring for Organized Team Activity Practices.

"It is rare. I remember the first OTAs, it's a brandnew system to Xavier, and he's making all the calls and communicating with Harrison,"
Adam Zimmer said. "That shows how
smart Xavier is, number one, but also
how they can help each other over the
training camp and OTAs and all the
practices that we have – I think they've
just jelled immensely."

Thielen also took notice of Woods' presence at those practices.

"From the first day he got here I remember [thinking], 'Yeah this guy's pretty dang good.' [I went up to] Harrison and [said], 'Man, this guy's really, really good.' "Thielen said. "And just how he plays the game. How he's able to see the field, how he's able to take away certain things that we're trying to do. And then now for him to go in there and show it on game day. What a great addition to this team. [We're] lucky to have him."

In addition to his normal film study,
Woods will bring in-person knowledge of
the multiple threats the Cowboys pose.

Quarterback Dak Prescott has a passer rating of 115.0 this season, which ranks fifth in the NFL. Receivers CeeDee Lamb (497 yards, four touchdowns) and Amari Cooper (373 yards, four touchdowns) and tight end Dalton Schultz (359 yards, three touchdowns) have moved the ball and put points on the board.

And running back Ezekiel Elliott has rushed for 521 yards and five scores through six games, enjoying a Renaissance with the return of Prescott from an injury in Week 5 of 2020.

It also will be a reunion with former teammates in the Cowboys secondary like C.J. Goodwin, Jourdan Lewis and Anthony Brown. Woods teamed with Goodwin for his final three seasons and with Lewis and Brown every year he was in Dallas.

Woods said he didn't really talk to other Vikings teammates who have faced their former teams this season, but he noted they showed their desire with their demeanor throughout the week of preparation.

He might be tempted to talk a little trash, but the most important words will be for his current teammates to help earn bragging rights over his friendly first-time foes.

"He's a very smart guy, as far as knowing what he's got to do immediately and being vocal about it, too," Kendricks said, "He lets you know what he thinks, as far as what we should be playing. When you get that clear communication, it's easy to play with someone, whether you're right or wrong."

THE MINNESOTA MOVE

A FAMILY AFFAIR

The move to Minnesota for Xavier Woods has been one of several transitions for the native of West Monroe, Louisiana, and his family.

Attending college at Louisiana Tech
(30 miles west) enabled Woods to play immediately as a freshman.

"My family was able to come to every game, and I was able to go home when I wanted to and not be too far away but be just far enough away where I could still get that college campus life and the independence of being away from parents," Woods explained.

Opening his career with Dallas with home games 301 miles west of his hometown also enabled his parents to catch games before the COVID-19 pandemic struck in 2020. Now, they've been able to venture north. Tonight will be the third of four home games they've attended.

"They love it out here, but the weather is just different," Woods said. "I told them it will probably be a lot colder than it was (Oct. 10)."

Woods said he enjoyed summer and fall and will do his best to embrace a winter unlike any he's ever experienced.

"I love the weather so far," he said on a pleasant October day. "I don't know about when it starts to snow and stuff like that. I think I've seen snow probably a handful of times in my life. It probably sticks for two days, but out here, they say it sticks for weeks, but I'll adjust."

Woods and his wife Destiny are parents of two young daughters, Dallas-Karstyn, 2, and Zailyn-Karter, who will be 1 in November.

The couple has their hands full "every single day."



NO MASQUERADE ALL BALL

Dalvin Cook doesn't recall ever masquerading as an NFL player on Halloween.

Maybe it's because, deep down, he knew he'd be one himself someday. After all, Oct. 31 is all about make-believe.

Cook opted as a youngster to dress as different "characters," usually a superhero with some type of special power.

He remembers trick-or-treating one year as Spider-Man, donning the red-and-blue suit and imagining he could swing from building to building, or scale the tallest skyscrapers in The Magic City, his hometown of Miami.

When it came to the football field, though, Cook never had to pretend. He just made things happen. His earliest football memory is playing on a team at 4 years old with his older brother. The pint-sized athletes nearly made it to the championship his first season, he recollected, but lost to a team they'd previously defeated.

Emotions ran high.

"Down in Miami, all of us knew each other growing up. The team we lost to was a good team, but we had beat them earlier in the season," Cook said. "I just remember all of us crying. We were just kids, you know? We were just crying, snotty noses..."

He tipped his head back and laughed at the memory clearly replaying itself in his mind.

"The next year we came back and won it," he said, "but it defined us, starting off early in our career."

Whether 4 years old or wearing No. 4 at Miami
Central High School and Florida State, every chapter of Cook's football career has been special to him.

He fondly recalls Friday night games under the lights; as a senior at MCHS, he helped the Rockets finish 14-1 and rank No. 8 nationally among Division 6A schools.

After the games, Cook would meet the rest of his family back at the house to (usually) celebrate a win and discuss that evening's game.

Cook said it "brings back memories" whenever friends and family attend Vikings games now at U.S. Bank Stadium.

'THE TEAMMATE' ISN'T A COSTUME

He'll have a fan club here tonight for the *Sunday Night Football* matchup against the Cowboys. And while the contest certainly isn't Cook's first prime-time performance, he's anticipating something special about the Vikings first home night game in front of fans since the 2019 season.

I reminded Cook about his review of the last time
Minnesota and Dallas met for *Sunday Night Football*– a hard-fought game at AT&T Stadium in which Cook
helped the Vikings defeat the Cowboys 28-24.

"That was really my first time ever [playing in that] stadium and it was packed with fans, and seeing the [mega videoboard] lit up," Cook had said. "It's a fun stadium to play at."

He appreciated the everything-is-bigger-in-Texas pomp and circumstance, but Cook said nothing compares to U.S. Bank Stadium, where the Vikings are hosting the Cowboys this time around.

"It'll be even better," he said, grinning. "Because it's here"

"I think how our stadium looks at night, it's so crazy. It's overwhelming," Cook said. "I'm expecting a crazy



atmosphere. The first Sunday night game back with the fans. It should be pretty epic. Our first three home games were loud, and I'm expecting this one to be even louder."

After a 2020 season in which the COVID-19 pandemic forced stadiums around the league to be empty – or very nearly so – Cook

has found himself even more grateful than he already was for home-

"When they're so loud [for opposing offenses], it helps us so much," Cook said. "Them being gone, we felt it. I know I felt it. "It's been fun having

"It's been fun having them back, and I haven't really gotten a chance to go out there and turn it loose in front of them yet," he added. "I've been kind of banged up these first three home games, so I'm gonna have a

three nome games, so I m gonna have a chance to go out there and be full-strength – turn it loose, and it should be fun." That's the thing with Cook – football always has been fun for him. Those who get to know him understand that he really does seem to be built for the sport.

He's an athlete, yes. In 2020, he ranked second in the NFL with 1,557 rushing yards and tied for second with 16 rushing touchdowns, showing Spidey Senses for the end zone.

He's a competitor, absolutely.

But honestly, above everything else? He's a teammate.

A question was posed to Cook: "What does it feel like to get the ball in your hands and see a path to the end zone?"

His answer might not be what you expect. Because really, it has nothing to do with the spotlight and truly is quite the opposite.

"It feels great, just knowing ... all the hard work from the guys up front," Cook said. "I think about them a lot. Their work up front is a lot different than what we do. I put in my head, 'They do so much work up front, and I've got this much room to work, and they've done all that work. The next step is for me to do my part.'

"Once I see a hole open up, I try to do as much as I can," he continued. "All the guys around me are working so hard for this space right here to be open for me to have the ball, and that's just a great feeling. To be able to lean on other men and for them to be accountable for their jobs and assignments. I try to take full advantage of mine

when I get the opportunity."

It's a sentiment that goes a long way with his colleagues.

"When somebody of his caliber, of his talent, is that willing to give credit to the people around him, it makes me want to play even harder for him," fullback C.J. Ham said. "I think a lot of euys could probably second that."

'JUST BE ME'

Halloween is all about facades, face paints and disguising one's appearance. But his whole life, Cook has never put on a mask – with the exception, maybe, of Spider-Man or The Incredible Hulk. From his rookie campaign until now, he's consistently emphasized the importance of being authentically himself.

Whether on the field, in the locker room with teammates or FaceTiming with a loved one, Cook says he focuses on not stepping out of character.

"I just want to be a better 'me' every day. I wake up, and I try to better myself every day. And that's just, 'Be a better version of Dalvin.' I'm not gonna be nobody else," Cook said. "It helps you knowing who you are, because you can just go freely about a lot of things. I feel like I am natural-born leader, and I feel like that just comes out of me [organically]. I don't force it.

"I work hard every day on just being me. Just being around the guys, joking around, just having fun – I try to be that 110 percent every day," Cook continued. "You can't be 'this' person and then be 'this' person the next day. I try to be as consistent as I can."

When Cook stays true to himself is when he's at his best, even on the field. Watch the 26-year-old on game day, and it's clear that he's in his element when he's got his cleats laced up and the ball in his hands.

Cook announced earlier this month that come next season, he'll be swapping his No. 33 jersey for No. 4. The NFL's adjusted number rules are allowing him to pay homage to his roots and return to the single digit where it all started.

But don't worry – he'll still be the Dalvin Cook we all know and love. And for now? "The Chef" is just

trying to keep things rolling for Minnesota. He's raring to go tonight, already anticipating the electric atmosphere of a jam-packed U.S. Bank Stadium.

"It's fun. Especially when I've got my family there," Cook said. "And me, when I'm on the field, I'm letting my emotions out. I like to show my emotions when I come out of the tunnel and just be me."

For the Vikings, there will be no costumes, pumpkin-carving or collecting candy tonight.

"But I've definitely got some tricks for Dallas," Cook said. "Trick or treat, Dallas."

STEYE HUTCH INSON

A DIFFERENCE MAKER

By the time Steve Hutchinson arrived in Minnesota in 2006, he had earned multiple monikers, including All-Pro and Pro Bowler.

Those distinctions of national recognition continued for multiple seasons, but more importantly for Vikings teammates, coaches and staff, Hutchinson was a difference maker.

The ripple was felt from his first practice, through his final snap in Purple. His impact lasted beyond his career, visible in the play of those he influenced, as well as their community commitments that he inspired.

The guard combined technique, power and determination during his 12 NFL seasons, demonstrating the heart of a Hall of Famer whether or not others were watching.

The ultimate confirmation of this began at 3:35 p.m. (ET) on Feb. 1, 2020, the eve of Super Bowl LIV near his hometown of Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Hutchinson received "The Knock" from Pro Football Hall of Fame President David Baker, informing his election as the 335th member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Baker has since retired but is scheduled to be here tonight to present Hutchinson with this Ring of Excellence, the third element bestowed to a Hall of Famer. The Gold Jacket and bronze bust are the other two.

While Hutchinson was one of the fastest guards ever elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the Class of 2020's enshrinement weekend in Canton, Ohio, was postponed until this August because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

It just made everything sweeter for Hutchinson and his family. Wife Landyn, daughter Lily and son Luke had been in the hotel room when Hutchinson received the news and guest starred in a video that went viral. Speaking of them from the enshrinement stage stopped Hutchinson in his tracks, which isn't the easiest thing to do.

"Lily and Luke, I thought the days you were born were going to be the best two of my life," Hutchinson said from the stage, choking up. "That was just the start.

"Lily, when I look at you, I see so much of myself. You are strong, brave and beautiful," he continued. "That little girl who stole my heart has grown into a young woman I am extremely proud of. Always maintain that passion, that fire and that great personality,



and forming a great team that enabled him to focus on his career to reach his on-field goals.

"You always found a way to lift my spirits after a bad game, bring me countless bags of ice after numerous surgeries, raise two great kids and somehow find a way to have dinner made, errands run and handle the bills all while having that unmistakable smile on your face," Hutchinson said. "I could talk for days about how much you mean to me, but you already know that. I'm incredibly proud to be your husband, and I love you."

Hutchinson started all 169 regular-season games he played for Seattle, Minnesota and Tennessee. He helped Shaun Alexander and Adrian Peterson lead the NFL in rushing in separate seasons, and he garnered seven Pro Bowls and five First-Team All-Pro selections. Hutchinson went entire seasons without committing a penalty twice. It made for a life of anonymity in the eyes of many fans while delivering a technical excellence backed by brute force.

"There's different types of players, but he would be considered a mauler," Robbie Tobeck said in a video that presented Hutchinson for enshrinement before helping unveil his former teammate's bust. "It's not always good enough to just block a guy. Steve wanted to finish a guy.

"Getting into the Pro Football Hall of Fame is a dream for some and a goal for others," Tobeck added. "Steve came in from day one, 'I want to be the best in the league. I want to be a Hall of Famer.' Those are stated goals. You really have to

admire a guy like that who is willing to come out and have the courage to put himself out there and have the courage to do the work that it takes to be there."

Hutchinson was a significant factor in the Vikings improving from 6-10 in his first season to 8-8 in 2007 and 10-6 with a playoff appearance in 2008. The progression led to a 12-4 showing in 2009 when Minnesota advanced to the NFC Championship.

"I just believe it all starts up front. He was a tempo-setter, much like when we got Jon Runyan in Philadelphia," said Brad Childress, Minnesota's head coach during that climb. "It changed our whole line. I can say the same thing about Steve being here. It enhances everybody. His toughness is legendary and is legitimate."

Childress said Hutchinson demonstrated an authentic professionalism that others emulated.

Vikings General Manager Rick Spielman was in his second year as Minnesota's Vice President of Player Personnel when Hutchinson signed.

"He was a true pro's pro, and we had a lot of young guys at the time coming into the league," Spielman said. "Him taking that leadership and them watching him and how he approached the game, how he prepared every week, how he took care of his body and how he played on Sundays. I don't think there was anyone out there who played as hard as Steve Hutchinson did. When you have a running back like Adrian Peterson at the time, a lot of Adrian's success, even though he's a phenomenal athlete and a great running back, you've got to give credit to Steve Hutchinson."

Peterson joined Minnesota in 2007 as a firstround pick and quickly backed it up with help from Hutchinson's blocks, including Nov. 4 of that year when Peterson rushed for a single-game record of 296 yards against the Chargers. The running back sent a congratulatory video.

"You were durable, you were accountable, you were physical, you were technique sound. You were one of those guys that did it the right way every time you stepped on that field. Your presence was felt," Peterson said. "When I lined up behind you, I knew when I ran to the left side, I had no worries. That's just a testament to why you're in the position you're in now. I'm so pumped up for you. You deserve it."

Linebacker Chad Greenway was selected 17th overall in 2006 - the same spot that Seattle had used to draft Hutchinson five years earlier. Greenway said in Canton that it was a point of pride to earn his way into Hutchinson's inner circle as a "very impressionable" voung plaver.

"I was a better 17th overall pick," Greenway joked. "I think he would tell you the same thing. He would be honest about it

"I think when you're a linebacker going against an offensive lineman, you understand that you're going against something different," Greenway said, pivoting from humor to reflection. "There's a lot of players that I could beat and beat repeatedly and get my way, and there's guys that played across the league - Brian Waters with the Chiefs was different, and Steve was that guy. To get to play against him in practice and really sharpen your iron against the best in the world. Steve was certainly that.

"He was so strong and built unlike anybody else, and I think the way that Steve separated himself to me was his ability with his mind - a very smart guy, always had his body in the right position," Greenway added. "So he had the physical ability that he was born with and worked for but also the mental capability to be ahead of you. I think that was always the challenging part of going against him in practice."

Long snapper Cullen Loeffler was in his third season when Hutchinson signed. He said "every good team is built on the big men," and Hutchinson "was such a

consistent and unbelievable player."

"He just brought this level of tenacity and consistency that everyone looked up to and just tried to match," Loeffler added. "A lot of us failed in doing that, but he was just a tremendous leader, a guy that was a no-b.s. guy and was the embodiment of what the Minnesota Vikings are. He just provided tremendous leadership, and that's why he's here (at the Hall of Fame)."

John Sullivan teamed with Hutchinson for four seasons, including three as Minnesota's starting center. Sullivan said Hutchinson's legacy stuck with him.

"The impact that he had didn't require me to see him on a daily basis," Sullivan said. "Once he had moved on, the impression that he left was set. He was amazing in the building and outside the building, treated everyone well and with respect. People enjoyed being around him, and he had a big heart and gave back to the community in Minnesota."

Fellow Hall of Fame guard Randall McDaniel's 14th and final season in the NFL was Hutchinson's first. McDaniel said Hutchinson had the requisite "nastiness to go after guys."

"We're the hammer and everybody else is the nail. That's why I loved the way Steve finished blocks," McDaniel said. "No one knows what we're doing out there unless we're doing something wrong, but in the end, your teammates know, and he's right where he should be [in the Hall of Fame]. He's on that team now."

When K.J. Osborn moved to Minnesota last year, he felt pretty alone.

The Vikings had tabbed K.J. in the fifth round of the 2020 NFL Draft, but the COVID-19 pandemic forced an all-virtual offseason, which meant the receiver didn't relocate to the Twin Cities until August.

"We couldn't even go to our teammates' houses at that time," he recalled. "So I'm just a kid in Minnesota, from Michigan, and I didn't know what was going on, I didn't know anybody."

K.J. also found himself emotionally navigating increased societal tensions following the murder of George Floyd.

"There was so much going on, and I would just be at home [by myself]," he said.

K.J. tried to get into TV shows but "isn't really a big TV guy." He pivoted to purchasing a piano and downloading an app to learn the instrument. Still, he struggled with the boredom and isolation.

He decided he'd get a dog during the offseason ... or, almost during the offseason.

"I actually was supposed to get him after [the regular-season finale] when we played the Lions," K.J. explained. "I went to the breeder and said, 'OK, I'm gonna come back next week to get him' – and then I just took him home that day. Ever since then, he's been my guy."

His "guy" is Larry, an 11-month-old English bulldog who will turn 1 on Nov. 11.

The wrinkled, tan-and-white pup has no doubt changed K.J.'s life for the better.



"Whether I have a good or bad day, Larry's always happy for me when I come home," K.J. said. "He's waiting for me at the door, jumping on me, happy, ready to go outside, ready to play. He just gives me that company."

You wouldn't know it if you saw the duo together, but Larry is K.J.'s first-ever pet.

"I never had a fish or a snake or a bird," he laughed. "My family didn't have pets growing up, so this is my first pet ever. I tried to do it the right way – I did a lot of research. My plan was to do a lot of research, get his bed, get everything, go get him and then bring him home.

"I was just so excited when I saw him," K.J. added.
"It was him and his sister, and I almost bought
both. I just grabbed him, and we went straight
from the breeder to the store and got his bed and
pads and everything, and I just kind of learned on
the fly. I think I'm being a good dad."

Watch the way Larry acts around K.J., and there's no question. The two are the perfect pair, whether playing tug-of-war with a rope toy, walking through a park near K.J.'s apartment building or "just chillin," Larry's head resting comfortably on his dad's knee.

A timid, 6-week-old puppy – "the size of my foot," K.J. remembered – has now grown into nearly 60 pounds of muscle.

But don't let his sometimes-grumpy expression and burly bod fool you. Larry is still just Larry.

"I get a bunch of comments on his name, all the time. Every time they ask me [his name] and I say, $\,$

'Larry,' they giggle," K.J. said. "But it really fits him! It fits his personality, it fits how he looks. I'm really glad I named him Larry.

"I've thought about creating an Instagram account for him, but I never did. People just kind of live through my social media to get to him," added K.J., who has dedicated an Instagram Highlight to Larry. "I get a lot of questions about him, though – 'Can you post Larry?' 'We need more Larry content.' So I'll try to give the people what they want."

Asked to compare the bulldog to one of his Vikings teammates, K.J. gave it some serious thought before answering.

He first admitted he sees a lot of himself in Larry before settling on a personality in the defensive backs room.

"Larry, he's lazy, but then he likes to get going ... I feel like that's me. When I get on the field, I'm going, going, going. But I was telling Adam [Thielen] and Justin [Jefferson] when I get home, I'm lazy. I just want to chill and relax," K.J. said. "But thinking about my other teammates, I would say ... Off the top of my head, I would say maybe Cam Dantzler. On the field, he's going; at practice, he's going; he's goofy, he can be silly and funny; but if you see his demeanor sometimes, he's just lollygagging along. He's just chillin'. So I would say Cam."

K.J. loves the English bulldog breed but did offer a reminder for anyone considering a pup like Larry: bulldogs often face unique health challenges. Over the past year, K.J. has had to put Larry on the Injury Report after undoing eye surgery, as well as having a hernia repaired.

"He's been a warrior, but it's a lot of ...
responsibility. He gives me that. That's something
that I would say, just be aware of the health
issues," K.J. said. "But other than that, he's fun.
He's my best friend. He jumps around, but when
he's tired he's just gonna lay down and chill.
I love him."





One recent Saturday the Vikings fullback welcomed two teams from the Jimmy Lee youth football program that has been a storied part of the St. Paul Parks & Recreation Department, which had received a \$25,000 youth football grant from the Minnesota Vikings.

"The money helped us have free football for all of the kids in St. Paul, so there was no charge for the football fees that are used for officials, administrative things and equipment costs," said Citywide Programs Supervisor Mike Whaley. "The money makes football really accessible for kids."

More than 300 youth participated in the St. Paul Parks & Recreation youth football programs this fall.

"We're super appreciative," Recreation Services Manager Andy Rodriguez said. "It's a great opportunity for us to showcase some of the St. Paul kids to come out to this beautiful facility."

Ham told the youth, "These years that y'all are in are some of the greatest years of my football experience."

"I've been playing football for a long time,

ever since I was 10 years old, and I still have so many memories of playing with the Green Machine back in Duluth in the West End," Ham said. "I still have so many friends, coaches that I talk to. These friends are going to be people that may be in your life for the rest of your life."

Ham explained how the team structure of football can enrich those relationships.

"I think football is one of the greatest sports ever created," Ham said. "But the thing about football is once we're done playing, if you make it to high school, if you're blessed to play in college, if you're blessed to play in the pros, once you are done playing, it's not something that you can just go to the YMCA and do like basketball, so don't take these moments for granted. Have fun doing it."

Sharing those fond thoughts was only one way the clock turned back to Ham's youth.

The Q-and-A session took it another notch, with enthusiastic hands reaching skyward.

The first questioner asked if Ham watched Elmo when he was little.

The father of three laughed before stating he was "more of a Power Rangers guy," specifically the Green Ranger.

Other questions included how long he's played and if he likes playing fullback.

The answers to those are since fifth grade and a resounding yes.

"It's not a position that is flashy," said the

former running back who converted after joining Minnesota as an undrafted free agent in 2016. "Not every NFL team has a fullback, so it's a small group of guys, but I love playing it."

Youth football also may have been a good indicator for the physicality that Ham would bring to the pros.

After all, he survived a collision with a former teammate named Bubba and got tasked with playing linebacker.

"The hardest-hitting guy on the team," Ham said. "I ran him over."

As Ham transitioned from the Green Machine to the Denfeld Hunters to the Augustana Vikings and finally here, he's always looked up to Jerome "The Bus" Bettis for the way the Pro Football Hall of Fame running back played the game. Now, this group of youth can recall the time they met "The Hammer."

"It means a lot to me because I know how important football is for myself and for these kids, to teach them about life," Ham said. "For the Vikings to care about that and take the time and make sure that these kids have the necessary things to get rolling means a lot."



This wasn't the average trip to the dentist. No, this was a special visit for 300-plus kids, who went through a one-stop shop that TeamSmile created earlier this month at U.S. Bank Stadium.

The organization travels across the country and partners with professional sports teams to host all-day dental clinics.

"We throw dental tailgate parties," said John McCarthy, the Executive Director of TeamSmile. "We work with teams in the NFL, NBA, MLB, MLS and NHL ... we provide free dental care for children in need throughout the country through partnerships with these professional sports teams.

"In essence, we try to make dental care cool and fun and exciting for children," McCarthy added. "Just take the fear out of dentistry. And in a great stadium like U.S. Bank Stadium ... we're [able to do] that."

TeamSmile partnered with Park Dental and the Vikings to make sure the kids were taken care of in the Delta Sky 360° Club, just steps from the field and near where players walk out for pregame warm-ups.

The goal is to reach children who may not take regular trips to the dentist.

"We're teaming up with the Vikings and TeamSmile to provide care for these kids who may not see dental care throughout the year," said Park Dental President Chris Steele. "It's a unique opportunity for us to help them out.

"There's always a huge need," Steele later added. "And that's one of the things the dental community struggles with ... we're always looking for ways and access points."

Vikings Executive Vice President & Chief Revenue Officer John Penhollow said the organization was proud to partner with TeamSmile and Park Dental for the inaugural event.

"It's another opportunity for the Vikings to get into the community," Penhollow said. "Unfortunately, this has been a hard stretch here with the pandemic, so dental care for both children and adults has been something that some have avoided."

The children in attendance received the full treatment, from check-in to X-rays, plus an exam and visits with a hygienist and dentist.

And professionals from Park Dental were on site in case any extensive work was needed.

"Once we diagnose what they need, we're able to treat them here," McCarthy said. "Whether they need a cavity or root canal or an extraction, we're able to do that on-site here at U.S. Bank Stadium.

"And it's completely free," McCarthy said. "We just want to take care of the children."

The health aspect was just one part of the visit, though. The young people also were treated to arts and crafts, plus the chance to run around and play catch on the U.S. Bank Stadium turf.

And their smiles were even wider when Justin Jefferson showed up to hang out along with Ihmir Smith-Marsette, Troy Dye and Camryn Bynum.

Was Jefferson a fan of the dentist as a kid?

"Absolutely not," Jefferson said with a laugh.
"I know how uncomfortable it is, but this
environment alone lets them ease up a little bit
and lets them have fun, but also get their
dental care."

Smith-Marsette added: "It's very impactful. They don't know that yet, but looking back I know they'll say that this meant a lot."
