



IVAN PACE, JR.

PACE HAS GONE FROM AN UNDRAFTED FREE AGENT TO A CANDIDATE FOR **DEFENSIVE ROOKIE OF THE YEAR.** The linebacker has appeared in all 15 games and made 10 starts, totaling 615 snaps on defense and another 206 on special teams. Pace enters tonight's game with 81 tackles, two tackles for loss, seven quarterback hits, 2.5 sacks, two passes defensed, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and an interception.

RARE FEATS

In Week 14, Pace became the second NFL rookie since 1994 (joining DeMeco Ryans in 2006) to record 13 tackles, a sack and an interception in one game. He also is the second undrafted rookie in Vikings history (Don Hultz) to start at least 10 games, record 2-plus sacks and an interception.



TWO DECADES. That's how long Hicks has been playing football. Now 31 years old, he's spent 20 of those years on or near a gridiron.

While it's no secret the NFL schedule can be a grind at times, Hicks always wears a smile beneath his helmet. Because whether it's the dog days of training camp, 6 a.m. arrival times after a West Coast Sunday Night Football game or an outdoor practice on a chilly Minnesota afternoon, Hicks' gratitude runs deep.

Football was fun when he scored his first touchdown at 11 years old, and it's still fun now.

Hicks is careful to never take a day in this league for granted.

"I've been through a lot of scenarios that have felt like it could potentially be closer to the end of my career than the beginning," Hicks said. "And now, more is behind me than ahead. I think it's allowed me to truly appreciate just being out there, messing around on the field and the small things of being with the guys."

He's overcome hurdles along the way, including a pectoral tear and ruptured Achilles in 2015 and 2017, respectively, that threatened to shorten his playing days. And most recently, a fluke injury almost cost him much more than that.

During the first series of Minnesota's Week 10 game against New Orleans, Hicks attempted a tackle of RB Alvin Kamara and was struck inadvertently by teammate Camryn Bynum, whose knee collided with Hicks' shin.

Believing it to be a contusion, Hicks pushed past the initial pain and reentered the game after exiting for a brief time. But as the first Saints possession

of the second half neared its

end, he knew something wasn't right.

Hicks certainly is no stranger to pain, but what he experienced entered a new realm.

He described the agony as "the deepest, darkest ache you can probably imagine," rendering him helpless to find any level of comfort or even function coherently.

Hicks ultimately was transferred via ambulance to undergo emergency surgery for compartment syndrome, a condition in which pressure rises in and around the muscles, most often in the lower leg.

Limiting the flow of blood, oxygen and nutrients to muscles and nerves, compartment syndrome can cause serious damage, including the need for amputation. In rare cases, it has resulted in death.

The moments leading into surgery remain a blur for Hicks, but he remembers clearly the doctor's words upon waking: "It's a good thing you got in, because you could have lost your leg."

"I'm thankful," Hicks said. "Thankful and blessed to be where I'm at."

MAKING HIS MARK

Incredibly, tonight marks Hicks' second game back in action.

He diligently rested, then just as diligently rehabbed, in order to play Week 16 against the Lions and record nine tackles, a pass defensed and a QB hit of Jared Goff.

Hicks' game-day tights conceal a nearly 12-inch scar. The wound healed effortlessly but leaves behind a reminder of what could have been.

Missing four games may mean he's not finishing this season with career numbers, but Hicks' impact on a strong Vikings defense in 2023 is undeniable.

He's thrived in Defensive Coordinator Brian Flores' system, the first time Hicks has been part of such a pressure-heavy defense.

"I've been in defenses that blitz a lot, but there's a lot of responsibility that comes with it. This defense allows you to play fast and play free and really use your instincts to be in the right spot and make plays," he said. "It's a lot less black and white than a lot of people are probably used to on the defensive side, but it allows us to play with a freedom that, I know for me, no other defense has allowed me to.

"It also has given me the opportunity to make checks and to take ownership and to kind of do what I feel is right on the field, without [Flores] really second-guessing me, which is awesome to have in a defensive coordinator," Hicks added. "I think it's given us a lot of freedom, a lot of ability to just use our instincts and natural-given ability to be in the right spot and make plays."


And as much as Hicks has enjoyed playing in Flores' defense, the coordinator conversely called it a "joy" to coach the linebacker.

"I can't say enough good things about him. He brings leadership. He's got presence. He's really got command of the defense and understanding of what we're trying to do and why we're trying to do it," Flores noted. "He's serious about the game. He's serious about doing things correctly, doing things the right way, but he also has a great time playing football.

"When you can combine all those things – being serious about it and really locking in ... but applying it while having a good time, that's really what you're looking for. That's what I like to see. That's what we as coaches like to see," Flores continued. "I tell our players this: 'You've gotta have peace, and you've gotta have fun to play at your top level.' He certainly has that."

Hicks has totaled 96 tackles, five passes defensed, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries – including one returned for a touchdown at Chicago.

Hicks also nabbed an interception that day, helping the Vikings spark a five-game win streak.

But when you really see him celebrate? Anytime his teammates are the ones making plays.

Whether it's Josh Metellus' fumble recovery against the Falcons, Camryn Bynum's two picks on *Monday Night Football*, Byron Murphy, Jr.'s late pick against New Orleans, Ivan Pace, Jr.'s at Las Vegas, or one of Danielle Hunter's sacks, Hicks is typically among the first running to congratulate ... or to limbo beneath a hoisted Akayleb Evans in the end zone, as he did against the Niners.

"We're out there having a great time, and that's what makes it special," Hicks said.

THE GLUE OF THE DEFENSE

When Hicks first arrived in Minnesota in spring 2022, he wasted no time getting to know his new teammates.

He and Eric Kendricks connected quickly, as leaders in the linebacker room and on the field, as well as fast friends outside the team facility.

"He's a football guy," said Kendricks, who joined the Chargers this past offseason. "He understands the game well and communicates well. I mean, I feel like there's not much that Jordan Hicks doesn't do well. He never gets enough credit for that, either.

"He's just one of the boys. He can hang out with everybody, gets along with everybody," Kendricks added. "He really molds well with any group."

Vikings linebacker Troy Dye was grateful last season for Hicks' immediate willingness to get to know younger players and share any experience he could.

"You can tell he's just a natural leader," Dye said. "He's been in the league awhile, had played for two different teams already, so he knew how to fit into different locker rooms. He's definitely the mold of guys we have here – a very outgoing person, very smart, selfless, wants to help everyone around him be better. He fit in perfectly."

Hicks' mother, Kelly Justice, has seen that magnetic personality in action since Hicks was young.

"He'd get the neighborhood boys together and, as a group, they'd plan some fun activity – from building bike ramps, creek walks, forts in the woods, basketball games in the driveway," Justice recalled. "He was always a leader, and the boys always wanted Jordan to come out and play."

For Hicks, it all comes down to being his authentic self and always staying focused on the bigger picture.

He wants to pay forward what he learned from former All-Pro linebacker and current Texans Head Coach DeMeco Ryans, who took Hicks under his wing in Philadelphia and invested in him – rather than compete with him – as a young player and teammate.

"I can't connect with a rookie or a second-year guy if I don't know who they are. If I don't know personal things about them, what they like to do, how they see the game," Hicks noted. "So every time I have an opportunity to sit down and ask questions, or give some type of advice, tell a little bit of my story, I'm always looking for those opportunities."

It's why Hicks spent most Thursday evenings this season bonding with defensive teammates in ways completely removed from football.

In early November, he reserved a suite for the group at the Minnesota Wild-New York Rangers game and provided his fellow linebackers with custom Wild jerseys.

"I'm just always looking for more opportunities to connect," Hicks said. "If you know the person next to you on game day, you're not willing to give up easily. You're willing to go the extra step, you're willing to do more for him.

"There's no secret – the closest teams and the guys who connect the most on the field are the defenses and the teams that play the best," continued Hicks, who earned a Super Bowl LII ring with the Eagles. "You see us – we're having fun out there. We're playing fast, we're playing physical, and we're celebrating. It's because of the camaraderie and the culture that's in this building, that's on this defense."

Players like Dye and Pace understand not only the benefit of learning from a veteran like Hicks but also that it's not a given at this level.

Some veterans could perceive younger players as job threats – and yet that's never been Hicks' concern.

"He wants everybody around him to be great. He doesn't care who's playing, as long as the best player is playing. If he feels like he's being outperformed, that's only going to elevate his game," Dye said. "He wants the best for everybody. When you see that, it helps you improve your



own game, and it sets a good example for the future for you ... so when they get to that point in their career where they're five, six, seven years in, you're doing the same thing."

'WHERE MY FEET ARE'

Looking from the outside in, one might wonder how Hicks balances it all.

Studying the game he loves, teaching younger players, planning and executing teammate outings, rehabbing a potentially devastating injury and being a dedicated family man.

Hicks prioritizes being a loving husband to Ivana and father to three young children, Ayven, Lukah and Taliya.

Every day on the field or in his home might not be perfect. But every day, he's thankful.

"There are hard times," Hicks acknowledged. "When I've got to leave for work in the morning and my daughter's telling me, 'Don't go' or crying that I'm leaving - that's not easy. But you keep the perspective that they're seeing their dad working hard. These are times they'll remember. So there's a payoff. And it's not easy all the time. But you take it day by day, you take it moment by moment.

where my feet are," he added. "That's kind of how I approach it. It's not always easy, that's for sure. But it's a lot of fun, and it's very rewarding. I'm doing what I love - in all aspects of life. I love parenting, I love playing football, I love being a good husband." Whether Hicks knows it or not, it's yet another area he's setting an example.

"I try to be as present as possible. Be

"He views life more than just the game of football. I think a lot of guys get caught up in, 'I'm just a football player; this is all I do,' " Dye said. "But he's a very hands-on father ... he's very big on doing things in the community. He's big outside the game of football, so he's not 'just' a football player. He wears many different hats, and that helps him keep a balanced life."

Hicks has relied on that perspective during a season in which the Vikings have met a tremendous amount of adversity. At 7-8, they're facing a steep climb to a postseason opportunity that includes two must-win division matchups, starting tonight against the Packers (also 7-8).

The losses sting. But no matter the outcome, he's thankful to be out there between the white lines.

"I wanted to ... play free, have fun," Hicks said following last week's game.

"My body

felt good. My mind felt good." Because at the end of the day, Hicks is playing for something bigger."I used to be the player that wouldn't look at my mom or Ivana if they're on the sideline ... but


now I'm over

here playing catch on the sideline with [my kids pregame]," Hicks said. "It's less about me, and it's more about the experience and more about the learning and the teaching moments. And leaving a legacy.

"One day when they get older, hopefully they'll remember these times. And if they don't, that when they talk to somebody about who Jordan Hicks was, who their dad was, that whoever that person is has nothing but great things to say - and it pushes them to be a better person," he added. "It's why I play. It's my motivation right now. I love the game of football, but a lot of







As a rookie, Harrison Smith would often stay late at the Vikings Winter Park practice facility to watch film. He'd pull up a chair to a small table in the defensive backs room, flip on the computer screen and use the mouse to click through frame by frame, keying in on anything he could to grow his game.

Eleven years later, the location and method have changed, but the attention to detail hasn't.

Smith now has film readily available on his iPad, meaning he's able to - and does - study in the locker room, on the bus to

or from games, at the kitchen table of his Twin Cities home or in bed before turning in for the night.

But every now and then, Smith finds himself still sneaking into the DBs room - now at Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center - to click through a game the old-fashioned way.

"If I'm feeling nostalgic or something," he said, offering a slight grin. "And I think it can actually be a little more efficient when you do it that way, because you have a little bit more to work with.

"The use of the iPad or Microsoft Surface has been great for guys having constant access to film," Smith added. "Sometimes we get a little spoiled ... but it's a really nice tool for everybody to use." Whether it's after a big win, a tough

loss or after installing a new play during OTAs, Smith jumps to the tape.

"If I had a bad practice, I always want to go watch the film," he said. "I just want to see, 'Why did I do that?' ... You try to be harder on yourself than your coach is going to be. You're just gonna be better. That's just how it is.

"Some of the most fun I've had watching film, though, is on game days – after the game. Especially after a win," he added.

Smith recalled last season's defeat of the Saints in London, after which everyone pulled out their devices to review the game during the Transatlantic flight. Or the much shorter trip from Buffalo to Minneapolis following the Vikings roller-coaster win over the Bills.

For every snap, there are 22 viewpoints to unravel.

"Everybody has their own story throughout the game. That you didn't see. That no one else saw," Smith said. "I remember watching something with Eric Kendricks after we played Green Bay one time, and we were going through the whole game, and he's like, 'Oh – this is the play.'

"He'd just gotten folded up by, like, all these different angles," Smith continued. "He was just getting hit everywhere. I would have never seen that. I didn't see it, and I was right next to him during the game. But hearing him [explain], 'This is what I was seeing. I took this step, and then this guy was on me.'

"It's a little story every time," he added. "The stuff like that, especially when you win? It's just fun to sit around and talk football."

He's earned six Pro Bowl nods and in 2017 was named First-Team All-Pro by *The Associated Press*. Smith is a four-time team captain for Minnesota and has played 174 career games, the most by any Vikings defensive back.

At 34 years old, Smith is among the NFL's elder tier of defenders – and yet he continues to impact the game. Against the Panthers in Week 4, he became the first player since at least 1994 to record 14 tackles, 3.0 sacks and a forced fumble in a single game.

One might think by this point in his career, Smith has learned all he can from film study.

But that simply isn't the case. It's the greats who are never content.

Vikings defensive backs coach Daronte Jones believes the players who truly utilize film study are the ones who see longevity in the league.

"Our bodies don't move like they used to the older we get. So then, what becomes your advantage? The things that were great for you before may not be great for you now, so how do you adjust your game?" Jones said. "And I think Harrison's done a phenomenal job at adjusting his game, becoming more cerebral."

Josh Metellus has been watching Smith since the Vikings drafted the elder safety out of Notre Dame in 2012. The 2020 draft pick has gleaned from Smith at every opportunity.

Metellus has noticed what Jones pointed out, that Smith has learned to create advantages.

"He's a flat-out dog, too, so that helps," Metellus said with a grin. "But a lot of 2-2's game is mental, and he puts himself in positions to make plays. He capitalizes on those. The more he plays, the more he just figures out what's going on and plays faster than anybody else."

Just like he's developed his understanding of different defensive schemes and techniques over the years, Smith also has sharpened his entire approach to watching film based on the calendar.

Once into the season, Smith is studying specific opponents and making mental adjustments accordingly.

There are specific game situations that can be analyzed – red zone, at midfield, 2-minute, third downs, first downs and so on.

Other factors to consider include how much time is on the clock? What's the score? What's the field position? Or the personnel?

"If you're watching another defense, what personnel are they in, and why is the offense running these plays versus that look, versus that coverage?"

Smith said.

"The first thing I'm watching is myself, every time. That's just, I feel like if that's not what you're watching at first, then, I don't know – it's just an extension of you. If I'm out there playing, I want to watch myself," he added. "And then from there, I'll rewind it and watch, 'What was the front doing? Can I pick something up from the offense? What was happening on the other side?'"

Is there one piece of advice he's given to younger players?

Smith's number one rule while watching film of an upcoming opponent is to work through the mental reps. He might be lying on the couch; but in his mind, how does he respond to the play in front of him?

"You should always give yourself a

call. You should know your defense well enough that you have a couple reasonable choices that your defensive coordinator might call. When I'm talking to Flo' (Vikings Defensive Coordinator Brian Flores), I like to know what [calls he prefers]," Smith said. "I might be way off, but at least I'm thinking about a play that we have. And then, 'OK, the offense lines up in this formation, I'm supposed to be hearing this call, I need to communicate with so-and-so ... and then where am I aligned, where are my eyes?"

"With all the views you have, you can mentally get a lot out of that rep. You don't have to be on the field," Smith reiterated.

It's not enough, Smith said, to identify the team's best pass catcher.

"You can't just say, 'This guy's fast.
That receiver's really good. That running back breaks a lot of tackles.' Yeah, they're all like that," Smith laughed. "Every week, they're all like that. So you've gotta try to get more out of it."

Sometimes, an exact look from the tape shows up on game day.

But at its core, football is a game of chess. A battle of wits. Not every play by the opponent can be anticipated, and not every game goes exactly as expected.

"Sometimes you're tired, you got beat on a play earlier so you're thinking about that or thinking, 'They're doing this, so it's different than normal,' but it's not. You're trippin'. You're seeing ghosts," Smith said.

Even if the offense doesn't execute an exact look, though, Smith's countless hours in the "classroom" have provided him a deep understanding of the game that often allows him to make a safe prediction.

"Because I've watched so much and played so much

and put myself in a call and thought about my landmarks and my alignment and things like that, you're just in the right spots more. And it gives you the opportunity to make plays," Smith said. "They're not always exactly what you expect, but you have some ideas before the ball is snapped. You don't sell out on them but, 'A couple things could probably happen here,' and then you can just play them a little faster.

"I'd say that is the [majority] of plays I've made from watching film," he added. "Sometimes you just make plays, too. It just happens because you're running to the ball or whatever. You get lucky sometimes. But I'd say the cumulative effect of watching film in a productive manner kind of shows itself – but not all at once."

Smith generally reviews film solo, but the process still can be interactive.

He often will send a specific clip or game situation to Jones or one of his fellow DBs to get their thoughts.

Jones always welcomes a text from Smith, regardless of the hour.

"He's thinking about the game plan," Jones said. "He's watching the tape with a purpose. He's Metellus, whom Smith has praised for his football I.Q., takes a similar approach and embraces any opportunity to pick the vet's brain or bounce ideas off one another.

Metellus described in-season early mornings at TCO Performance Center, when he and Smith, or other combinations of defensive players, will start off the day by comparing notes – mental or physical – on various cutups.

"I'm up at night watching film, putting myself through calls, get a situation where I don't know what you're going to do or how I should play this, so the next day we'll talk about it," Metellus said. "It's constant football chatter, especially with the older guys who have played a lot of football ... just trying to figure out how we're going to attack.

"There are multiple instances where we just talk through plays and Harry will say something, he'll remind you or give you a little tidbit [from the tape]," Metellus continued. "It's the little things like that, that happen all game, that help. If you ever see him talking to people on the field, he's probably telling somebody

The "ST" on the hat wearer's right temple is easy to connect to Special Teams, a unit that blends offensive and defensive players into collective missions.

The interlocking triangles on the front build on that idea, representing "mind, body and soul."

"If you look at who we are as a team, the mind of the team, we have an offensive-minded head coach. The offense is constantly finding ways to manipulate defenses, control defenses and always be in front of the sticks," Vikings Special Teams Coordinator Matt Daniels said. "You look at the body of the team, it's essentially the defense, and the soul of the team, if you combine the offense and defense together, you get special teams."

The design culminated from offseason research by Daniels, Assistant Special Teams Coordinator Dalmin Gibson and Football Video Coordinator Oliver Bowling.

"We started looking at images, Viking

essentially their alphabet, and each rune meant something to them.

"In the Viking culture, the interconnected triangles represented the mind, body and soul, which leads to victory over darkness," he added.

Daniels opted for having the triangles of a valknut point down because of a phrase the special teams unit uses: "We stay down until we come up."

In the spring, Daniels, Gibson and Bowling researched runes' meanings and identified the virtues they believe to be most important to the football team, leading to selection of the word "TRYGGO" as a representation of the group's "true north."

"For us. TRYGGO is 'I seek the truth." even when it's a hard truth.' For us, we talk about that being an accountability aspect of the team," Daniels said. "You always want to hold your teammates to a high standard and also be accountable to yourself, so we're asking, 'Did we pour everything into our teammates? Did I do my job that was expected of me on a

daily basis?'

"From there, 'I am true to those I pledge my service to.' That might be family, teammates," Daniels added. "'As I press on against all odds and hold nothing negative, the goal is met, the task is finished.' That's just commitment to yourself and teammates."

Vikings linebacker and core special teams player Troy Dye appreciates the depth of the messaging and authentic connection it has to football.

"It's super dope when they bring in an outside source and you can tie it into our sport because sometimes it can get lost in the small things - 'We've got to do this. We've got to do this.' But when you get an outside source like that, there's more meaning behind, not just football, but it helps you in life," Dye said. "There's three different phases that have to work together, and I feel like this is life in general. There's all these different things you have to work together to get to go to one thing."





ELEMENTARY FIELD TRIPS WITH MICROSOFT INTRODUCE STEM CAREERS

Vikings General Manager Kwesi Adofo-Mensah and his wife Chelsea last month joined three players at U.S. Bank Stadium.

But it wasn't for a game.

Kwesi, Chelsea, Joshua Dobbs, Greg Joseph and Sheldon Day spent time at the stadium's Vikings Voyage space, where they worked with third graders on fun activities that intertwined football and STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) concepts.

Thanks to a partnership between the Minnesota Vikings Foundation and the Science Museum of Minnesota, Vikings Voyage is a field trip program that regularly hosts elementary students and introduces them to a range of careers and backgrounds via videos filmed with Vikings staff. While on the field trips, students record data, stream career videos and capture content on Microsoft Surface tablets, courtesy of Microsoft.

The Vikings guests interacted with King Elementary students in the unique and interactive space, which also features a vertical jump activity, a shuttle speed drill and a football sled on which young people can test their tackling techniques.

They also engaged in a Q&A with the young people, who came prepared with insightful, STEM-related questions for the group.

"We all have curiosity and intelligence - we all just choose different canvases to

paint on," Adofo-Mensah said.

The Vikings GM appreciated an opportunity to visit with youngsters who didn't shy away from their curiosity and questions.

"I can remember those days where my mom asked me what I learned at school, and she'd tell me, 'You're gonna use that stuff one day,' and I get to use it every day," he said. "I always want to make sure I tell kids, 'I don't know what you want to do with your life at your age, 10, you don't know that yet, but just learn as much as you can because it will take you places.'

"I truly want to show that passion [to] kids and inspire them to do what I was able to do and just apply what I learned every day, which is such a blessing," Adofo-Mensah added.

Chelsea Adofo-Mensah also enjoyed engaging with students, sharing her experience at Google and especially inspiring young women who

have an interest in STEM fields.

"Being at a company like Google, working on a team like I do at YouTube TV, I work for a mother. And a lot of our executives at Google and YouTube are women," she said. "I'm surrounded by

incredible women who are both engineers, they're product designers, they're UX researchers, they're back-end engineers, they're front-end engineers.

"It's a huge opportunity to have that, and I think the most important thing is little girls be able to know they do have a spot at the leadership table in all those different environments and rooms," Chelsea added.
