

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

A HISTORY HERE

Fitzpatrick's first career touchdown occurred at U.S. Bank Stadium when he returned a pick 50 yards for a touchdown as a member of the Dolphins in a 41-17 Vikings win on Dec. 16, 2018.

PLAYER HIGHLIGHT

The Steelers acquired Fitzpatrick in a trade with the Dolphins in September 2019. Just a couple of games into his second season with Miami, the 11th overall pick of the 2018 NFL Draft headed up to Pittsburgh. Adding Fitzpatrick has worked out well for the

Steelers. He recorded five interceptions, including one he returned 96 yards for a touchdown, in 2019 for Pittsburgh.

Fitzpatrick has added six more interceptions since 2020 and has been selected as a First-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowler in each of the past two years.

He is tied with Marcus Peters for the most defensive touchdowns (four) since entering the

NFL in 2018, and his 13 total takeaways since 2019 rank second.

At Alabama, Fitzpatrick won the Chuck Bedarik Award (nation's top defensive player) and Jim Thorpe Award (nation's top defensive back), becoming the third player in NCAA history to win both awards. Hall of Famer Charles Woodson and Vikings CB Patrick Peterson are the other two.

CHRISTIAN DARRISAW

Christian Darrisaw always knew that once his dream of making it to the NFL was realized, so too would be his dream of making an impact in and around his community.

For the Vikings rookie left tackle, that has meant giving back in Virginia, where the Maryland native attended college, as well as the community around his new home in the Twin Cities.

> Darrisaw was introduced to Ronald McDonald House Charities soon after graduating from Virginia Tech, where he started 10 games as the Hokies

left tackle in 2020 and was a First-Team All-ACC selection. Ronald McDonald House Charities is a unique nonprofit that has a presence in more than 62 countries around the world and operates three main programs:

325+ Ronald McDonald House programs provide comfort, support and resources to families who travel far from home for the medical care their child needs.

265+ Ronald McDonald Family Room programs provide comfort to families in hospitals, giving them private places to relax or decompress.

45+ Ronald McDonald Care Mobile Programs bring medical, dental and health care resources to underserved communities where they're needed the most.

We recently caught up with Christian for a Water Break, presented by Crown Royal, to discuss his desire to make a difference and why he's representing Ronald McDonald House Charities on his cleats for tonight's game.

Q: What drew you to Ronald McDonald House Charities, and how have you been involved?

The "I didn't know anything about Ronald McDonald House until my marketing advisor presented it to me, and I knew it was the one I wanted to do. The kids, they're going through rough times, and their family might not be able to [afford housing nearby on top of medical bills]. For them to take whole families in - provide meals, a place to stay, stuff like that - it's really unique. That's what drew my attention right away. They were the first charity I got partnered with right out of college ... it felt like the right fit, the right choice, for me. I donated \$15,000 during the bye week, and we're doing a challenge, a workout fitness challenge, to raise money for the Ronald McDonald House Charities of Southwest Virginia "

Q: Were you involved in community work during your time at Virginia Tech?

My 2019 season, we did a turkey giveaway for Thanksgiving. Last year we weren't able to do much because of COVID-19 and everything."

Q: Where does this desire to give back come from?

"It's just the platform that I have now,

and the ability, really. People look up to me, and giving back to the community is something that, when I was growing up, I was seeing other NFL players do, and I looked up to them. I wanted to be in their shoes, be in their position, so it's something I've always wanted to do. I told myself if I had the opportunity to do it, I would."

Q: Were there specific athletes you saw in your community?

"Not really anyone specific that came back to my community. [NBA Star] Kevin Durant is from P.G. (Prince George's) County [where I went to high school], maybe Kevin Durant. Not everybody is fortunate enough to grow up and have everything they need, so for those lessfortunate kids, to be there and be a light, just help provide for them, anything you can do, it helps them and their families."

Q: Why do you believe it's important for athletes to give back?

"Not everyone comes from an upper-class or middle-class family. Some people might not even be having [basic needs]. So being able to do this kind of stuff, especially around the holidays – there might be kids who only get one present, maybe two presents. Growing up, I was an only child, so I was very fortunate to get anything I wanted, and I knew it wasn't like that for all kids. So being able to provide, just give back something, I feel like it makes a difference

for those kids who need it."

Q: You've mentioned the 'culture' of the Vikings offensive line group off the field. How do you see that show up on a daily basis?

"We have a fine jar for our room, and at the end of the year, we take the money and donate it to a cause or charity. You can tell even by that, the [older players] aren't just spending money or blowing it on stupid stuff. I just feel like anytime they have the opportunity to give back, they do it."

Q: This is your first My Cause My Cleats experience in the NFL; what do you appreciate about the initiative?

"It's pretty cool to see all the different guys and the charities they're working with and partnering with. To see everybody's cleats this weekend, it's pretty cool to see all the different designs, the variety of charities and why they're wearing those cleats."

Q: What do you plan to do with your cleats following the game?

"I'm going to give them back to the Ronald McDonald House in Roanoke, Virginia, and they're going to auction them off."

WHY JUSTIN JEFFERSON
WAS MADE FOR THE NFL

Justin Jefferson's shimmering career thus far – the recordbreaking rookie season, the spectacular catches and newfound stardom – was all part of the plan. It had been in the works for years, more than a decade.

Put another way, the Vikings second-year wide receiver was made for this. Made for the NFL.

"He was bred to be a main contributor," Jefferson's brother, Jordan, said. "His upbringing was for him to be the top guy."

The 22-year-old Vikings megastar explained it in his own words:

"It comes easier since I had two older brothers that did it before me," Jefferson said. "They went through things before I did, made mistakes that I got to learn from ... they paved the path for me and made it easier for me in my life.

"I've been in the right places at the right time, had the right coaches and teammates ... I've been blessed, honestly, for my whole career," Jefferson added. "But I have to keep paying my way."

The family history is well-known, especially down in his native Louisiana.

Jordan Jefferson started 32 games as LSU's quarterback between 2008-2011, going 24-8 as a starter for the Tigers. Rickey Jefferson, the middle brother, was a defensive back who played 37 career games and recorded four interceptions at LSU between 2013-2016.

Justin followed the same path as his brothers, from Destrehan High School just outside of New Orleans, to LSU, which sits just 75 miles up Interstate 10.

The wide receiver enjoyed plenty of college success, too, helping lead the Tigers to a 2019 national title and cementing himself as one of the nation's top playmakers.

But the similarities ended there for the brothers, as neither Jordan nor Rickey was drafted or played a game in the NFL. Justin was determined to change that trajectory for his family.

"What motivates me?" Jefferson said, repeating a question on a recent Friday afternoon at Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center. "I love the game of football.

"But also, my brothers not being able to live the same dream I have of being in the NFL and being a top pick," Jefferson added. "I want to let them live through me."

Jefferson did indeed make it to the NFL, as the Vikings tabbed him with the 22nd overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft.

The fifth wide receiver off the board, 18 different teams passed him up before he landed in Minnesota. (Miami, Jacksonville and Las Vegas each made multiple first-round picks before Jefferson's name was called).

Jefferson promptly outclassed the rest of his counterparts by setting a Super Bowl-era rookie record with an even 1,400 receiving yards. He added 88 receptions (which set a Vikings rookie record) and hauled in seven touchdowns.

Perhaps the sudden success surprised others around the league, but not the Jefferson family, which includes his parents, John and Elaine.

The roots for his phenomenal rookie season were actually laid a decade-plus prior in Baton Rouge, where an elementary schoolaged Justin got an up-close look at a blueblood college program.

"To be able to go inside of the LSU locker room when you're 8 years old? I didn't get that opportunity until I was 17," Jordan Jefferson said.

Justin hung out back then with Patrick Peterson, a two-time All-American cornerback who was Jordan's roommate. And there were a handful of other Tigers that eventually made their way to the NFL, too.

"The best of the best. The best players go there to play against the other best players in the country in the SEC," Justin said. "It was always a high standard at LSU, and that's one of the reasons why it was so easy for me to come into the league.

"I went up against top players every single week, and the NFL is the same ... going up against top players every single game," he added. "LSU definitely got me ready for it, but I'm lucky I got to see it at a young age."

Not that Jefferson was satisfied with that production in his NFL debut. He honed his craft this offseason and carried that worth ethic into his second year with the Vikings.

The result? Well, he's already surpassed the 1,000-yard receiving mark, joining Hall of Famer Randy Moss as the only Vikings players to hit the mark in their first two seasons in the NFL.

"One thing about J.J., he's not comfortable with who he is," said Vikings running back Dalvin Cook. "He just wants to get better. You see him in practice, man, he's flying around, running around.

"That's important, man, just to see somebody that's not complacent with their talent, and he's got a God-given talent," Cook added. "Hard work matches talent, and you've got a guy right there." Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer added:

"He's very confident. I don't think any of this stuff bothers him. He thinks he's a great player, and he is a great player. He really doesn't have any prima donna in him, as

far as not working in practice or being late or anything like that. He just goes about his business. I think he just loves to go play and loves to practice, and I think he loves the limelight, too. I think he loves catching the ball and scoring

touchdowns.

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"The guys that you know are big-time players, they want the ball in the moment of truth," McCardell added. "If you want to judge a guy around the league, judge him by whether he steps up when it's time to, or whether he fades into the background. He's a guy that steps up all the time and wants it all the time."

Jordan Jefferson added: "He has that internal aspect of who he is helps make him the player he is. You can find anybody who is 6-foot-2 and 200 pounds. But to have the tenacity, the desire to be great ... that's something where he separates himself from a lot of wide receivers." Jefferson is now just 28 games into his NFL career. And he's kept up his record pace that he started as a rookie.

The NFL record for the most receiving yards by a player in his first two NFL seasons is 2,755 yards, and is held by Odell Beckham, Jr., another former LSU star. Moss, by the way, is

second on that list at 2,726 yards.

Jefferson has naturally drawn comparisons to Moss, who took the league by storm early on and eventually ended up enshrined in Canton, Ohio.

Jefferson recently paid homage to Moss by wearing No. 84's image on a T-shirt in warmups against the Packers, a team Moss routinely torched in his career. Jefferson then did the same, with eight catches for 169 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

Yet even though similarities will be made between the two, McCardell wants his wide receiver to simply focus on the task at hand.

"Randy is Randy ... a great, Hall-of-Fame receiver," McCardell said. "But Randy did what he did, and now Justin is doing what he's doing. It's a different time and era.

"I tell him, 'Just go be Justin.' He's his own receiver," McCardell added. "I want Justin

Jefferson to be Justin Jefferson. That's it."

Jefferson has interacted with Moss a few times since being drafted, and said he's well-aware of the elite history of Moss, Cris Carter and other Vikings wide receivers in team history.

And yes, he said he knew he had to ball out if he wore a Moss shirt in warmups.

But Justin Jefferson accepts that. He also wants to do his own thing, create his own legacy. He's off to a good start.

"I'm not trying to be like anyone else. I have my own style, my own swagger," Jefferson said. "I definitely look up to greats like him, greats like Carter. But I don't try to imitate them. I try to be the best player I can be.

"[Moss] had so many different stats and achievements that he accomplished in his career. He has a Gold Jacket, and I definitely want that," Jefferson added. "But I just have to keep playing my own game. I think I'm doing pretty good so far."

The Vikings wide receiver will certainly have the latter part covered in tonight's game against the Steelers, as he will celebrate the league's My Cause My Cleats initiative by honoring Northside Achievement Zone.

Jefferson's multi-colored cleats feature a mix of green, blue and purple, with white shoelaces. And they also include the initials of his mom, dad and two brothers.

He aims to bring awareness to an organization whose mission is to end generational poverty and build a culture of achievement in North Minneapolis in which all low-income children of color arodusts from high school

ready for college or a career. Northside Achievement Zone partners with parents and scholars to overcome racial and income gaps in housing, employment, wellness, early childhood and K-12 education.

"I wanted to choose Northside Achievement Zone because I wanted to give back to the community," Jefferson said. "I always want to share my love around Minneapolis, and the Northside is really struggling right now.

"Just wanted to shed light on them and bring some hope to their community," Jefferson said.

SUPPORTING YOUNGER BROTHER'S WALK WITH AUTISM

Kene Nwangwu always knew his little brother, Odilinna, was special.

Odilinna wasn't exactly like all the other boys his age, but that never bothered Kene, who formed a deep bond with his younger brother at an early age.

As a child, Odilinna was diagnosed with Asperger's Syndrome, a high-functioning level of autism spectrum disorder.

"And growing up with him, I understood that he was different, but he's still my little brother," Kene said. "He's still like everyone else [in a lot of ways]. He's just unique. I've always wanted people to see him for him. Not just as, 'Oh, that dude's different.' Or, 'He's weird.'"

Kene explained that Odilinna, 17, often is hyperfocused on specific interests. from space to cars.

"And growing up, he really loved weather. I think he still does," Kene said with a smile. "Every time there's a thunderstorm, he opens the door and looks outside."

Odilinna isn't pursuing football like his brother did, but he couldn't be more excited about Kene's journey to the NFL.

"He's so supportive of me. He loves what I

do," Kene said. "I think he sees me as his best friend. And honestly, I see him as my best friend, too. I just love hanging out with him."

Kene is honoring Odilinna tonight by wearing custom-designed kicks repping the Autistic Self Advocacy Network.

ASAN's mission is to advance the principles of the disability rights movement with regard to autism. After researching a number of nonprofits around autism spectrum disorder, Kene found himself drawn to ASAN because it's actually run by autistic individuals.

Kene hopes that his story – and his cleats – will help remind people to act with gentleness and respect toward everyone, including those who have unique personalities, behaviors or disabilities.

"If I could deliver one message, it's really, 'Treat others with kindness.

Don't be quick to judge. Just see people how they are,' " Kene said. "That's how I want others to see my little brother."

SHINING LIGHT ON POSTPARTUM DEPRESSION

When Josh Metellus' wife, Haley, went into labor in April, the couple assumed everything would go smoothly.

But that unfortunately wasn't the case for the first-time parents.

After laboring and then pushing for some time, Josh and Haley's son became stuck. Doctors and nurses jumped into action to get the baby out as quickly as possible, and after an excruciatingly long 1 minute and 40 seconds, Joshua Syx Metellus was delivered but wasn't breathing.

The fear that goes through a parent's mind at that point is unfathomable.

Thankfully, doctors were able to get Joshua breathing soon after birth, and he's described by his dad as "perfect and healthy."

The trauma of such an experience, however, is not easily erased.

When Joshua was about a month old, Haley was diagnosed with postpartum depression and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). Josh and Haley were proactive at seeking professional help, which included counseling, for Haley during an incredibly difficult time. Now 7 months after Joshua's birth, Haley has made tremendous progress in her recovery from both conditions.

Josh said he and Haley were aware during pregnancy that 70-80 percent of new moms experience, at minimum, "the baby blues," while 10-20 percent will be diagnosed with clinical postpartum depression.

One study found that one in seven women may experience postpartum depression in the year after giving birth.

"Haley's very on top of stuff like that, researching. She's like, 'You know, we could have postpartum [depression],' " Josh said. "Nobody ever thinks it will happen to them. But it did. We were prepared for it, I would say, at least a little bit."

It's for that reason Josh is wearing cleats tonight for Postpartum

Support International.


"I just wanted to bring awareness to it. Because it is real, and although we did get help, we're in the process of [her recovering], there's still some people out here who aren't getting help," Josh said. "There's probably husbands or dads out there who don't know how to help their wives or girlfriends, don't know what they're going through. So I just wanted to bring awareness to it because it's something that hit home with us."

Despite a demanding schedule inseason, Josh supports Haley as much as he's able, from being a listening ear to taking over dad duty after work each day.

"Doing little things around the house, anything that can take the stress off her plate. The one thing I do when I get home, I'll take the baby off her hands and I'll let her do whatever she wants to do," Josh said. "If she wants to go to the store just to walk around, you know, something to get her head clear so she doesn't have to feel like the world is always on her shoulder.

"Just be there for her," he added.

"Ask her how she's doing, be
understanding – be a spouse; be a
partner; be a husband."

HONORING LATE COUSIN'S MEMORY THROUGH CLEATS

Andrew DePaola still remembers playing video games with his younger cousin, Bo. It wasn't often that he'd win.

"He'd always kick my butt, or any of the other cousins', in whatever video game we played. It was very frustrating, getting worked over by a kid seven years younger than me," Andrew quipped.

Bo loved playing the Xbox. He enjoyed lacrosse and baseball and loved his Jeep, his dog Tucker and the holiday season. His family describes him as empathetic, creative and funny.

Bo also struggled with mental illness that darkened some days more than others and stole joy from the little things in life. Bo attempted to overcome his mental health struggles but tragically passed away from an accidental overdose in 2015 at the age of 20.

In the wake of Bo's passing, his parents
- Andrew's aunt and uncle - established
Bo's Effort, a nonprofit dedicated to
assembling community resources to
break the stigma around mental illness
through education and guidance.

Andrew has been impacted by the loss of his cousin in more ways than one, and he's proud of the mission behind Bo's Effort.

"I think for so many years prior there was this thing, you know, 'Don't talk

about it. Hide your feelings, hide your emotions, just bury stuff down deep.' As we've seen, that really can lead to a lot more problems in life," Andrew said. "It's important to encourage people to talk about what they're going through. That really can be it. That can really be what helps someone overcome what they're fighting. Just having that outlet, getting it off your chest.

"For me, it's really kind of opened my eyes to this fact that just talking to someone – 'Hey, how's your day? How are you? What's going on?' – can really help someone out there. And you never know who you're helping," Andrew added.

Every season, Andrew participates in the NFL's My Cause My Cleats campaign and dons custom-designed kicks to shine a spotlight on Bo's Effort and its messaging.

He hopes to help bring awareness on a league-wide stage and continue breaking down the stigma that can surround such a difficult topic.

"I wanted to do something to use my platform a little bit, to try to get the word out there and help them as much as I could. If it helps to honor my cousin in some way and keep his name alive, that's fantastic. And if I can also help just one person, that's enough for me," Andrew said. "I know for my aunt

and uncle, they're great people who do a lot of great things. This is their cause, and I want to try to help them as much as I can. I think, also, just bringing Bo back a little bit is nice, too, and it helps them in a way."

Andrew appreciates the way more people are becoming comfortable with speaking about their own mental health experiences.

He especially believes it's an important subject to keep at the forefront within the NFL. After all, mental illness and its reverberations do not discriminate based on career, ethnicity or gender.

"I think people paint this picture of us like we're these barbaric giants that make a ton of money, so therefore our problems are gone ... but that's not the case," Andrew said. "At the end of the day, we're people outside of these walls. We have lives, we have families, we have obligations. We have responsibilities.

"Guys in this locker room come from all walks of life. Everybody has a different background; I mean, you'd be hard-pressed to find two guys in the locker room who grew up the same," he continued. "So you just don't really know what guys are dealing with, what walks of life they come from, and what's going on outside of these doors.

"Mental illness doesn't go away simply because you make a decent salary or because you're 'famous,' " Andrew emphasized.

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

REMEMBERING GRANDPARENTS WITH CUSTOM CLEATS

Tyler Conklin's grandparents will be on his mind and his heart tonight when he takes the field against the Steelers.

And thanks to the NFL's My Cause My Cleats initiative, portraits of Tyler's Grandma Judy and Grandpa Thurman Winfred Garner also will be on his feet.

Tyler this year is representing the Dementia Society of America, as he hopes to raise awareness around the condition that ultimately took his grandparents' lives.

The outside of the cleat that features Judith's face framed in loose curls includes a hummingbird – her favorite – and a brown cowboy boot in memory of Thurman, a North Carolina native.

Family means a lot to Tyler, who is grateful for the opportunity to have known both of his maternal grandparents, before and after their initial diagnosis.

According to the World Health
Organization, dementia is a syndrome in
which there is deterioration in cognitive
function beyond what might be expected
from the usual consequences of biological
aging. Dementia results from a variety
of diseases and injuries that primarily or

secondarily affect the brain. Alzheimer's disease is the most common form of dementia and may contribute to 60-70 percent of cases.

Judith passed away relatively quickly – Tyler clearly remembers hearing the news as a 16-year-old, on the eve his high school basketball team played in the semifinals. He has fewer memories of directly interacting with Judith, though during his childhood she often spent more time with the family.

Grandpa Thurman, he recalled, was a little more aloof in those years. So when his condition slowly deteriorated three years ago and his daughter Diana (Tyler's mom) moved him to Michigan to live with them, it provided an unexpected opportunity for relationship-building before his passing in April 2021.

"Even during quarantine and all of that, COVID, he was with us through it all," Tyler added. "I got to really get to know him and spend a lot of time with him."

Though decades separated him and his grandpa, Tyler has heard many times during his life about

similarities they shared. Look at photos of the two together, and a couple of those likenesses can't be missed.

Tyler has become known by Vikings fans for the locks of dark hair that flow beneath his helmet on game days. While the length surpassed that of his grandpa's, Thurman boasted a head full of thick hair long past the days it grayed.

"And we both have bushy eyebrows," Tyler quipped.

"My girlfriend Scottie always messages me about how I do stuff just like him," he added. "As we got older, we just had a lot of good times together."

The 29-year-old has committed to tackling poverty two generations at a time through his Raise the Barr foundation.

The cornerstone of his efforts is supporting single-parent students with scholarships and emergency grants that allow them to focus on their studies and families while reducing the amount they need to borrow or preventing an economic pitfall that could derail a semester of progress.

It's lofty and ambitious work for the 29-year-old, but it's also incredibly rewarding – not that recognition has ever been sought by the low-key linebacker.

Instead, he smiles when he sees families experience upward trajectories.

"It's always been about others," Anthony said. "It's never really been about me, whether it's football, family or community."

The Vikings on Tuesday proudly announced Anthony as the 2021 Vikings Community Man of the Year and the team's nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award.

BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS AND EMPOWERMENT

In some ways, it seems like just yesterday when Raise the Barr began its relationship

with Jeremiah Program with his very first visit in downtown Minneapolis.

He entertained youth with an animated reading of *The Pout-Pout Fish* and willed his 6-foot-5, 257-pound frame to crawl through a play tunnel at Jeremiah Program. Formidable on the field, Anthony is relatable and approachable to the children and their parents.

"I've kind of watched some kids grow up from when they were infants and now they're 4, 5 and 6 years old," Anthony said. "Seeing the moms establish themselves in the community as students and professionals and kind of take control of their own lives has been really cool.

"It's really about empowering people and giving people opportunities to succeed," he continued.

It was only natural that multiple Jeremiah Program residents and Raise the Barr scholarship recipients, some of whom overlap, helped deliver the news of Anthony's selection in surprise fashion.

They gathered on the concourse of TCO Stadium one Saturday this fall, the day before Anthony made his 2021 debut against Detroit after rehabbing a knee injury he suffered this summer and a torn pectoral muscle that cost him all but six quarters of 2020.

When Anthony walked onto the concourse, he was surprised

families, his mother, Lori Barr, and grandmother lean Barr.

Former college roommate and teammate Eric Kendricks, who joined the Vikings a year after Anthony and was named the 2020 Vikings Community Man of the Year, was among the crowd wearing custom No. 55 jerseys and clapping as Anthony realized what was happening and Jean approached to deliver the news.

"It is so exciting, heartwarming, very humbling to see where he started and what he's been able to accomplish," lean said during an interview.

Having worked as a preschool teacher, Jean "saw a lot of children as they were growing up, and to know they are being helped in any way possible is a very worthwhile cause."

Jean and her late husband, John, were instrumental in helping raise Anthony while Lori navigated the challenges of being a single-mom and student.

Lori described the pride she felt in seeing Anthony receive news of his nomination.

"I was a little sad that my dad, who was such a big part of Anthony's upbringing, couldn't be here physically, but I know he's watching over Anthony and sharing this from up above," Lori said. "But to be able to have my mom here, who I think I can say, it's not a secret that Anthony is her most favorite person on the planet, so for her to be

able to share today with him and celebrate him, I think this honor is really special."

TESTS OF PERSISTENCE

Lori and Anthony have long known that not everyone is blessed with the support they received. It's why they care so deeply about the cause and have been so committed to building authentic relationships in California and Minnesota, which has become his home away from home.

For a brief moment in the 2019 offseason, it appeared that Anthony was set to become a member of the New York Jets as a high-profile free agent.

But Anthony quickly became sickened at the idea of leaving Minnesota. He returned to the Vikings for less money and helped Minnesota return to the playoffs.

But 2020 hit, bringing the COVID-19 pandemic, which brought increased challenges to Raise the Barr's fundraising efforts and increased need.

The murder of George Floyd just a few miles from U.S. Bank Stadium caused a deep hurt and prompted Anthony and Kendricks to ask for a meeting with Minneapolis Police Chief Medaria

importantly prevent such a tragedy from happening again.
Anthony and teammates spoke up about injustices. He participated in virtual conferences to guide youth football coaches and continued virtually visiting young people detained at the Hennepin County Juvenile Detention Center.

Football season returned, but just six quarters in, Anthony tore a pectoral muscle at Indianapolis. He underwent the grueling rehab only to suffer a knee injury in August that sidelined him for Minnesota's first four games of 2021.

Anthony may not have verbalized the weight on his shoulders, but moms just know when their children are struggling.

"He's a very quiet person, and he carries his pain and his burdens deep within," Lori said. "It's been a real struggle. The last year was a real test of his will and his mental health.

"It was tough, but my thing to him has always been 'Eyes forward. God put eyes in the front of your head for a reason. Keep looking forward, keep working hard. There is a plan, and trust in it.' I think he did that, so he's here now," she continued.

TESTIMONIALS OF SUCCESS

While Anthony shies away from selfpromotion, the people he has helped readily credit his support for their success.

Tavia Paredes said scholarships have had meaning beyond the financial benefits. She has been able to balance caring for her 9-year-old son and her studies as a chemistry major

with a physics minor.

Paredes has been on the Dean's List since receiving her first scholarship from Raise the Barr. She is graduating and has an interest in pursuing a Master's degree in biogeochemistry at the University of Minnesota. She wants to apply that knowledge toward environmental science, social justice and tribal treaty law.

"I think the more abstract meaning behind [Raise the Barr's support] is faith and belief that I'm going to be successful," Paredes said. "That has been such a huge motivating factor, to have someone believe in you, especially when you are a non-traditional student and you feel like society is always going to doubt you for a lot of different reasons: being a mother, being a woman of color and studying sciences, being a first-generation college student."

Nikkia Collins originally enrolled in college with the goal of earning an associate's degree but decided she wanted to add a bachelor's degree.

"Financially, that probably wasn't the best move, being a low-income, single mom, so with the help of the scholarship, it allowed me to not have to pull out more loans and accumulate more debt," said Collins, who has a 3.91 GPA in her last semester of classes.

"It helps me to know that everything I'm doing is working and I'm on the right track," Collins said. "My goal every time I graduate or walk across that stage is to have the colored sash around me that shows I'm graduating with honors."

Collins intends to teach special education to help make sure needs are met.

Aaronica Jackson was able to finish her bachelor's degree a semester early because of the financial support from Raise the Barr. In addition to being an alumni scholar, she's also a Raise the Barr Board Member.

Jackson has launched her career in social work, helping people who are experiencing homelessness in Hennepin County. "I've always been a person that has been of service to others. That was something that I made a pledge when I was really young is that no matter what I was doing, how much money I made, I was always going to be of service to others," Jackson said. "Right now, specifically in Hennepin County, in Minneapolis, we have a huge homeless population, so in any way I can give back to my community, then I'm going to do that.

Jackson, who first began college in 2013 and resumed it in 2018, said the nomination for Barr is validating for the work that continues. She also enjoyed seeing "the reveal and kind of seeing him a little bit uncomfortable" from receiving the recognition.

"That makes me want to go twice as hard because he doesn't really want the credit," Jackson said.

A SPACE TO GROW AND THRIVE

This fall, Raise the Barr and Country Financial celebrated the opening of a new computer lab at the University of Minnesota's Student Parent HELP Center that is reserved solely for single-parent students. The dedicated space features state-of-the-art computers, ergonomic furniture and a high-efficiency printer available free of cost.

Student Parent HELP Center Director
Susan Warfield has been at the University of
Minnesota for 22 years and a social worker for
35 years. Warfield said Raise the Barr is "really
changing the student-parent service field in
this country."

Beyond the computer lab, Warfield credited Raise the Barr for listening attentively to learn how the organization could best help advancements in academics.

Raise the Barr provided \$65,000 for an indepth research program evaluation, enabling years of data to be strategically studied.

"They funded that research, and now we can send that to any university in the country."

Warfield said. "We get contacted all of the time for info on what programming a college should provide their student-parents, and I can just send them this full report that says exactly which of our services have had the most impact. It also will drive the evolution of our program."

Warfield was on-hand for the reveal and could only smile when the little tykes approached Anthony with an observable comfort.

"He's got what I like to call 'kid karma.' He's like a kid magnet, and it says that his heart is really in his philanthropic work."

Paredes said she liked seeing Anthony and Lori have a "sweet, quiet moment" during the reveal.

"It's kind of like, you realize she's his mom, and he's so proud of everything his mother accomplished," Paredes said. "I think Anthony probably grew up understanding what that means and the sacrifices his mother made in order to better herself and stand on her feet as a woman in this world in order to better support her son."

Whether it's the way Paredes can help restore and ensure environmental justice, Collins' commitment to students who are often marginalized at at-risk of not getting needed help, Jackson's drive to end homelessness, or dreams that will be fulfilled, Raise the Barr will continue to help brighter futures.

"I think there's so much talent and so much value in many lives that are essentially invisible," Lori said. "To know that Raise the Barr is a little part of bringing that to light, of giving them a space to really thrive in this community is an incredible source of pride. There's nothing better than to give somebody a space to grow and thrive."



MY CAUSE MY CLEATS




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Vikings defensive end D.J. Wonnum purchased Simba, an American pit bull terrier, in April at 8 weeks old and introduced him to 13-year-old Diego, his family's American bulldog.

It wasn't necessarily love at first sight, but the two dogs developed a bond.

"They get along pretty well, until Simba gets on Diego's nerves," Wonnum said. "Simba starts pestering him, bothering him, and Diego has to let him know, you know, 'This is my home.'

"He'll be like, 'Relax. We can be friends, but just chill out a little bit,' " Wonnum added, laughing. "But other than that, they get along pretty well and play together."

While Diego lives back home in Georgia with Wonnum's parents, Simba keeps the defensive end company in his Eagan apartment.

Wonnum first decided to acquire a puppy due to increased isolation during the COVID-19 pandemic, and although the duo encountered the expected learning curves early on, adding Simba to his life has made Wonnum's days exponentially better.

"He was biting everything. I've got chewed-up gloves, shoes. Pretty much chewed-up everything. He liked to nip a lot, too, so I had to get him away from that," Wonnum said, shaking his head. "But his favorite place is going under the bed. Under the bed is like his treasure spot. He'll take socks, all kinds of stuff, and just put them under the bed, and I find it all like a week or two later. I'm like, 'C'mon, man.'

"But he's definitely outgoing. He's, like, the life of the party," he continued of Simba. "He's full of energy, and he gets along with pretty much everybody, every dog. It's just a joy to be around him."

Wonnum named the tan-colored pup with a white marking on his chest because of *The Lion King*, one of his favorite Disney movies. And like the lion cub in the 1994 animated flick, Wonnum's Simba can be a bit of a boundary tester from time to time

The 24-year-old recalled a time when Simba left behind some smelly "surprises" hidden for Wonnum to find.

"Simba's kind of sneaky. I have a two-bedroom apartment, and I take him outside, he goes outside and uses the bathroom, and that's that," Wonnum explained. "But maybe like a week later, I go in my guest bedroom, and it's like five different piles of poop all over the room. And I'm like, 'Bro. First of all, how'd you get in here? And second of all, you go outside and use the bathroom. How you gonna come back in the house and use the bathroom?'

"I definitely got him for that," he added. "But other than that, he's been pretty good."

Wonnum compared Simba's personality to Vikings teammate Kris Boyd, saying they're both full of energy and just love to be around people. Simba has an appetite like an NFL player, too.

Wonnum said he'll "eat anything," though it's not exactly a free-for-all as Simba would have it.

From Caribou Coffee Pup Cups, to chicken, to his favorite treat – peanut butter – Simba is a big fan of any snacks he can get his paws on.

He devours bones meant to last a few days and rips chew toys to shreds, but Simba doesn't have a hostile bone in his body.

Anyone who meets the pup will immediately be welcomed by an affectionate tail wag and kisses, and it's easy to see he's all about the cuddles. Wonnum understands the stigma or hesitancy that sometimes accompanies the pit bull breed, but he emphasized that with the proper care and love, they're just like any other dog.

"It's all about how you raise them. I raised Simba around people and around a loving, caring family, and you can see how he is now – full of energy, never shows aggression at all," Wonnum said. "Anybody that's looking for a pit bull, they're loving dogs."

Wonnum did purchase Simba as a puppy but also is a major proponent of pet adoption.

He appreciates the partnership between Warrior Dog Rescue and the Purple Pups content series, and for tonight's My Cause My Cleats game, he'll be donning custom-designed kicks for another Twin Cities shelter, Secondhand Hounds.

Wonnum spent some time with Secondhand Hounds pups at a Community Tuesday event last this month and especially loved a young bulldog, Franny, who had been born with Spina Bifida.

"I decided to do this for my cleats because I love

dogs. I love animals," Wonnum said. "This was an opportunity for me to spotlight those dogs that [might] have different problems or that are still [looking for homes].

"They deserve to be in loving, caring families. They deserve that opportunity," he added.

Wonnum of course hopes he and Simba are in the Twin Cities through the postseason, but when the 2021 campaign wraps up, the pair will head back to Georgia for some quality family time.

And of course, to reunite Simba and Diego.

"I'm actually excited to see how they play together when we get back home, because Simba's a lot bigger than the last time Diego saw him," Wonnum quipped.

More than 50 Vikings will don custom-designed cleats for tonight's Thursday Night Football game against the Steelers.

Tonight's My Cause My Cleats game means a lot to players but to many others, as well, including Minnesota Vikings Cheerleader rookie Hennelie.

A recent graduate of the University of St. Thomas, Hennelie earned her degree in neuroscience and is working as a medical scribe while looking ahead to medical school. In addition to work, med-school prep and practices and game days with the MVC, Hennelie creates time to make a difference in the lives of others.

Hennelie has been involved with 30 For Freedom (30FF) a movement dedicated to ending sex trafficking, for the past five years. We caught up with her to talk about 30FF, as well as her commitment to a unique dance club called Darby's Dancers.

What draws you to this cause, and what ways do you stay engaged with 30 For Freedom?

I first heard about this organization my freshman year of college when I met the incredible man who started it. My eyes were immediately opened to this horrific injustice that is still so present in our world, even in our own backyards. As I learned more about the reality of human trafficking today, and even met some survivors, my heart hurt for those who were trapped, and I knew I wanted to make a difference. Each year, I participate in an annual run held by 30FF to help raise awareness and funds to help end this injustice. I commit to running a specific distance for each dollar raised. ... As my involvement with this organization continues, it's amazing to see efforts pay off when even one more person is rescued and set free.

You also started a dance club in college called Darby's Dancers? Please tell me more about that.

In high school I was part of a nonprofit organization called Darby's Dancers, a dance education program for kids with special needs. The program impacted my life so much that, upon going to college, I knew I wanted to start my own Darby's Dancers program at the University of St. Thomas. At the time, Darby's Dancers programs were established at dance

studios across the country but never at a college campus. After two years of hard work and dedication, we officially launched the first-ever Darby's Dancers program at a college campus. During my senior year at St. Thomas, I led weekly dance classes and watched the lives of other student volunteers be impacted. Truly, nothing is more fulfilling than watching these kids light up with joy when they hear music and get to dance alongside everyone as if it were any other dance class. We even held a recital at the end of the year where friends and family could watch their child perform a routine. When I graduated, I passed this program on to a friend of mine who has kept the program running ever since. Today, I am still involved with Darby's Dancers and volunteer to teach dance classes to kids with special needs every Saturday morning at a local dance studio.

Why is giving back such a big part of your life?

Giving back is a way to bring more meaning to life. Sometimes it's easy to become so focused on ourselves and our own lives that we forget the world around us and the struggles others may be facing. ... [Giving back] puts your own personal problems into perspective when you realize there are millions of other people currently trapped in human trafficking, fighting life-threatening diseases, etc. To give up valuable time to help causes that are greater than yourself is an admirable thing to do and helps you realize that you are capable of making a difference. ... The lessons and values I have learned from these experiences are some that will stay with me forever.


