


This matchup features considerable overlap between players facing their former teams.

Vikings Jonathan Greenard and Blake Cashman are entering their second season with Minnesota after previously playing for Houston. Jeff Okudah joined Minnesota this offseason after appearing in six games for the Texans in 2024.

Houston's roster includes Danielle Hunter, the five-time Pro Bowler who began his career as a third-round draft pick by the Vikings in 2015. Hunter headed to Houston last offseason. Irv Smith, Jr., (2019-22) and Ed Ingram (2022-24) are former Vikings draft picks, and Cam Robinson joined Houston this offseason after filling in for Christian Darrisaw for the final half of 2024.



JACKSON

DONOVAN JACKSON, MINNESOTA'S FIRST-ROUND PICK OF 2025, AND OTHER VIKINGS ROOKIES ARE SET TO MAKE THEIR NFL DEBUTS IN TODAY'S GAME.

Jackson was selected with the 24th overall pick, becoming the third player ever selected by the Vikings at that draft spot. The other two (Leo Hayden in 1971 and Korey Stringer in 1995) also are former Buckeyes.

After locking things down at guard,
Jackson was willing to kick out to left
tackle on the way to helping Ohio State
win the 2025 College Football Playoff
National Championship and garnering his
second consecutive First-Team All-Big Ten
selection. According to Pro Football Focus,
Jackson allowed just 5.0 sacks over the

course of 1,293 pass blocking snaps during his college career.

HOUSTON'S OWN

Jackson will be opening his NFL career against his hometown team. He racked up significant honors during his prep career, earning a five-star rating and top guard designations from recruiting services. He played at Houston Christian High School before transferring to Episcopal High School. Jackson helped Episcopal win the Southwest Preparatory Conference 4A title as a junior.

DID YOU KNOW?

Jackson and Bengals rookie Seth McLaughlin became the third and fourth players in Ohio State history to earn First-Team All-America honors as a player and First-Team Academic All-America honors, joining Bob White in 1958 and Randy Gradishar in 1973.

Though it's unlikely the veteran defensive end will see much (or any) playing time for Houston in the teams' first preseason action, Hunter will once again occupy a sideline of U.S. Bank Stadium ... just the opposite side Minnesota fans are used to.

Hunter started his pro career in Purple, when the Vikings tabbed him in the third round of the 2015 NFL Draft. He ascended

into the top-tier pass rusher he's revered as across the league today, recording double-digit sacks on five occasions and earning four of his five Pro Bowl nods as a Viking.

Hunter spent his first nine seasons in Minnesota before signing with his hometown Texans as a free agent in March 2024. He started all 17 regular-season games last season and tallied 46 tackles, 12 sacks, 17 tackles for loss, a forced fumble and three passes defensed. He faced his former team in Week 3, when he had two tackles and two QB hits in a 34-7 loss to the Vikings.

Jeff Okudah is back to four distinct seasons, Great Lakes territory and the grittiness of NFC North football.

After spending his first three NFL seasons in Detroit, the 2020 first-round draft pick played for Atlanta in 2023 and Houston last season before this spring joining the Vikings as a free agent.

"It's an explosive division with a mix of toughness in there, too," Okudah told 14 passes defensed, two interceptions Vikings.com. "It's not just all finesse. It's like, you do see a lot of highpowered offenses, but there's also an element of toughness that every team possesses. I think it makes for really fascinating games."

Born in New Jersey, Okudah's family relocated to Grand Prairie, Texas, when he was 11 years old. It was that move that fully immersed him in the game of football. He went on to star at Grand Prairie High School and then Ohio State University.

Since being drafted No. 3 overall by the Lions, the cornerback's pro journey has been anything but linear. Okudah navigated injuries and other challenges throughout his first five seasons but is thrilled for a fresh start and opportunity to make an impact in the game he's never stopped loving.

"I think for me, the fun comes from understanding – it's taking a step back and understanding the blessing that I have to be here," he said. "Getting older, you see guys that you've started the journey with, whether in high school or college or even the NFL that are no

longer playing, and they've transitioned to other careers or endeavors. So be able to come in here every single day and do this, you know, I have a lot of gratitude."

Okudah is entering his debut Vikings season with 44 career games (31 starts) under his belt. Okudah has recorded 177 total tackles (including two on special teams), seven tackles for loss, and one defensive touchdown. He also contributed heavily on special teams last season for the Texans.

But who is Jeff Okudah beyond his stat line, now-Purple helmet and his No. 21 iersev?

We're glad you asked.



Back like he never left. Fic Wilson walks through the halls at 700 Performance Center and across the Vikings practice fields wearing his signature grin.

No, really. He might always be smiling.

The linebacker who started his career in Minnesota as an undrafted rookie in 2017 re-joined the Vikings this spring and continues to have a positive impact on the field and locker room alike.

"Eric being back has been great," fullback C.J. Ham said.
"Like, the dude is a heck of a player. He's a dog. Me and him had some great years together the first time around, too.

"He just loves the game," Ham continued. "If you ever have any nerves or anxiety before games, he's one of the guys I could look at before kickoff, and he just had a great big smile on his face. When you see guys with that type of energy, everything's cool. It's gonna be great."

Vikings Defensive Coordinator Brian Flores hasn't coached Wilson, who spent 2017-20 in Minnesota, prior to this season. But he admired the dynamic defender from afar and quickly has become a fan.

Flores recently told Twin Cities media members Wilson is "just a guy you want to be around." He noted players in all three phases gravitate toward the almost-31-year-old.

Flores emphasized the need for players of Wilson's nature, saying he fits seamlessly on a unit of blue-collar defenders.

"People use the term 'glue guy'; I think he's got the makings of that," Flores said.

Asked what he thought of the 'glue guy' compliment, Wilson tilts his head before letting out a loud laugh.

I translate a bit: "People are drawn to you. You unify a group."

For just a moment, Wilson looks the slightest taken aback – in a good way. His smile reappears, softly.

"Wow, I appreciate that," he said. "I just love what I do. I try to maybe bring that out of other people, to find what makes them go and to help them be better at it."

TRAVELING TEAMMATES

Wherever Wilson goes, he easily creates close relationships. It's why he's still incredibly close with former Vikings teammates Danielle Hunter, who last year joined the Texans in free agency, and Ifeadi Odenigbo. The trio stays in close touch despite being spread across the country — and they also enjoy trotting the globe together.

Wilson, Hunter and Odenigbo first traveled internationally together in 2019 when they joined teammates Anthony Barr and Eric Kendricks, along with Kendricks' now-wife Ally, in visiting Tokyo.

The trip still tops Wilson's list, from sightseeing and museum tours to eating dinner at Gonpachi, the restaurant that inspired one of Quentin Tarantino's famous *Kill Bill* fight scenes.

He did point out, though, that Odenigbo handled lodging responsibilities for half the group – and subsequently had the privileges jokingly revoked.

"Ifeadi's like, 'Guys, I found this great place, super cheap for everybody, huge, plenty of space. It has this huge projector screen to watch movies and stuff.' That sounds pretty cool," Wilson recalled. "So we found our way through the train station ... to get there. It was like walking through Times Square. We had no idea where we were, but we figured it out.

"Got to the place and it was like a studio apartment shack. It was very compact," he quipped. "There were four of us — one, two, three, four — laying up in a studio apartment. We were on top of each other. We had to, like, crouch down in the shower. It was funny. But it was cool. It brought us much closer, for sure."

Wilson, Hunter and Odenigbo met up for another trip in March 2023, when they made the marathon trip across the globe to Australia. The group toured Sydney, Melbourne and the Gold Coast, collecting more memories and anecdotes along the way.

"The thing about Eric is that he's just a free spirit, man; he's always positive," Hunter said. "If there ever is a negative situation, he always finds a positive in it. I don't think I've ever seen Eric mad, angry, anything. In any situation, whether during a game or traveling together, he's always finding the positive."

A few months ago, Wilson got a phone call from Hunter inviting him to return to Japan and this time also visit China.

"Sure, sounds fun! When?"

"In two days."

"BRO."

Wilson cracks up while conveying the story. He's certainly not opposed to spontaneity, he assures, but even he needs more than a couple days' notice.

There's another trip option, though. Hunter offers for Wilson to join him and Odenigbo on a post-OTAs excursion to Copenhagen, Denmark, and Stockholm, Sweden.

"I was like, 'All right, bet.' I had, like, over a month to find a flight, find hotels and whatnot," Wilson said. "They had been to Norway before, so these were also on their list."

The three friends traded off who was in charge of booking various museums or dinner reservations, and they explored a Vikings (the authentic variety, not the NFL variety) museum in each capital city.

Wilson found himself enamored with the history of the Vikings and connecting it to some of the modern parallels drawn by the team he's now played for twice.

He especially enjoyed learning about the Vikings longships, which are believed to have been invented in the 8th century. The strong, slender and flexible boats most notably featured a draft that, even when filled with troops, equipment and plunder, sat shallowly in the water. The longships' unique design made it possible for Vikings to sail faster than any other water vessel of that time and to navigate seaports, shallow coves and even rivers.

"That was really cool to learn about. Really interesting," Wilson said.

"It provides extra context to [our Vikings]," he later added. "The shields we have everywhere, the chants that we do ... it's pretty dang cool. Sounding the Gjallarhorn before the game, put it all out there to take what we want. It's really cool."

During their five-day stay in Sweden, the group visited The Royal Palace of Stockholm, the official residence of the royal monarch, where they admired giant marble columns, grand archways and stunning original artwork – including the breathtaking ceiling of Karl IX's Gallery.

In Denmark, he and his former teammates visited the Rosenborg Castle, where they were able to see the Crown of Christian IV, the older (1596) of just two surviving crowns of Denmark; the Rubjerg Knude Lighthouse on the coast of the North Sea and Amalienborg Palace, the official residence of the Danish royal family.

"When you go overseas, for whatever reason when you go somewhere brand new, that's when you want to visit a museum. I've checked out more museums overseas than here in America," Wilson laughed. "But the art there is fascinating to me. It's old school, it's traditional. ... You know, murals on all the ceilings, every piece of the walls is covered with something. And it's all done in this [high-quality], beautiful way."

It wasn't all castles and regality, though.

Wilson of course made sure to mix in a few goofy photos during such sophisticated tours, and the trio one evening took a boat ride to a Swedish island, had a quick burger, and boated back.

He also took a spontaneous dip one day in Denmark. Hunter described bicycling past multiple people swimming in the river. Though the activity certainly looked refreshing, the friends hadn't brought swimming trunks or a change of clothes on their outing.



"Eric was like, 'Man, I'm about to go in.' And he just, like, took his [outer layer] off and jumped in," Hunter laughed. "Ifeadi and I did not go in. We went to get food and came back later; he'd been swimming for hours. He was just vibing. Eric's a guy that knows how to have conversation with people; by the time we got back, he was friends with the whole group."

In addition to chatting up the locals, Wilson makes a point to seek out neighborhood, hole-in-the-wall food establishments. This vacation was no different, as he leaned on Google maps and patron reviews to track down "something that feels like a homecooked meal."

"I found some spots that had some really good homemadestyle, authentic to the town, authentic to the country," Wilson explained. "Lingonberries, a meatloaf and mashed-potato dish. Gravy. It sounds like something so common, but the flavor profile is just a little different there, and it was amazing."

Wilson appreciates the vacation approach he, Hunter and Odenigbo take, finding a perfect balance of relaxation and tourism. He specifically enjoyed their time in Copenhagen, where they solely walked or utilized bicycles — one of the primary modes of transportation there.

"We were there for a week and didn't even touch a car. It's fascinating," Wilson said.

"It's a very laid-back city, more so than Stockholm, and people are incredibly kind," added Wilson, who even happened to be recognized by an enthusiastic Vikings fan in Denmark.

"It was hilarious," he said. "It was great."

FOR THE LOVE OF THE GAME

Get to know Wilson, and it's no surprise he'd formed such strong bonds with those he's played football with.

Vikings coaches and teammates alike praise his demeanor, his ability to connect and his willingness to help bring along younger players.

"This guy's done nothing but come in and be a second coach for us," Vikings Special Teams Coordinator Matt Daniels said during minicamp. "You know, I just came over here and he's got this entire rookie group, they're going over punt protection, I mean, he's running a full-on drill.

"The addition of Eric has just been huge," Daniels added. Blake Cashman didn't play with the Vikings during Wilson's first stint but actually got to know him in 2020 when the two linebackers ended up training together. He said it's "been a blast" having Wilson in the position group this spring and summer.

"I think E-Wil is one of the most versatile linebackers, honestly, I've played with. A guy with a lot of experience," Cashman said. "He's already added so much value just with how he sees things and how smart he is, his reads on the field. He's got experience on me, and I can lean on him, ask him how he sees playing this certain concept so I can improve my game. For a guy that's versatile, you can plug him into any spot, and he's a perfect fit for this defense."

True to his nature, Wilson is ready and willing to do whatever the team asks of him, whether on defense or special teams. He's hard at work every day to make an impact, and he's building on connections with new and old teammates alike.

It's what makes football so great, he noted.

"It brings together guys from all different backgrounds, from all over the world. I mean, he's from freaking Australia right there," Wilson chuckled, pointing as punter Oscar Chapman walked by. "People from all over the world come together for the love of the game, and then through that process, you really get to know one another for the rest of your lives.

"It's a pretty cool thing because you have these brothers," he added. "You have these brothers for the rest of your life ... guys you can trust in, guys you can confide in."

Wilson referenced Ham, with whom he shares a similar journey of adversity to the NFL.

"I show up every day with a passion for the way that I play," he said "Me and C.J. get along so well because, you know, we go out there and we're competing to win every single rep. It doesn't even matter. It could be a walk-through, wherever, you know, we're talking to each other. Try to find little ways to get under each other's skin. I just love what I do."

And now back in Minnesota, doing it in Purple? There's nothing better.

"It feels amazing. Back where it first started," Wilson said. "I've got so much love for everybody here. The city, the team, the fans, everybody. I love it."

Jones excelled in his first season with the Vikings, rushing for career highs in carries (255) and yards (1,138). The Vikings added Mason through a trade with the goal of reducing some of the workload for Jones, who turned 30 in December.

POINT OF EMPHASIS:

The Vikings committed multiple resources in the offseason to boost their results in short-yardage situations. Since the Vikings are unlikely to tackle to the ground at camp practices, the preseason games could provide a better indicator on how the plan is working.



PLANTING & GROWING FLAG FOOTBALL

THE SEEDS OF SUPPORT FOR AND PARTICIPATION IN FLAG FOOTBALL ARE CREATING MORE OPPORTUNITIES THROUGHOUT MINNESOTA AND BEYOND.

GIRLS HIGH SCHOOL LEAGUE

A dozen girls high school flag football teams competed as the Vikings hosted the inaugural state title, which Mahtomedi claimed with a 36-20 victory over La Crescent-Hokah at TCO Stadium on June 9.

Young women on the sideline sprinted to

meet their teammates on the field in a celebratory mob, lifting the blackand-silver trophy above their heads in triumph.

> "This means everything for them," Mahtomedi Head Coach Nick Sullivan said. "Everything

that we do, and all the success, it's for them."

Trailblazers. It's true of the Zephyrs, who became the first team in state history to officially win the girls high school flag football championship, an initiative supported through a \$600,000 contribution by the Vikings.

It's true also, though, of 50 - 50! - other teams that competed this season. After helping launch a pilot program in 2024 with four teams (La Crescent-Hokah, Rosemount, Houston and Pine Island), the Vikings in 2025 looked to expand to a full league - and expand they did.

"It's just been so cool to see the growth," La Crescent-Hokah senior Savanah Klinski said prior to the final game. "The number of people who have been out here today, it's just been amazing. Last year we were just a small little group, and now the bleachers are filled. It's incredible."

Klinski caught two touchdown passes and a 2-point conversion in the championship game; she earlier helped lead the Lancers to wins over Two Rivers (33-12) and Centennial (24-6). The Zephyrs, quarterbacked by Rylee Bogren, defeated Bloomington and Park (in Cottage Grove) with identical scores of 32-0 en route to facing La Crescent-Hokah.

Mahtomedi senior Presley Albers scored the Zephyrs final touchdown of the evening.

"We all grew up watching football with our family, and just to see women [playing football and] little girls can look up to them and know they can do whatever they want, it's special," Albers said.

The Vikings announced in late May a partnership with the Minnesota Star Tribune to continue growing girls flag football. The Star Tribune created a dedicated page on its MN Football Hub and streamed the tournament live.





WOMEN'S COLLEGE LEAGUE

Second-half comeback, red-zone fourth down, overtime and double elimination under the lights.

Minnesota's inaugural collegiate women's flag football season couldn't have had a better concluding tournament.



The Vikings helped seven NCAA institutions make history this spring when they launched the first-of-its kind league. The inaugural season featured Saturday jamborees at the University of Northwestern – St. Paul and the University of Wisconsin-Stout, and culminated April 26 with a championship tournament at TCO Stadium.

"It's such an amazing experience for girls to not only experience what typically people stereotype as a 'men's sport,' but I also think it's been a great opportunity to grow and push ourselves to do things maybe we weren't able to do in high school," Augustana senior Mia Frank said.

Frank was part of a resilient Augustana
University team that lost its first game
to UW-Stout but then defeated Bethel
University and Concordia Moorhead to
work through the consolation bracket and
rematch against Stout in the championship.

Frank helped lead the Augustana Vikings on a second-half comeback to force the game into overtime and secure a nail-biting win; because the tournament was double-elimination, however, Augustana and Stout had to immediately play each other a third time against a setting sun.



Ultimately, the Blue Devils pulled away with the title.

Vikings Vice President of Social Impact Brett Taber, who took in the jamboree along with his 7-year-old son, called the inaugural season a "resounding success" with tremendous potential for growth.

"The Minnesota Vikings are proud to help create opportunities for these athletes, and collectively, they put on an incredible display of passion and athleticism," Taber said. "The championship tournament at TCO Stadium was exhilarating on every play, and it is clear that flag football in our region has only just begun."





Justin Jefferson and Brian Asamoah II have lived out their dreams of making it to the NFL.

The Vikings receiver and linebacker in May took a step toward another dream becoming an Olympian.

> NFL owners at the Spring League Meeting at Omni Viking Lakes approved a resolution to allow NFL players to participate in flag football during the 2028 Olympics, which will introduce the sport to its lineup in Los Angeles. Negotiations with the NFL Players Association will follow. Jefferson,

Asamoah, NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell, NFL EVP of Football Operations Troy Vincent and EVP of Club Business and League Events Peter O'Reilly shared their excitement for the news during a press conference.

"The membership today made a bold move," Vincent said. "America's game is now on the world stage."

Jefferson was announced as a Global Flag Ambassador in June 2023 and has been sharing his electrifying enthusiasm for growing the game.

"Reverting back to being a kid and watching the track and field meets, watching basketball win the gold medal, that's something that as a kid I always wanted to be a part of, but football wasn't global, so now we're expanding the game, it's pretty cool," Jefferson said.

Asamoah has been sponsoring youth flag teams in Ghana through his BA (Be Authentic) Foundation, further connecting with his heritage. This spring, he traveled there with Vikings running back Aaron Jones, Sr., and receiver Jordan Addison to support the "Road to LA28" program in Accra. Nearly 100 athletes tried out at the University of Ghana's Rugby Field to be selected for the 50-player pool that will begin training to represent Ghana at the Olympics.

Asamoah's parents moved to the United States in 2000, shortly before he was born in Newark, New Jersey. Asamoah then grew up in Columbus, Ohio. He visited Ghana when he was 10 years old and tried to explain American football to his peers.

"I just can't wait to see the excitement and joy that everybody's going to be able to see out of the players, the fans and each country being able to say I have an opportunity to compete in the highest games, LA28, and an opportunity to bring the gold back to the Gold Coast," Asamoah said.

Minnesota's 2025 slate is full of historical significance, including rarities of opening with back-to-back prime-time games (at Chicago and against Atlanta) and playing on Christmas Day for just the fifth time in franchise history (hosting Detroit).

The Vikings also will become the first NFL team to play in back-to-back international games in two different countries.

Here are six takeaways from the Vikings 2025 schedule:

HISTORIC DOUBLE DIPS BEFORE BYE

The Vikings will open on the road at the Chicago Bears for a Monday Night Football contest and follow by hosting the Atlanta Falcons in Week 2 on Sunday Night Football.

Minnesota has only opened one season (1981) with back-to-back games in prime time with a Saturday night game at Tampa Bay and a Monday night game against the Raiders.

Minnesota has gone 4-0 in regular-season games played in London and will try to chalk a victory over Pittsburgh in Ireland in Week 4 before returning to the UK to face the Cleveland Browns. Interestingly, Minnesota is the only team Pittsburgh and Cleveland have played in a regular-season game on international soil.

McCARTHY & YOUNG QBS TAKE CENTER

The Vikings era with J.J. McCarthy at quarterback will launch in the second-year pro's hometown.

The No. 10 overall pick of 2024 is poised to face that year's top selection, Caleb Williams.

The young QB comparisons will flow into Week 2, including the anticipated matchup with 2024 No. 8 overall pick Michael Penix, Jr., who started three games last season after Atlanta pivoted from former Vikings QB Kirk Cousins. Washington's visit (Week 14) will provide an opportunity to face 2024 No. 2 pick Jayden Daniels.

ROLLING 7: EXCLUSIVE-WINDOW GAMES

Consider it a sign of respect.

The Vikings are scheduled to participate in seven "exclusive-window games."

In addition to Weeks 1-2 and 4-5, the Vikings also are scheduled for a Thursday night game at the Los Angeles Chargers on Prime Video, a Sunday night game at Dallas on NBC and the Christmas Day game, which will be streamed by Netflix at 3:30 p.m. (CT).

DÉJÀ VU ALL OVER AGAIN

Stop us if you've heard this before.

The Vikings play in London in Week 5, have a Week 6 bye, a really tough home game in Week 7 and a trip to Los Angeles for a Thursday game in Week 8.

The late, great Yogi Berra would sum that up as "déjà vu all over again" and wouldn't have to dip too far into the past for a reference. The 2024 slate was Week 5 vs. Jets in London, Week 6 Bye, Week 7 vs. Lions, Week 8 at L.A. Rams on a Thursday.

A FEARSOME FOURSOME

No, the Rams aren't on the schedule. No need to worry about the legacy of Deacon Jones, Merlin Olsen, Rosey Grier or Lamar Lundy reincarnate.

But the stretch against the Eagles, Chargers, Lions and Ravens is a four-game run against teams that were a combined 52-16 during the 2024 regular season.

DOUBLE DROUGHTS OF HOME GAMES

It has been common in each of the past six seasons for the Vikings to be away from U.S. Bank Stadium for the middle part of the season. This year, there will be two such instances.

- 2019: One home game between Oct. 14 and Nov. 17
- 2020: One home game between Oct. 19 and Nov. 22
- 2021: One home game between Oct. 11 and Nov. 21
- 2022: One home game between Oct. 10 and Nov. 20
- 2023: One home game between Oct. 24 and Nov. 27
- 2024: One home game between Oct. 21 and Dec. 1
- 2025: One home game between Sept. 22 and Nov. 9 AND one home game between Nov. 17 and Dec. 25

J.J. MCCARTHY HELPS VIKINGS TABLE DELIVER

100,000th MEAL

J.J. McCarthy successfully made his first handoffs – and provided his first highlight – of 2025.

The Vikings second-year quarterback and his fiancée Katya joined the Vikings Table food truck, powered by Xcel Energy, at YouthLink's Drop-In Center to distribute meals to teens and young adults in March.

The meals distributed included some that were packaged for later use, including one in a gold bag to commemorate the 100,000th meal delivered since Vikings Table's mission launched in summer 2019. Those meals were delivered to YouthLink in a new refrigerated van that increased flexibility for continuing to reach people who can benefit from a good meal.

McCarthy then lined up alongside Xcel Energy Senior Vice President/Chief Communications Officer Rob Clark to serve Southwest-themed bowls featuring a choice of chicken, spicy chicken, beef or vegetarian options from Vikings Table.

"The handoffs were great," McCarthy said.
"I believe the recipients of the handoffs were even better."

Clark said the event was a wonderful way to continue the partnership between Xcel Energy and the Minnesota Vikings Foundation.

"[The 100,000th meal] is a great milestone. It's a very visible sign of the great partnership we have," Clark said. "Unfortunately, what it means is we've got food insecurity issues in our community. We're going to continue to be focused on that. We've re-upped our partnership to do this.

"We want to make sure we continue to serve those in the community that need it," Clark added. "We would love to see food insecurity go away entirely, but until then, we're going to continue to do what we can to make sure people have access to food they need."

Less than a year after Minnesota selected McCarthy with the 10th overall pick of the 2024 NFL Draft, he's expanded his efforts to make a difference in this community.

"It's really special, being a Midwest kid,"
McCarthy said. "It's really awesome to be
able to build those relationships and that
connection to the city, a real heartbeat of the
city. It's awesome every opportunity I get, and I
relish every moment."

YouthLink serves young people aged 16 to 24 who are experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness in the Twin Cities.

Darian Rosenthal, a YouthLink client, enjoyed meeting McCarthy. He exuded enthusiasm at the opportunity to talk football with the QB.

"It's been an honor, a blessing," Rosenthal said. "He's going to do good this year. I have faith in him. I was just giving him congratulations on his season."

Rosenthal said YouthLink "helps me achieve things I couldn't do on my own" by providing "a stable environment to live through and build from."

And it provided him with a memory and a memento. McCarthy removed his No. 9 jersey, autographed it and presented it to Rosenthal, adding to the ways he connected with YouthLink clients and staff.


YouthLink Drop-In Center Youth Services
Director Ko Quaye said the optional space
serves more than 120 teens and young adults
daily at its 41 North 12th Street location in
Minneapolis.

"Last year about 20,000 came through our doors," Quaye said. "It's amazing we can do that work at that capacity, but it's also alarming that we see that many young people in a calendar year. Partnerships like the Minnesota Vikings Foundation make it doable for us."

Quaye took great joy in seeing the interaction between McCarthy and Rosenthal, saying, "To see a highlight like that happen here is phenomenal."
