

SUNDAY, DEC. 26, 2021 | U.S. BANK STADIUM

This matchup between teams vying for the NFC Playoff spots is a case of short rest and shorter rest. Minnesota is welcoming Los Angeles on the heels of a 17-9 win at Chicago on Monday. The Rams were initially scheduled to face the Seahawks last Sunday, but the game was postponed until Tuesday (after the print deadline).

### GOING PROBOWLING



Three Vikings – running back Dalvin Cook, receiver Justin Jefferson and safety Harrison Smith – are going Pro Bowling, the NFL and ESPN announced before Minnesota played Chicago on *Monday Night Football*.

This is the third selection in a row for Cook and the second in as many possible years for Jefferson, who was informed by Vikings Ring of Honor and Pro Football Hall of Fame receiver Randy Moss as part of ESPN's pregame coverage.

Smith is an all-star for the sixth time. He previously participated in five straight from 2015-19. The 10-year pro led NFC safeties in fan votes.

### DALVIN COOK

Cook dazzled in Week 14 against
Pittsburgh, rushing for 205 yards and two
touchdowns to earn FedEx Ground Player
of the Week honors. He is the fifth Vikings
running back with at least three Pro Bowls,
joining Tommy Mason (1962-64), Bill Brown
(1964-65 and 1967-68), Chuck Foreman
(1973-77) and Adrian Peterson (2007-10,
2012-13 and 2015).

### JUSTIN JEFFERSON

Jefferson joined Moss (1998-99) and Sammy White (1976-77) as the only Vikings receivers to garner the honor in their first two NFL seasons. He has set new career highs with 89 receptions and nine touchdowns so far in 2021.

### HARRISON SMITH

Smith has tied Paul Krause and Joey Browner for the most Pro Bowl honors by a Vikings DB all-time. He also is tied for the second-most Pro Bowl recognitions among NFL DBs since 2012 and only trails teammate Patrick Peterson, who has been to seven in that span.



### THE LONG RUN

Smith has four career interceptions returned for touchdowns. The longest

– 81 yards – occurred against the Rams on Sept. 7, 2014, in Head Coach Mike Zimmer's first game with the Vikings.

### PLAYER HIGHLIGHT

The last time Smith set foot on the U.S. Bank Stadium turf, he had just caused a pass breakup on the game's final play to preserve a 36-28 victory over Pittsburgh.

Now he's back to help Minnesota play a potent Rams offense quarterbacked by former Lions QB Matthew Stafford, who is scheduled to face the Vikings for the 22nd time of his career.

Smith was able to intercept Stafford in his final game with Detroit, and there's no doubt that Stafford is well aware of Smith's impact on games,


from his ability to disguise before the snap to effects during plays once the ball is snapped.

Earlier this season Smith recorded his 29th career interception, which tied Carl Lee for sixth in Vikings history. He's also extended his franchise record for sacks by a DB to 16.5, which includes 1.0 of Stafford back in October 2015.

### PLAYER HIGHLIGHT

Kupp entered Week 15 leading the NFL in receptions (113), receiving yards (1,489), touchdowns (12) and yards per game (114.5).

Those totals already have passed the receiver's

bests in a season of 94 catches, 1,161 yards and 10 touchdowns in 2019. Kupp's previous best pergame average (72.6) also occurred in 2019.

Kupp has done a tremendous job after the catch, racking up an NFL-best 647 through Week 14.

Originally selected in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Kupp followed in the football

footsteps of his grandfather and father.

Jake Kupp was drafted by the Cowboys in the ninth round in 1964 and played 154 total games at guard or tight end for Dallas, Washington, Atlanta and New Orleans. The Giants drafted Craig Kupp in 1990, but the QB's only appearance was for the Cardinals in 1991.

The teams combined for 1,002 net yards and eight touchdowns, but the Rams took control by outscoring the Vikings 31-21 over the second and third quarters. Vikings QB Kirk Cousins passed for 422 yards and three touchdowns.



Today will be the fourth time the Vikings and Rams have met on Dec. 26. The first three games all were NFC Playoff Games won by Minnesota.



Jordan Berry's transition from Pittsburgh to Minnesota has gone smoothly both on and off the field.

The Vikings first-year punter has been solid in his first year in Purple after quickly bonding with kicker Greg Joseph and long snapper Andrew DePaola.

"I kind of had an idea that was the way things would go, but when it happened it was all pretty quick," Berry said of joining the Vikings on Sept. 2. "I was at [Steelers] practice and next thing I know I'm getting on a plane here and meeting with the guys and signing all the paperwork.

"And there were only [a few] sessions before the first game, so it was difficult, but the guys here are very professional," Berry added. "I couldn't have asked for a better spot. We have great facilities, and the guys have been really fun to hang out and work with."

But that change doesn't even rank among the toughest of Berry's life, as the Australia native moved from Melbourne after high school to attend Eastern Kentucky University.

The move from Australia's second-largest metropolitan area to Richmond, Kentucky, was more of a jolt.

"It was a bit of a culture shock," Berry said.
"I had spent my whole life in Australia, and had come from the city of Melbourne. That city now has about 5 million people, so it's a bustling city and I went to school right in the middle of it all.

"I think Richmond had maybe 20,000 people, so making that transition — not only country-to-country, but also to a small town — it was a big adjustment," Berry added.

And not only did Berry have to adjust his life, but the former Aussie football player had to learn a few new ways to kick, too.

Berry now has a diverse arsenal of kicks at his disposal, depending on where the Vikings are on the field or what they need. But back then, Berry was all about line drives.

"In Australian football, you're using a punt to pass the ball because throwing it is a penalty in that sport," Berry said. "It's a lot of end-over-end kicks, but they are very low. A lot of the time, the ball really isn't going more than head-high and you're kicking it flat to the ground."

Berry's interest in American football grew when he was in high school, and he then decided to take a leap of faith into the college ranks. After making it with the Steelers and spending six years in Pittsburgh, he's now happy to call Minnesota home.

But even Berry admitted that it's still a bit surreal that a kid from Australia has managed to stick around in the NFL for so long.

"I had a goal when I decided to make the changeover [from Aussie football to American football]," Berry said. "Making the pros for Australian football seemed like it was going to be a jump, and I wasn't going to make that.

"Now I'm over 30 and still hanging around ... it's pretty cool," Berry added.

We caught up with Jordan this week for a Water Break, presented by Crown Royal.

Q: You got a game
ball for your Week 14
performance against
the Steelers. What did
that honor mean to you?
(Berry had three punts
for 146 yards, with his
final kick going 51 yards
and pinning Pittsburgh at
the 4-yard

line).

"It definitely meant a lot, especially that last punt at the end. It was one of the best punts I've had in terms of hang time and the end results of a play. Being able to perform like that in a tight finish and against my old team, I was very happy with that. To have the guys get around me and pump me up at the end, it was pretty cool."

### Q: You and your wife welcomed your daughter, Charlotte, in August of 2020. What has that experience been like?

"She's 16 months now ... just getting big and getting into everything. She's at that point where she's got her hands up on all the counters and wants to open all the doors. I really enjoy being a dad. My wife and her are up here now, so to go home every day and hang out with them is great."

Q: Did your life change once you became a dad?

"It's more that you just have less free time. I spend my time with Charlotte. She has a ton of energy so I try to wear her out so she'll go to sleep at night."

### Q: Australia celebrates Christmas in the summer. What was that like and how are you doing with your first Minnesota winter thus far?

"Growing up, I lived in Perth for a few years. So Christmas there was waking up and going to the beach and catching a few waves in the morning then hanging around the house with the family. Here, you go outside, and it's really cold."

### **Q:** Do you still surf or is that in your past?



WHEN CALISHA AND HER SIX CHILDREN STEP FROM THE FROSTY WINTER AIR INTO THE OMNI VIKINGS HOTEL, THEY'RE MET WARMLY BY STEPHANIE HAM, WIFE OF VIKINGS FULLBACK C.J. HAM.

Though heightened COVID-19 protocols prohibited C.J. from joining the group in-person, his giving spirit was tangibly displayed through the pile of different-sized boxes, all wrapped in shiny gold paper, spilling out from beneath a sparkling evergreen tree.

The Hams said it "wasn't a question" whether or not to provide the local family a Christmas they won't forget amidst the ongoing pandemic.

"When you put it into perspective, it's a tough time for everybody. We're all dealing with different challenges," C.J. said. "To be able to help in this time, it's special. Especially for a family of six children with a mother, whom I assume probably works very hard to make sure her kids are fed, clothed and have everything that they need."

Parents themselves to Skylar (5), Stella (3) and Trip (10 months), C.J. and Steph have been "adopting" a Twin Cities family since 2018. Steph always finds herself drawn to the parent or guardian of the youngsters.

This time around is no different, as she keeps her eyes on Calisha, who is watching her children unwrap

individually labeled gifts.

"I'm excited to connect because she's around our age," Steph said. "I mean, we know how hard it is for three kids, and then to have double that responsibility, as a single mother, she's Superwoman.

"Every year, they've teared up.
That's what gets me every time,
is to see their reactions," Steph
added. "Half the time, the mom or
grandma will sit there and leave
their gifts and just watch their
kiddos open theirs, and that's
pretty special."

The Hams enjoy the intimate experience with one family, ensuring the adults and

children alike have an opportunity to

connect with one another.

C.J. and Steph's oldest daughter, Skylar, turned 5 this summer and has started to better understand the importance of giving and the heart behind the family tradition. "She is kind of realizing, 'Oh, these aren't my toys' and she'll ask, 'Oh, where are they going?' She was helping wrap the gifts, too," Steph said. "It's fun in that aspect to include her in things and explain what we're doing and why we're doing it."

Chat with any of the families from the past three holiday seasons, and they'll likely all tell you the same thing: This act of generosity comes so naturally for the Hams. There's no seeking of the spotlight, no expectation of anything in return.

C.J. and Steph simply hope to make a difference.

Growing up in Duluth, Minnesota, C.J. and his sister were thankful each year for gifts and holiday celebrations with their parents. But amid the receiving, they also were taught by Tina and Cortez, Sr., the importance of giving.

"My mom and dad would take people in and make sure they had clothes on their back, food to eat if they needed help," C.J. recalled. "That mindset is something I've kept with me.

"I think as a family now, we've learned that we are blessed to be a blessing," C.J. added.

"And if we have the opportunity to bless somebody, we should do that. We're blessed to be a blessing, and hopefully that blessing continues to multiply."

Rewarding Feeling

The "blessed" mindset is one C.J. consistently maintains, from family movie nights at their Farmington home to electrifying game days.

Now as routine as slipping into his shoulder pads and tightly tying his cleats, C.J. smears eye black onto his cheeks in the shape of a cross. His Christian faith fuels the fullback on and off the field, and the symbol serves as a reminder – to himself and to fans – of the perspective he plays with.

C.J. was mic'd up for the Vikings-Packers game in Week 11; a video of the day's highlights later revealed the fullback shouting as he raced out of the tunnel at U.S. Bank Stadium:

"I'm blessed! I'm blessed! I'm blessed!"

Had it not been for the microphone threaded beneath his purple jersey that day, no one would hear C.J.'s message over the roar of 66,000 fans. The two-word phrase, though, acts as a personal fight song for the 28-year-old.

C.J. never could have imagined when he first started playing football in elementary school that he'd be where he is now.

From high school ball to playing running back at a Division II school, to earning a spot on the Vikings practice squad in 2016 after attending rookie minicamp on a tryout basis, to switching to fullback, to now playing a significant role in



never take anything for granted.

"This game doesn't last forever, so when I'm out there, I'm

started playing as an 11-year-old ... You can

blessed, and I'm gonna go out there and give it my all," he added.

A fullback's job isn't flashy, and that suits C.J. just fine.

To be sure, transitioning from running back, a role in which he scored 29 rushing touchdowns at Augustana University, proved to be an adjustment. But he's come to love the unique – and sometimes overlooked – position that is an NFL fullback.

"Playing running back my whole life, scoring a bunch of touchdowns, I used to think that was the greatest," C.J. said. "But now switching roles and being a blocker for some of these touchdowns, it's honestly almost even more rewarding. To lay a big block and see Dalvin [Cook] go right past you into the end zone, it feels amazing.

"I definitely enjoy assisting touchdowns just as much – or even more – than scoring touchdowns," he added.

C.J. is a man of many talents, though, and Vikings fans have seen that on full display.

Throughout the 2021 campaign, he's been utilized in multiple ways. In addition to fullback, Vikings Offensive Coordinator Klint Kubiak has lined him up at fullback, running back and tight end. He's rushed, blocked and caught passes out of the backfield.

Take, for instance, the Vikings Week 9 contest at Baltimore. With just over two minutes remaining in the game and Minnesota trailing by a touchdown, Kirk Cousins threw downfield to C.J., who made a leaping catch along the sideline that gained 27 yards on third-and-3.

The Vikings ultimately came up short against the Ravens, but C.J.'s grab nonetheless garnered plenty of attention from fans and teammates alike.

"I was like, 'You might as well come to the receivers now!'

You make a big catch on somebody's head, you gotta come to
the receivers," Justin Jefferson said of the play.

Coaches and teammates are confident C.J. knows the full offense and could chip in practically anywhere.

"He comes to work every day on time, knows what he needs to do, his assignments," Cook said. "If you want to know something at running back, you can ask him. He knows both positions."

Cousins pointed out that C.J. has added depth as a fill-in tight end in the absence of Irv Smith, Jr., who landed on Injured Reserve early in the season.

"He's tremendous. When Irv went down, we said, 'Now you're going to play Y,' "Cousins said. "He can do it all. If we lined him up at X or Z (receiver), I bet he could run a route and win. As a quarterback, it's such a comfort to have a player like that.

"There are times when I'm asking him what responsibilities, 'Did I call that play right?' Or, 'What's the motion here?' And he'll get me right," Cousins continued. "That just says the world about C.J. and what he's capable of athletically and also mentally. He's a great teammate."

According to center Garrett Bradbury, some in the locker room refer to C.J. as "The Eraser" because of his ability to make good on another player's misstep.

"He's a weapon. He cleans things up for us," Bradbury said. "Anything that's not right, he'll come in, just kind of blow it up, and Dalvin will find a crease and go.

Bradbury added that C.J. does a lot of dirty work not necessarily evident to fans watching a game on TV.

"He's so important to what we do," Bradbury said. "He's an awesome player."

### Know-name game

C.J.'s impact on the field is felt far beyond the walls of Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center. The way he plays the game has earned respect from peers and pundits alike across the league.

Another highlight of C.J.'s mic'd up segment showed him sitting on the bench talking to Cook about a recent interaction.

"Aaron Rodgers knows my name. He said, 'What up, Hammer?' " C.J. tells Cook, smiling. "I said, 'Oh Lord, I done made it.' "

Asked later about the candid moment caught for fans, C.J. laughed. He called the exchange with the Packers Pro Bowler "very subtle" but memorable.

"I think it was special teams, a kickoff play, and we kicked it through the end zone, so I'm kind of trottin' past, and Green Bay's offense is running out to the field, and he just gave me a little nod and said, 'What's up, Hammer?' I was like, 'Oh! That's pretty sweet.' That was pretty cool," C.J. said.

He's had similar moments against various defenders whom he respected long before he made it to the NFL himself.

C.J. recalled playing against fellow Minnesota native Terrell Suggs, linebacker Luke Kuechly and All-Pro defensive end Julius Peppers during the 2017 season.

"That was one that was huge for me," C.J. said. "I remember lining up against [Peppers] on punts, and he was about to rush my side, and I was thinking in my head, 'All right, this dude is massive. I'm gonna need some help.' "

He's received mutual admiration from fellow Pro Bowl fullbacks Kyle Juszczyk (49ers) and Patrick Ricard (Ravens), the latter of whom connected with C.J. in January 2020 at the all-star game in Orlando.

There may not be an official Fullbacks Club, but there's certainly an unspoken connection among those playing the position across the league.

"I think every fullback knows every other fullback in the league, just because, you know, there is only one on each team, and some teams don't use them at all. So we watch each other," Ricard told Vikings.com. "And at the end of the day, we know how physical of a position it is, how demanding it is and how underutilized or undervalued it is.

"I think guys like myself, C.J., Kyle and there's a number of other fullbacks in the league, have been really showing how much you can utilize a fullback and how you can use them in modern-day offenses," Ricard continued. "It's not just being in the backfield and lead-blocking. There's so much more we can do. I think us three, especially, have shown that. And we've made our offenses more versatile – we're able to do more with the offenses because of guys like us."

Ricard has a unique backstory himself, having played as a defensive lineman for Maine, an FCS school, before signing with the Ravens as an undrafted free agent in 2017 and making the transition to fullback.

The converts instantly connected at the 2020 Pro Bowl.

"He was just a great guy. An awesome guy," said Ricard. "His last name is perfect – Ham, a.k.a. 'Hammer.' He lays the hammer when he plays. I have a lot of respect for his game. He can do a lot. I mean, when he played us this year, he had that phenomenal catch against us at a crucial part of the game, and I was just so happy for him."

C.J. also secured high – and repeated – praise from FOX Sports' Mark Sanchez during his call of the Vikings-Seahawks game in Week 3 and against the Chargers in Week 10.

### Standard Setter

Even more fulfilling than the NFL fame for C.J. is being recognized for the impact he and his family make on others.

"He's the kind of person you want in this organization because he sets the standard for so many guys," Cousins said. "If you say, 'How do we do things around here?' Go look at C.J. Ham. That's how we do things."

Just say C.J.'s name around Cook, and it'll prompt an immediate grin from the running back.

"C.J. is one of those guys that is just him. You love that about him. He's just C.J. Ham," Cook said. "Off the field, the things he does in the community are outstanding. He's a dad, and the things he does with his kids are amazing.

"I look up to him as a big brother, so that's my guy right there," Cook added, his eyes glistening. "You're about to make me cry talking about my guy."

Like Cook said, C.J. is just C.J.

While ramped-up COVID-19 protocols affected his ability to personally spend time with Calisha and her children, C.J.'s influence over the entire evening certainly was felt.

Nearing the end of his sixth season with the Vikings, C.J. wants to keep improving as a player but also to maintain his off-field contributions.

"Whether we're winning, we're losing, this is something that we try to do, and it's outside of football. It's bigger than football," C.J. said. "To be able to bring somebody joy, to be able to help somebody out, is bigger than football. I'm just happy that we have the opportunity to be able to do it."

Patrick Peterson first unwrapped his unique gifts as a high school junior.

The teen was training with his cousin Bryant McFadden, William Gay, Ike Taylor and Deshea Townsend and keeping pace with members of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

"That's when I kind of knew I had a special gift, a special talent, that it was meant for me to play on a big stage," Peterson said last week. "But then it was just up to me to stay the course, stay focused and stay patient. That's something that the last two generations, I believe, kind of forgot or don't know much about.

"You have to be patient for success. You have to be patient for great things to happen, and so many kids or so many people nowadays want everything to happen right now," Peterson added.

He said it was advantageous to see McFadden progress from Hollywood, Florida, to Florida State on the way to becoming a second-round pick of the Steelers in the 2005 NFL Draft. It gave him an idea of what to expect and what would be expected in order to thrive.

"Being able to train with them gave me the confidence, knowing I had the ability to play at a high level," Peterson said. He headed for LSU and shined for the Tigers, becoming the second player in NCAA history to win the Chuck Bednarik and Jim Thorpe awards in the same season (joining Charles Woodson). Steelers safety Minkah Fitzpatrick became the third player to do so at Alabama.

Peterson had elite speed, height in the upper echelon of cornerbacks and strength to boot.

That combination of physical attributes raised eyebrows for scouts, and Arizona quickly tabbed him with the fifth overall pick of the 2011 NFL Draft.

Only three cornerbacks have been picked as high or higher since. Jacksonville tabbed Jalen Ramsey fifth overall in 2016 before eventually sending him to the Rams. Cleveland selected Denzel Ward fourth overall in 2018, and Detroit tabbed Jeff Okudah with the third pick in 2020.



### **MAN OF MANY TALENTS**

Peterson made the Cardinals right, becoming an immediate starter at cornerback and dazzling with game-changing plays as a punt returner.

In addition to recording a pair of interceptions and 13 passes defended, Peterson returned four punts for touchdowns and led the NFL with 699 yards on punt returns. A 99-yarder against the Rams provided a walk-off win in overtime on Nov. 6, 2011.

Peterson suited up for all 154 regular-season games he played for Arizona but became a free agent this spring.

Despite being against the salary cap, Minnesota found a way to bring him here on a one-year deal. He's brought leadership to a young cornerbacks room and proven execution on the field.

New teammates quickly recognized Peterson, who made eight consecutive Pro Bowls to start his career and has garnered First-Team All-Pro designations three times, as the real deal.

"Corner is such a position of athleticism and confidence, and he has those things in spades," quarterback Kirk Cousins said. "He's also a very strong player. I don't think he gets beat up physically. He can take the fight to someone in coverage. Athleticism, intelligence, physicality, that combines to make you a great player on defense."

Vikings second-year receiver Justin Jefferson has known Peterson for more than a decade. He grew up near the LSU locker room while his older brother Jordan roomed and teamed with Peterson (Jordan later served as the best man in Peterson's wedding). Middle brother Rickey Jefferson played for the Tigers, as well, before Justin dazzled on the way to becoming a 2020 first-round pick by Minnesota.

Justin Jefferson was asked earlier this offseason about practicing against Peterson, a player he and Jordan casually threw footballs with in college residence parking lots.

"I mean, he's the best of the best. Going up against him every single day helps me progress as a receiver — just asking him different ways to better myself, better my route, what things did he see in my route to trigger him to jump? He's taught me a lot, and I'm looking pretty good this season because of him."

Jefferson said he had tried to execute a doublemove. but Peterson didn't bite.

"I asked him later that day, 'What made you not go for that move?' And he said something about me not running that route like I normally did on my first step. So, it didn't really trigger him as a much."

### A SPECIAL APPRECIATION

Peterson has always tried to maximize his gifts – consider it a form of gratitude – and he's learned to blend them.

Time eventually catches up to everyone. When it does, players lean more heavily on their mental gifts.

"For sure, because at the end of the day, when you get older, a lot of things don't work the way they used to when you were 25 or 24 years old," Peterson said.

"You have to rely on the techniques that you maybe have to change or work extremely hard on during your offseason to help you put yourself and your body in a better position.

"At the end of the day, you want to try to create muscle memory for yourself so that when you get into a game, it's kind of like second nature," he added. "When I'm training, I'm trying to do game-time movement, game-time situations."

Peterson has experienced the effects of applied knowledge. A few years ago, he was diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes but was able to reverse its effects by incorporating dietary discipline and has been considered diabetes-free since 2018.

Earlier this season, Peterson hurt his hamstring late in Week 6 at Carolina and missed the following three games. They were the first three he had ever missed because of injury.

While aggressively attacking his rehab, Peterson stayed connected with the game plan. He stretched with teammates before practices, even on the chilly fall days that had him layering up, and he requested a headset to wear during games so he could hear the calls sent in from the sideline.

Peterson managed the frustration of missing time by gaining perspective on the way Head Coach Mike Zimmer calls the defense.

Peterson had nearly played for Zimmer in Cincinnati as a rookie, but the Bengals opted for A.J. Green with the fourth overall pick in 2011.

"I understand how Coach calls the game throughout the flow of the game. You know, kind of get a beat, trying to get a feel for the offense and understand how you want to call certain defenses, understand when you want to send pressure," Peterson said. "When you're in the game, you can't really hear the calls. You're just waiting for the call to come out, so being on the sideline and able to hear the call and hear him relay the message to Nick [Vigil] or Anthony [Barr] was a lot more eye-opening for

me to understand and kind of see where Coach is coming from when he calls certain things."

### **GIVER OF NICKNAMES**

Peterson is comfortable going by Patrick, Pat, Pat P. or
P2. The last one has a cool logo to go with it.
Former Cardinals and current Buccaneers Head
Coach Bruce Arians went with "Five Star" in
reference to his status as a recruit.

Peterson conversely enjoys giving

nicknames to teammates.

Former Cardinals safety Tony Jefferson?

"I named him Bobcat, because we had a safety blitz in his rookie year and he never got it right, and the blitz was for him," Peterson said.

Vikings running back Dalvin Cook?

"Oh man, Cookie Monster goes wild again," Peterson said the morning after Cook rushed for 205 yards against Pittsburgh. "When the Cookie Monster sees cookies, he goes wild. And a football is the Cookie's Monster's cookie."

Vikings receiver Adam Thielen is "Robin Hood because he just shares the wealth in the red zone," and tight end Tyler Conklin is Aquaman for his resemblance to actor Jason Momoa.

Vikings safeties Harrison Smith and Xavier Woods?

Smith already is widely known as The Hitman, but Peterson also recently referred to him as "The Commander."

"I call X the Silent Assassin, and Harry, he's The Commander. He's The Commander by not even saying much. He can just look at you, because first of all, he doesn't have a very loud voice. He doesn't come across very boisterous," Peterson explained. "Even in a game, you've got 60,000 people, and Harry's still talking like he's right next to you. I'm like, 'Harry, we're in a football game right now.' But his eyes, and his demeanor, and just his ability to impact the game the way he did [against Pittsburgh], it's special. He means a lot to this defense. He means a lot to this organization. It just goes to show, us old guys can still play."

### TAKER OF FOOTBALLS

Peterson is set to suit up against the Rams today for the 21st time in his career. He hopes to continue the success he's had against the team, whether the games have been played in St. Louis, Arizona or Los Angeles.

Seven of his 28 regular-season interceptions have occurred on passes thrown by Rams QBs. Peterson returned one of two interceptions on Nov. 9, 2014, for a 30-yard touchdown. He also returned a punt for a touchdown in each of his first two games against the Rams.

"I don't know what it is about the Rams, but I've got three career touchdowns on them, a 99-yarder, an 80-yarder, so I guess the Rams have just been like a horseshoe to me, just very lucky to me," Peterson said. "Hopefully I want that juju to continue to roll over for me so I can have a big game."





Michael Pierce watched numerous YouTube videos on dog breeds before making a decision.

He had no doubt he'd be getting a puppy – especially after navigating lockdown life early in the COVID-19 pandemic. But just what type of puppy, Pierce hadn't quite decided.

The Vikings defensive tackle did ample research and ultimately decided on a standard poodle.

"I wanted a companion. It was just me in a new house by myself," Pierce said.
"I needed a best friend, and he's been more than a best friend to me. Kept me company, kept me active, and I love him to death. He's like a child.

"He brought a lot of love to my life. It got boring and lonely watching Vikings football at home alone," said Pierce, who added that his parents lived four hours away. "Just to have him there, sitting on the couch – even tearing stuff up, as that was

a puppy – he just gave me a lot of love and a lot to do. A lot of stuff to teach him."

This dog-loving Vikings writer, wanted to know: Aside from the alliterative way "Princeton Pierce" rolls off the tongue, was there anything else behind choosing the name?

Pierce laughed.

"They're a British breed, so that's where the name came from," he explained.

He added with a smile, though: "I also like the double-P, so I normally call him that."

Princeton has been a great partner for Pierce in more ways than one. Pierce explained that Princeton earlier this fall completed service dog training, meaning the pup can be by Pierce's side during air travel.

"I have a little bit of anxiety," Pierce said. "Planes kind of get me rowdy, a little erratic sometimes. So just to be able to travel with him – I do travel a lot, not only for football but just for life – and being able to have him on the plane with me [is helpful]. Being able to have him there with me, and being able to keep my eyes on him and know he's going to be well-behaved and not have any issues is ideal for me and my lifestyle. That was very important for me."

Princeton is well-trained and responds to a number of commands that ask him to sit, lie down, shake, jump up or lay his head in Pierce's lap.

But to be fair, he did just turn 1 on Oct. 26, so Princeton occasionally falls back into those puppy behaviors – especially when it comes to socks or to the temptation of people food.

Consequently, Princeton earned a new nickname

last spring. When Pierce went to Minnesota for Organized Team Activities in May, he asked his parents to dog-sit Princeton until he found a more permanent home in the Twin Cities.

"He loves to steal stuff off the counters. And he's a sock machine," Pierce said. "He goes in my laundry. He went in my travel bag recently and stole some socks. And he loves human food. I think he ate, like, 12 muffins once.

"You leave food on the counter, we're working on breaking him of that habit, but as of right now, that'll get stolen," Pierce added. "So my mom and dad know him as 'Pirate.' "

Princeton may sometimes steal snacks, but he also steals plenty of hearts through his Instagram page, @princeton\_the\_poodle.

Pierce started the social media account shortly after he got Princeton in January 2021. And while he hasn't posted as much as he'd like during the craziness of an NFL season, he promises there is quality content coming down the pike.

"We've got some stuff we'll post soon," he assured.

Pierce has enjoyed getting acclimated to a new city with Princeton by his side, and the two have thoroughly enjoyed life in Minnesota. The duo regularly takes walks through Minneapolis, and they often stop for some playtime on The Commons, with beautiful U.S. Bank Stadium soaring behind as a natural backdrop.

"It's just being able to have parks right here. I live right down the street and walk him, let him run, all that stuff. It's super, super clean, and that's something that's very unique to here,"

Pierce said. "I've lived in Baltimore, I've been to D.C., a lot of different cities, and you don't always see [this cleanliness]. People pick up after their dogs [here] and all that kind of stuff, so you don't have to worry about them eating different things off the ground.

"It's a very walkable city, which is great, and it's very dog-friendly," he added. "It's probably the perfect place to have a dog, really."

Jefferson appreciated another opportunity to give back to the community. He's been doing so whenever possible despite limitations caused by COVID-19.


"I had to give her some tips on what drip to get, but it was cool to see the gifts she got for her kids and the boots I helped her pick out," Jefferson said.


