

ANDREW **VAN GINKEL**

ANDREW VAN GINKEL IS SET TO PLAY HIS 25TH REGULAR-SEASON GAME AS A VIKING AND 98TH IN THE NFL.

The Rock Valley, Iowa, native provides quite a presence for the Vikings defense thanks to his elite instincts and versatile skill set, which helped him garner a selection to the Pro Bowl and Second-Team All-Pro honors last season.

This year, Van Ginkel returned to action after dealing with a neck

injury. He has recorded 4.0 sacks, seven tackles for loss and five passes defensed through seven games. Van Ginkel has been effective when dropping into coverage, limiting foes to a 64.3 completion percentage (9-for-14) and a passer rating of 73.8.

COMBO PLATTER

Van Ginkel is one of four players since he entered the NFL in 2019 with at least 55 tackles for loss, 32 passes defensed and four forced fumbles. He is joined by Lavonte David, Cameron Heyward and T.I. Watt.



A: I think it's just trusting the preparation. I honestly don't hit too many in practice during the week, just because if I'm hitting one from 55, I can see how much it has left on it. So that's kind of my gauge. I don't really want to go back super far all the time, because I think it creates a little bit of bad habits like swinging a little too hard. If you go back too far, you could create some technique things that probably aren't going to work out the best. Whenever I get in that situation, I just know I have a little bit of adrenaline, so the ball goes a little bit farther, and I just trust in my operation and my offensive line to block for me, too.

Q: AT WHAT POINT DID YOU REALIZE YOU COULD KICK THAT FAR?

A: Probably in high school. I've been kicking since I was in second grade, which is pretty uncommon, I would say. I mean, most guys probably start eighth or ninth grade, so I've been doing it for a while, and just fell in love with it at a young age.

C: KICKERS ARE HAVING BANNER SEASONS RIGHT NOW, ALL THESE LONG-DISTANCE FIELD GOALS BEING MADE. WHAT IS IT ABOUT THE EVOLUTION OF THE KICKER THAT'S ENABLED THAT TREND?

A: I think guys are just getting better. You look in college and high school, and guys there are even better than they were 10 years ago. Guys start training younger and younger, and there's better coaching out there. Guys are getting faster, stronger, just like any other position.

CHE HOW MUCH OF YOUR SUCCESS

A: I think it's mostly technique. I mean, there's a reason you don't see guys who can squat 800 pounds out there kicking field goals. It's not necessarily about leg strength. It's more about leg speed and technique. And the guys that can do that the best are the ones that kick it the farthest.

RIGHT TYPE OF WORKOUTS IN THE WEIGHT ROOM?

A: I work out probably more than most kickers. I know there's some guys that don't really even go in the weight room at all. I'm not a huge weights guy by any means, but I will go in there and work out. For me, it's more about leg speed, so more sprinting and running agility stuff, trying to make sure that I can control where my foot is going. So a lot of ladder stuff, where I'm telling my foot where to go.

Q: WHO TAUGHT YOU YOUR MENTALITY?

A: Probably Coach [Nick] Saban just preaching to everyone, no matter your position, you're trying to do your job and try to count on everyone else do theirs, and it'll all play out.

Q: WHAT KIND OF IMPACT DID HE HAVE ON YOU?

A: Pretty big; [he's] probably the greatest college football coach ever. There's times I look back, and I wish I had my notepad out a little bit more in meetings. I didn't really start doing that until my last year, and there were just so many things that I could write down, and even 20 years from now, look back if I'm going through something, and just kind of see the wisdom that he had.

Q: WHAT'S YOUR FAVORITE "SABANISM"?

A: I used to always like when he would get mad. Not at me, of course, but his getting mad at other guys kind of sparked an energy in our team, a little bit. And guys responded to it really well.

Whenever I saw that, it was like, all right, we're ready to roll.

JUSTIN JEFFERSON'S MAKE-A-WISH CLEATS

Illustrate Relationships & Ripple Effect

The impact of Jets Day extends so much farther than the time measurement in its title.

It's true for the 10 Make-A-Wish recipients who spent an unforgettable September afternoon with Justin Jefferson; it's also true, however, for the phenom Vikings receiver.

Jefferson is continuing to hold those young men close to his heart, and he continued sharing their stories last weekend. For the NFL's My Cause My Cleats initiative, Jefferson's cleats last Sunday were custom-painted to represent Make-A-Wish — and featured the 10 signatures of his special guests.

Avery Fast, 18, initially was at a loss for words upon hearing his name was on Jefferson's cleats for the Week 13 clash in Seattle.

"It makes me feel like it wasn't a one-time thing," Fast reflected. "Jets Day wasn't something out of obligation or to look good, but rather because he loves the community and loves us. That's what this really shows me. Plus, it adds even more memories for us.

"It's so awesome he built on from that day," Fast added. "The days just keep getting better and better with Justin Jefferson — those memories keep getting better and better — and he just adds to it by wearing these cleats."

Jefferson grinned ear-to-ear when he saw his cleats for the first time, picking them up and turning them

over in his hands to admire the autographs hand-painted in white, each one unique, on an airbrushed gray background. Vikings Purple laces complemented the design.

"Oh, these are tough with the signatures," he said, grinning.

Jefferson's smile softened, hinting at a moment of emotion as he carefully read over each name.

"These are fire," he reiterated with a nod. It's been three months since Jefferson hosted the young people, who ranged from 5 to 18 years old



and have faced significant medical challenges, at a Twin Cities Air Reserve hangar.

Jefferson participated in a Q&A moderated by Sunday Night Football's Maria Taylor, offering inspiration to the guests of honor, and then spent an additional two hours connecting and creating intentional memories.

The young men and their families also attended the Vikings-Falcons game the following day, after which a grateful Jefferson stopped by their turf-level suite and reconnected.

"Truly once-in-a-lifetime," Fast said of the weekend.

The experience has continued to influence the way Fast approaches his everyday life.

Fast, a senior at Windom Area High School, was tasked this fall with ideating a project that would benefit his community. Inspired by Jefferson, the 18-year-old decided to plan and host his own "Tackle Cancer" football game to support the Randy Shaver Cancer Research and Community Fund.

"Jefferson does so much with his community, and I thought it would be a really cool idea," he said.

Fast expressed gratitude to the Vikings, who provided silent auction items that included T.J. Hockenson, Joshua Metellus and Head Coach Kevin O'Connell autographed footballs, mini helmets signed by Jefferson and J.J. McCarthy and Crucial Catch hats. Small businesses from Windom and neighboring towns also donated items for the cause, as did the Minnesota Gophers.

Fast planned the initiative around the Windom-Jackson County Central game, hoping to capitalize on a traditional rivalry, and even recruited support from the opposing team and its community.

Vikings Director of Youth & High School Football Joe Rush, who spent time with the Fast family on Jets Day and has kept in close contact with Avery, and Vikings Director of Alumni Relations Tom West traveled to Windom for the game and were accompanied by Vikings Legend Dave Dixon.

"It was just awesome," Fast said.
"Joe is such a good guy, and he
wanted to learn more about me
when we met at Jets Day, and we've
just connected really well. It was
awesome they came to support."

Thanks to Fast's passion and energy, the Windom-Jackson County "Tackle Cancer" game raised more than \$6,000.

Consider it one more experience that will stick with him for years to come.

"Giving back means a lot," Fast said. "After the Make-A-Wish experience, and then doing, on my own, my own project was so fun, and I just loved the feeling. It's an awesome feeling to make a difference, and I'd love to keep doing it – that's just one of the things I learned from Justin Jefferson."

approaching the end of his ninth accrued NFL season. Dopp, also a father and affectionately called "God Dad" by the Hams' trio of littles, reflects and identifies C.J. as a source of stability throughout his life.

"He's still the only one..." Dopp's voice trails off for a moment, a hint of emotion cracking his usually upbeat demeanor. "No matter what, he's always been that constant." It's why Dopp isn't surprised Ham has been selected as the Vikings 2025 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year nominee for a second straight season.

Neither is anyone you talk to who's known Ham for one year, five years or his whole life.

It's just always been who he is.

Teammates say that giving back means even more to "Hammer" than football ... and we all know how much the game means to him.

Ham's passion is pure, illustrated by his embracing of the sometimes-thankless fullback position.

Vikings right tackle Brian O'Neill pointed to his teammate's blue-collar work ethic as one of the reasons he easily garners so much respect throughout the locker room and beyond.

"There aren't many 32-year-olds that play all four special teams phases in the NFL," O'Neill said. There aren't many people who, in year 10 in the NFL, are willing to be on the punt protection team every single day of OTAs and training camp. That exemplifies his team-first attitude. Wherever he can possibly help, he's going to."

Since O'Neill joined the Vikings as a second-round draft pick in 2018, he's observed the way Ham commits himself to making a difference both on and off the field.

"If he had 53 C.J. Hams on the roster," O'Neill said with a chuckle, "We'd really be in a great spot."

Nonprofit directors across the Twin Cities likely would say something similar. And while Ham can't be everywhere all at once, he spends a great amount of time embedded in the community that's supported him throughout his journey.

He especially is committed to the Boys & Girls Clubs, having been a regular at his local Duluth location from age 5 to 18. Ham consistently connects with young people to encourage, inspire and just engage with them during after-school or athletic programs. He and Stephanie every year "adopt" a Boys & Girls Clubs Family facing hardship and generously fulfill their holiday wish list — and then some.

Ham recently joined teammates in serving Thanksgiving

dinner to families at the Southside Boys & Girls Club, during which he shared his connection to the organization and emphasized the familial connection.

Khadija, a mother who attended the dinner with her young children, has been inspired by Ham's story and his remembering where he came from. She sees a bit of herself in his journey, having also grown up from a young age with the Boys & Girls Club.

"To hear what it's meant to C.J., it gives me so much motivation. It inspires me to be very optimistic, knowing that people can start small in a program and achieve great things," Khadija said. "The fact that he came back [to pour into Boys & Girls Club], it's so beautiful. That's something that I want to do; I want to achieve big goals, as well. I'm just so proud of him. He's making me proud. He's inspiring me to do exactly what he's doing and to come back to my community and make it better."

Ask Ham about where that compassion comes from, and he'll point back to his parents, Tina and Cortez Sr., who often worked multiple jobs to support their family but still found time and resources to give back to others.

Ham continues to honor his mom, who passed away in 2021 after a 14-month battle with pancreatic cancer, by living out one of her favorite sayings: "Blessed to be a blessing."

Whether encouraging young people, volunteering at his children's school, visiting the children's hospital, supporting teammates in their charitable endeavors or serving as an American Cancer Society Ambassador, Ham does so with Tina in mind. He especially does so each October when he and Steph host Pamper Her Purple, an all-day event honoring women and girls who have fought – or are currently fighting – cancer.

Cortez Sr. said Ham has "always had a thing about caring for people."

"That's a real gift God gave him," he said. "It makes me real proud. He's a good example. ... He loves his family, number one, loves his wife, and he really ... you can't really put it into words the impact he has on other people.

"He's impacted my life, too," Cortez Sr. added. "I'm enjoying his dream and blessed to be here and be a part of it."

C.J. and Steph make it a point to involve their children







in give-back opportunities throughout the year, and the effect is evident even at their young ages.

Dopp sees firsthand the way Skylar, Stella and Trip are following in their parents' – and grandparents' – footsteps.

He continues to be deeply grateful for Cortez Sr. and Tina taking him into their home as a high schooler, when his parents got into legal trouble and left the city.

"I had nowhere to go, and his family was so quick to help. He just took me in," Dopp said.

Ham often paid for Dopp's guest pass at the local YMCA so he could join their friends in playing basketball. And one year when Dopp needed a pair of basketball shoes, the Ham family came back from a trip to Chicago with a brand-new pair of Starburys. Dopp recalled another instance when the two were hanging out at a park, and a young woman asked for money to purchase a Subway sandwich; without hesitation, Ham obliged.

"He's always helping. And he's been a rock for me," Dopp said. "When I was going through my hard moments, and every time he talked to me, he's been that person for me my whole life. "He's unknowingly saved my life a lot of times," Dopp added.

Ham's teammates may not have known him for the same length of time, but they daily see the same character and care. It's why for the past two years, his name has risen to the top in Vikings WPMOY voting.

"Because the things he does in the community, people can tell it comes from a genuine place. It's not for show. Not for credit," O'Neill said. "We know how much playing here means to him, and the things he does come from truly a place of appreciation for where he came from and wanting to help the community who helped him get to where he is now."

And though humility is Ham's M.O. and he doesn't much enjoy the attention, those around him will remind just how well-deserved the nomination is.



Jonathan Allen played eight seasons for his hometown team and is facing Washington for the first time.

The son of a nuclear biological chemical warfare specialist in the U.S. Army, and a two-time Pro Bowl selection while with the Commanders (2021-22) after he was drafted 17th overall by the organization in 2017, Allen joined arms with Minnesota in free agency in March to be impactful in more ways than one.

"Just about everything I learned,
I learned from my dad – discipline,
hard work; all the things that are kind
of cliché, you hear guys say them all the
time, I feel like I truly learned them from
[him]," Allen said.

His leadership qualities have been noticed at team headquarters and between the whistles.

"He's so consistent every single day – his work, his preparation, his presence in our building," Head Coach Kevin O'Connell expressed the Friday before playing at Green Bay. "He really seems to be finding his stride of exactly what his role is snap-to-snap and how to be the best version of himself in our defense. We've seen some real positive stretches here from J.A., and he's only getting better and better."

Through 12 starts, Allen leads the Vikings defensive linemen with 46 total tackles.

Allen's laurels include one recovered fumble, 2.5 sacks and eight QB hits.
O'Connell partially credits him and Javon Hargrave for Jalen Redmond's rise; the young DL has 4.0 sacks, three "blocked shots" (batted passes) and a Pro Bowl case.

"Having guys like that around you elevates your game," Allen said of his relationships with "Grave" and Redmond. "And then them being good dudes on top of it – it's been awesome" to play alongside them.

It's difficult for Allen to reflect on his individual performance – or the emotions he may feel when his team of eight seasons meets his new one – because of frustrating outcomes and the importance of being where his feet are. On the field, that means handling a 77-percent defensive snapshare. And off of it ...

That entails layering up for his first Midwest winter with his wife, Hannah, and infant daughter. It's their first time living in a place one of them didn't live before. Minnesota, however, isn't new territory per se.

The ninth-year pro has made many offseason trips to the state to visit with his agent and financial advisor, who are both

based here. Allen has boated on Lake Minnetonka in the summers, and he even subjected himself to the icy temps during Super Bowl LII when U.S. Bank Stadium hosted the Eagles and Patriots. The high was 9 degrees and the low was minus-4. A couple favorite aspects of Allen's new home are the business opportunities – he was amazed at first to discover so many Fortune 500 companies – and the food. His top two restaurants right now are Vagabondo located in Excelsior and CōV in Wayzata.

"I've always loved Minnesota," he shared. "[And] the locker room K.O. has built is incredible."

There's surely a level of familiarity for Allen, though he's just nine months into this purple-colored chapter of his career. His work stall at Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center is in the same row of lockers as veteran center Ryan Kelly, another one of Minnesota's free-agent additions and one of the defender's teammates for three seasons at Alabama. They both said they are closer now than in college.



"Offense hung out with offense, defense hung out with defense," Allen noted about the 'Bama divide.

"Now we're both old guys in the league," Kelly quipped. "It's just awesome to get to know him personally. ... I met his wife and his kid, and to see [a college teammate] kind of transition into being a grown man and having a family, it's been really awesome to see. And we come from the same background – 'Back in the old days at Alabama,' you know? We're the old guys now. And we get the honor to say 'Back in our day.' But just to see what he can still do on Sundays; it's just so impressive."

There weren't a ton of "me vs. you" moments between Allen and Kelly during their SEC come-ups because of the way practices are structured, with a reliance on scout teams to give starting units a look, but there were "definitely some battles," Kelly recalled. "I got him pretty good a couple times in the chest. I had pretty good hands. I think he learned a lot [competing against me]. I think it was vice-versa."

Another connection is about 30 feet from Allen's locker space: 22-year-old receiver Tai Felton.

The rookie's smile brightens when Allen's name is brought up. Felton used to idolize Allen's All-American jersey hanging on the wall as he walked to class at Stone Bridge High School in Ashburn, Virginia, he said.

"I'm like, 'That can be me one day,' "Felton remembered of his mindset.
"It's awesome having somebody [go] through there – and watching him for all this time – [and now] me being on the same team as him."

Believe it or not, Allen has been keeping tabs on Felton for as much time, if not longer.

"It's really cool because my little nephew used to train with him back in Washington, [D.C.], so I've known about him for a while," Allen said with excitement. "One of my coaches at Alabama, coach [Mike] Locksley, is the head coach at Maryland – so he was [Tai's] coach – so I've been following Tai's career for a long time. So to have the chance to play with him is kind of a surreal moment, because I followed him in high school, and then followed him in college and now have the chance to lace 'em up as teammates."

Some conversations have centered on their similar pasts, such as playing for the same HS coach; other times, Allen has extended knowledge – tips on how to care for your body; how to withstand the grind of a 17-game regular season, after playing 12 in college, while preparing for more in the event of playoffs.


Sometimes, Felton said, Allen tells him tricks of their profession. Felton watches Allen's routine, as well.

It's a bit different for Kelly, because they went through the mud together and he has seen Allen excel at every turn of his career. Nowadays, they like to rib rookie Donovan Jackson when he gets "mouthy about winning a National Championship," Kelly said, joking that Alabama used to win 'em all in a harder format.

It's neat for them to be teammates, again, and to wear some of the same badges of honor.

"You share in some of those days where you just come off the practice field and you're like, 'Golly! This reminds us of when we were back in Tuscaloosa," Kelly exclaimed. "And then just sharing life experiences as fathers has been really fun. I think it's a blast when you get to share [big life undertakings]. Kids are so much fun, so much work, and as you're balancing being the best husband, best father, trying to be the best player still when you start to get older, it's not always the easiest thing."

Vikings players traded in helmets and thigh pads for safety googles and knee pads in November.

Eight teammates spent a portion of an off day volunteering during the Vikings annual Habitat for Humanity Build Week presented by Andersen Windows & Doors, dividing between brand-new, neighboring homes to transfer and hang sheetrock, as well as cut and lay flooring.

"Connecting with the community any way you can is awesome," long snapper Andrew DePaola said. "And when you're providing housing for people who really need it, it goes even deeper than that."

DePaola, who participated in Habitat for Humanity builds while growing up in Maryland and during previous NFL stops, emphasized the security home ownership can provide for a family.

"There's a couple things in life that are needs, not just wants, and housing is one of those needs," he said.

DePaola was joined by Theo Jackson, Bo Richter, Walter Rouse, Ty Chandler, Henry Byrd, Joe Huber and Sione Takitaki.

"Today means everything," Rouse said. "The fact I get to come out here and know I'm going to be helping a family, helping people move into a house they can live, love and grow in — that's what makes this all so worth it.

"Being able to work on the flooring is fun, too," Rouse laughed, showing off his work gloves, "but the main thing is being able to help people."

Vikings volunteers were welcomed by Habitat for Humanity's Catherine Penkert, Chief of Staff, and Kate Loe, Vice President of Resource Development, who explained the impact Habitat makes throughout the Twin Cities.

"Healthy families, healthy communities, start with home. And that's what we try to make possible for as many people who want to own a home as possible in the Twin Cities," Penkert said. "We build homes, new construction like you're working on today, and we rehab homes."

While Habitat for Humanity homes are not free of cost, the monthly mortgage is capped at 30 percent of the qualifying homebuyers' income.

The largest affordable homeownership builder in the seven-country metro area, Twin Cities Habitat has partnered with more than

1,800 families since 1985 to unlock the power of homeownership. Thousands more have stabilized and improved their housing, finances and quality of life through Habitat's programming.

"We have a real laser-focus on advancing racial equity, and specifically advancing Black home ownership, and all of that sits on a foundation of engaging our community," Loe explained. "You are all part of that community, so for that, we thank you."

Habitat for Humanity is also thankful for Andersen Windows & Doors, one of the Vikings existing partners, for donating or deeply discounting all doors and windows installed in Habitat Twin Cities homes.

Eliza Chlebeck, Andersen Corporation Vice President of Communications & Community, attended the build and called the event a "super special" alignment of missions.

"As a company that makes windows and doors, we know firsthand the importance of home, and the work that Habitat does to create safe, stable, affordable home-ownership opportunities for families is so vital to the strength and stability of this community, which is something Andersen cares about," Chlebeck said.

MVC MORGAN INSPIRED BY LATE FATHER'S

OVE OF LIFE

Third-year MVC Morgan doesn't remember a time in her life without dance ... or football.

Having started dance lessons at just 2-and-a-half years old, the Nebraska native didn't grow up an NFL fan but naturally fell into a generations-old passion for Notre Dame football instilled in her by her Irish grandfather and dad.

Morgan will never forget the time her dad Jeff (in the heart of Huskers territory, mind you) mowed the Notre Dame logo into the family's front yard — and then, to his wife's dismay, spraypainted it. And while that was a one-time thing, every single college game day, Morgan and her two sisters would proudly follow their dad, carrying the Notre Dame flag, and parade down the street belting out the school's fight song.

"My mom would record the whole thing," Morgan laughed. "Looking back, I honestly cannot imagine what our neighbors thought of us. But it was a tradition we always did."

Everywhere the family went, people were drawn to Jeff's warmth and energy. Grocery trips and hardware store errands often took longer than they should have because her dad took the time to chat with and connect with cashiers and other customers.

"He was so personable," Morgan said. "He lit up every room he walked into; he had the brightest smile and the loudest, funniest

laugh. He truly impacted every person he interacted with."

When Morgan was 11, Jeff started experiencing symptoms that prompted doctors' visits and one test after another. The diagnosis came after a process of elimination: ALS.

Also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease, ALS is a rapidly progressive, fatal neurological disease that attacks the nerve cells responsible for controlling voluntary muscles.

The condition's effects started out slowly, first impacting his voice and ability to eat. He grew dependent on a tablet for communicating within his first year of being diagnosed, then a feeding tube for nutrition. Even then, he was always smiling, never giving away what he was internally processing. His condition progressively declined, and he ultimately became dependent on a wheelchair.

Morgan, her sisters and her mother served as Jeff's primary caretakers on evenings and weekends, working together to provide the rock of their family with as much comfort and love as possible.

"We were a team," Morgan said. Jeff died one day before Morgan's 17th birthday.

Both before and after his passing, Jeff has inspired Morgan to give her best,

whether at dance recitals all through her childhood, cheering collegiately for the University of Colorado, moving to Minnesota after graduation or auditioning for the MVC.

The way he lived his life moves Morgan to live hers to the fullest, in a way continuing his legacy.

"Before he got sick, he was the life of the party. He really knew how to maximize his days, and he love, love, loved spending time with his family," she reflected. "Even before he was diagnosed, he lived life knowing tomorrow's never guaranteed. And I've adopted that mindset."

Whether running (she's currently training to run a marathon to support ALS awareness), traveling (15 countries and counting), volunteering for ALS nonprofits and serving the Minneapolis homeless community, Morgan thinks about her dad and how he approached each day.

She also does so on Vikings game days, surrounded by MVC teammates who have become an extension of family.

"When I'm on the field, I can feel he's right there with me, and he's so excited for me," Morgan said. "I just know he's so pumped to see me living out my dream. I know he'd try to be at every single game if he was here and, in a way, he still is."





You likely won't find Blake Cashman and Eric Wilson eating too many sweets in-season, but the Vikings linebackers share a favorite dessert: chocolate chip cookies, a classic.


